HEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act for build-"ing and promoting the building of additional "churches in populous parishes," as enlarged and extended by the twelfth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of Her present Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend and render more "effectual the Church Building Acts," or under and by virtue of any and every other power and authority contained in the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the fourth day of October one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the words following, viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that when the last census was taken, the parish, or distinct and separate parish, of Blurton, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield, contained a population of two thousand one hundred and eighty persons, and that besides the parish church, which will accommodate three hundred persons, including two hundred on free seats, there is a consecrated chapel, situate at Normacot, in the said parish of Blurton, which will accommodate four hundred persons, including one hundred on free seats.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that the said parish, or distinct and separate parish, of Blurton, was originally formed by a division of the parish of Trentham, in the county and diocese aforesaid, under the powers and authorities contained in the Act and section firstly hereinafter mentioned, and in conformity also with an Order in Council of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, bearing date the tenth day of August one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the said parish, or distinct and separate parish, of Blurton, it appears to them to be expedient that there should I

be divided off therefrom a distinct and separate parish for the said chapel at Normacot aforesaid. for all ecclesiastical purposes whatever, under and by virtue of the power or authority for such purpose contained in the sixtcenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-eighth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An 'Act for building and promoting the building of 'additional churches in populous parishes,' as enlarged and extended by the twelfth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the first and second years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to amend and render 'more effectual the Church Building Acts,' or under and by virtue of any and every other power and authority in this behalf contained in the Church Building Acts, and that the same should be named of called 'The Distinct and Separate Parish of 'Normacot,' and that the said chapel at Normacot should be and become the parish church of the said distinct and separate parish of Normacot, and that the boundaries thereof should be as follow; that is to say: the distinct and separate parish of Normacot is bounded on the north and north-east by the parishes of Stoke-upon-Trent and of Caverswall; on the east by the consolidated chapelry of Forsbrook as far as the turnpike-road from Stone to Cheadle; on the south by the parish of Stone, to a point near where the highway to Gravelly Bank is approached, and where the said parish of Blurton abuts; it is then bounded on the south-west and west by a line proceeding at the back of the cottages and gardens now or late belonging to Rebecca Simpson, and along the eastern fence of the highway from Gravelly Bank, to the north western corner of the Grange Wood, after proceeding along the northern fence of the said wood for the distance of forty yards, it passes behind the cottage and cowhouse belonging to Richard Walklate until it joins the last mentioned highway, proceeding along which until it joins the turnpike-road from Sandon to Leek, it goes southward along the road for the distance of one hundred and fifty yards, and then, proceeding west, it takes the fence which divides the property of the Duke of Sutherland and John Bailey for the distance of one hundred yards, again proceeding southward at right angles along a fence through the said John Bailey's property until it joins the fence that separates the property of Thomas Emery, then along such fence westward until it reaches the turnpike-road from Longton to Stone, crossing which and entering the property of the said Duke of Sutherland and still proceeding westward until it meets the watercourse or ditch in the hollow ground, it then proceeds in a north-western direction along the watercourse or ditch which runs through the Copshurst Farm, and crossing the highway from Cocknage to Normacot at the bridge under it, still keeping the watercourse, to a short distance south of the site of the Sprotslade Mill, it then takes a northern direction along the fence behind the mill pool until it reaches the turnpike-road from Trentham to Normacot, proceeding towards Normacot for the distance of eighty yards, it takes the line of an intended fence until it meets the Longton and Stone Turnpikeroad, along which it passes to a point where a small stream crosses, it then proceeds along the stream in a north-eastwardly direction to a point where the parish of Blurton and the parish of Stoke-upon-Frent join, as such, distinct and separate parish of Normacot is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink.
"Your Majesty's said Commissioners begileane

further to represent, that the glebe land helonging

to the perpetual curacy or parish church of Blurton aforesaid, or to the incumbent thereof, is situate partly in that portion of the said parish of Blurton remaining after such division thereof as aforesaid, and partly in the said distinct and separate parish of Normacot; and that it appears to your Majesty's said Commissioners to be expedient that all such glebe land should, notwithstanding such division as aforesaid, continue as at present to belong to the said perpetual curacy or parish church of Blurton, or to the perpetual curate or incumbent thereof for the time being, but that such glebe land will be charged with the payment thereout of forty-five pounds per annum, in favour of the perpetual curate or incumbent for the time being of the said parish and parish church of Normacot aforesaid, under the powers and authorities contained in the eighth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His said Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an ' Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for ' building and promoting the building of additional 'churches in populous parishes.'
"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that no tithes or moduses will arise or accrue to either of the incumbents of the

said parishes of Blurton and Normacot.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that the said perpetual curacy or parish church of Blurton is also endowed with, and that the incumbent thereof for the time being is in the receipt of certain interest or dividends from the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, for the augmentation of the maintenance of the poor clergy, amounting to about two hundred and seventy pounds per annum; and which it appears to your Majesty's said Commissioners to be expedient should continue to belong to the said perpetual curacy or parish church of Blurton aforesaid, or to the incumbent thereof for the time being.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that the said perpetual curate of Normacot for the time being will be in the receipt of the interest or dividends arising from the sum of one thousand pounds, or thereabouts, which is about to be paid over to and held in trust by the said Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, for the said parish church of Normacot, or for the incumbent thereof for the time being, and also that a parsonage house, of the estimated value of eight hundred pounds, is about to be given and permanently annexed by the Duke of Sutherland to such parish church of Normacot, for the use and enjoyment of the incumbent thereof for the time being.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it is estimated that the annual amount of fees, oblations, offerings, and other ecclesiastical dues which will arise or accrue to the incumbent of the said parish church of Blurton will be about three pounds, and to the incumbent of Narmocot about twelve shillings

cumbent of Normacot, about twelve shillings.

"That the consents of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese, and of the Most Noble George Granville, Duke and Earl of Sutherland, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, Patron of the said parish church of Blurton, have been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections firstly and secondly hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore beg leave to lay before your Majesty the beforementioned circumstances, and humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to

make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty, having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order and direct, and it is hereby ordered and directed, that the recommendations contained in the said representation be forthwith carried into effect, and that the formation, as therein recommended, of a distinct and separate parish, to be called the distinct and separate parish of Normancot, be forthwith made and carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.
