of West Ham and East Ham, but that the first right of presentation and appointment as aforesaid should be exercised by the vicar of West Ham aforesaid.

" Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church called Christ Church, situate at Stratford Marsh, in the said parish of West Ham, under and by virtue of the power or authority for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes; and in the third section of an Act passed in the session of Parliament, holden in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of Ecclesiastical Districts to Churches or Chapels, augmented by the gover-nors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' or under and by virtue of any and every other power or authority whatever in this behalf contained in the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed district should be named or called 'The District Chapelry of Stratford Marsh,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: the boundary commences at Channelsea Bridge, where the Stratford road crosses the said river, and proceeds in a north and north-westerly direction along the middle of the Channelsea River, to the point where it meets the River Lea, thence in a southerly direction along the middle of the River Lea, to a point parallel to the north front of the Three Mills, thence easterly along the north front of the said mills to the middle of the Three Mills Wall River, and thence northerly along the middle of the said river to the Harrow Bridge, in the Stratford Road, thence north-easterly along the middle of the said road to the Abbey-lane, thence south-easterly along the middle of the said lane to the Channelsea River, and thence northerly along the middle of the said river to the point where the district commences at Channelsea Bridge, as the same is more particularly delineated and described on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon tinted light green.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of matrimony should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed in Christ Church, at Stratford Marsh aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such

church for the time being.

"That the consent of the said Charles James, Bishop of London, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections lastly hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners, therefore, humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the maps or plans thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of her Privy Council, to approve the clapsed;

thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed formation into one consolidated chapelry be accordingly made, and the agreement in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church at Forest Gate, be carried into effect; and also that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the said church at Stratford Marsh be accordingly made, and the recommendations of the said commissioners in respect of the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churches, and burials, and the fees arising therefrom, be carried into effect; agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased to direct that this order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of London.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Report from the General Board of Health, dated the twenty-third day of November one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the General Board of Health, appointed for the purposes of the Public Health Act, 1848, have, in pursuance of the provisions of that Act, upon the petition of not less than one-tenth of the inhabitants rated to the relief of the poor of and within the parish of Halstead, in the county of Essex, (the number of the said petitioners greatly exceeding thirty in the whole), directed Thomas Webster Rammell, a superintending inspector appointed for the purposes of the said Public Health Act, to visit the said parish, and to make inquiry and to examine witnesses as to the sewerage, drainage and supply of water, the state of the burial grounds, the number and sanitary condition of the inhabitants, and as to any local Acts of Parliament in force within such parish, for paving, lighting, cleansing, watching, regulating, supplying with water, or improving the said parish, or having relation to the purposes of the said Public Health Act; also as to the natural drainage areas, and the existing municipal, parochial, or other local boundaries, and the boundaries which might be most advantageously adopted for the purposes of that Act;

"And the said superintending inspector, having previously given the notices directed by the said Public Health Act, proceeded upon the said inquiry in the manner directed by that Act, and hath reported in writing to the said Board upon the said several matters with respect to which he was directed to inquire, and upon certain other matters with respect to which he deemed it expedient to report for the purposes of that Act;

"And copies of the said report, accompanied by a notice, stating that written statements might be forwarded to the said Board with respect to any matter contained in or omitted from the said report or any amendment proposed to be made therein, have been duly published and deposited as directed by the said Public Health Act, and the time for forwarding such statements has now elapsed;
