A PROCLAMATION

Inhibiting all Perfons, after the Four and twentieth day of June next, to use the Trade of a Pedlar, or Petty Chapman, unlefs they be Licenfed according to a Course lately taken by Us in that behalf.

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Hereas by an Act of Parliament made in the

Hereas by an AC of Parliament made in the Nine and thirricth Year of the Reign of the late Queen Elizabeth, Entiruled, (An AC for Punifhing of Rogues, Vagabonds, and Sturdy Beggars) It is, amongli other things, Enacted, That all Pedlars, and Petty Chapmen wandring abroad, fhould be Taken, Ad-judged and Deemed Rogues, Vagabonds, and Sturdy Beg-gars, and be Punifhed, as by the faid ACt is Directed; which Statute was, in the Seventh year of the Reign of the late King Jaraes, Confirmed and Bnacked to be put in due Execu-tion : And whereas the Trade of a Pedlar, or Petty Chap-man, hath heretofore been ufed for the Benefit and Bale of man, hath heretofore been ufed for the Benefit and Bafe of man, hath heretofore been ufed for the Benefit and Eafe of Oux Loving Subjects dwelling remote from Cities and Mar-ket Towns, and for that caufe the Indufrious and Well-dif-pofed Petty Chapman, as well before the faid Statute as fince, hath been, in fome fort, permitted to Travel, and ufe his Trade; And whereas under colour of ufing the faid Trade, many Rogues and Idle Wandring Perfons carrying about Trilles in the Habit of Pedlars, or Petty Chapmen, fo misbehave themfelves, as they are indeed no other but Rebels, Sturdy Bezgars, or Thieves, and many of them heing of no Religion, Carry abroad and Difperfe, without Infortione. Schiffmatical and Seandalous Books and Libble. Infpection, Schiftmarical and Scandalous Books and Libels, not onely to the prejudice of Us, and the Government in general, but to the Wrong of many of Onr Subjects in par-ticular: Whereupon We, in Our Princely Care, defiring Re-drefs and Reformation of all Abufes in this kind; And yee that the Indultrious and Honek Pedlar, or Petty Chapman, may be Tolerated and Incouraged to Travel in his Voca-tion; And finding no better way to effect the fame, than by Licenfing fuch as fhould be known to be of Good and Honelf Converfation, Have, by Our Letters Parents bearing Date the Nine and twentieth day of April now laft, path, Conti-nued the Office for that purpole formetly Erected, and Ap-pointed the fame to be kept in fome convenient Place with-in Qur City of London, and in any other Two or moré Ci-ties or Towns Corporate within this Our Realm of England, or the Principality of Wales, for the Licenfung of Pedlars. Infpection, Schifmatical and Scandalous Books and Libels, ties or Towns Corporate within this Our Realm of England, or the Principality of Wales, for the Liceofing of Pedlars, or Petty Chapmen; And by Our laid Letters Patents made certain of Our Loving Subjects (of whole Care and Fideli-ry We have taken notice) Our Officers, 'la Order to the Li-cenfing the faid Pedlats and Petty Chapmen, and thereby given unto them, their Deputies and Alfigns, Power and Authority to Approve and Alfow of fuch Perion and Perfons to ule the faid Trade of a Pedlar, of Perior Chapman, as fisall bring Tethimony under the Hands and Seals of the Mi-nifter and Chirchwardens of the Parifu where he or they flaal Inhabit, Lettifying the Loyalty, Housely and Abode of fuch Perfon or Perfons, and of his or their these to be Li-cenfed to ule the faid Trade, and thall become Bound unto fuch Parlop of Perlons, and of his or their finels to be Lif-cented to ule the faid Trade, and Inall become Bound unto Us, Our Heirs and Succeffors, in the Penal Sum of Forty pounds, to be and continue of good Behaviour towards Us, Our Heirs and Succeffors, and all Our Liege People, and to Lodgeonely in Ims or Alehoules, and not to Travel on Sun-days, and that thereupon there inall be Licences Drawn and Engroffed for the faid Pedlars, or Petry Chapmen, and be Sealed under the Seal of that Office, and Confirmed unto them under Our Great Seal, to continue during Our Plea-fare. And because many of the former Abules will not be

clean taken away, nor the intended good of Our Loving Subjects fully perfected, without the suppressing of such Diffolute and Oblinate Yagrants as shall use the faid Trade without Licence; And for that the laid Ped'ars and Perty Chapmen of the better fort have not yet had Publick Notice Chapmen of the better fort have not yet had Publick Notice of the faid Letters Patents, nor taken Licences accordingly, for that no time was appointed for their Application in that behalf; We dierefore do hereby thraidy Charge and Com-mand, That no Perfon or Perfons whatfoever, other than fuch as thall be Licenled by force of, and according to the true meaning of Our faid Letters Patents, do attempt or prefume to Wander, Travel, or Go abroad as or in the Habit of a Pedlar, or Petty Chapman, to Buy, Sell or Utj ter any manner of Wares or Commodities whatfoever, in, any Place or Places whatfoever within this Our Realm of Bradiand, or Dominion of Wales or Town of Berwick upon England, or Dominion of Wales, or Town of Berwick upon Tweed, or in any part of them, or any of them, from and after the Four and twentieth day of June next after the Date of this Our Proclamation, upon the Pains and Penaldo hereby likewife thrifting of Allizes and expression of the fail of statutes mentioned and expression. And We do hereby likewife thrifting Charge and Command all and fin-gular Our Justices of Allizes Justices of Peace, Mayors; Sheriffs, Bayliffs, Constables, and all other Our Officers, to Sheriffs, Bayliffs, Contrables, and all other Our Officers, to rake notice of this Our Pleafure, and of the faid Letters Patents, and to be from time to time in all things Aiding and Affilting unto Our faid Officers, their Alligns and Depu-tics, in the due Execution thereof, and to take care that the faid Statutes, and the Pains and Penalties therein contained, be duly Executed upon the Contemners or Neglecters of this. Our Royal Commandment; as they tender Our Pleafure, and will answer the contrary at their Perils.
