Y a Bark arrived here from *C reliari* we have advice, that two Gallies of that Kingdom have taken off of *Corfica*, after a Fight of feveral hours, a great *Turkifb* Bark which had on board 130 Men. The Letters from *Rome* of the 30th paft tell us, that the Troops the Pope fends to the allifance of the *Venerians* in the *Morea*, began their march the 27th of the laft Month towards *Civita Vecch.a*, where they are to embarque on the Gallies which will then fail for *Meffina*, to joyn with those of *Malta* and *Tufcany*.

Milan, May 8. Most of the Nobility here have, at the defire of the Count de *Frienfalida* our new Governor, put themselves into the Spanish Fashlen, and will go habited fo for the future. The Count de Melgar is still here, but intends to go very fuddenly to Venice, where he will stay forme, time before he begins his Embassy to Rome. Lagborn, May 1. The 27th pass arrived in this

Leghorn, May 1. The 27th paft arrived in this Port the Gally called the St. Georg., which the Republick of Genaus jends to join with the Popes Gallies; And the next day the failed again for *Civita Vecchia*. The Gallies and Galliots of the Great Duke of Tulcany which are to ferve againft the Turks, will fet fail to morrow, having on board Soo Land Soldiers.

Venice, May 7. Some new railed Troops arrived this week at the Lido, which will embark the next week for the Levant, The Chief Ingenier will part at the fame time with a great many Gunners; This Convoy will be compoled of four Marfilianes, and eleven Veffels laden with Provisions and Ammunition. We have advice by a Veffel come from D.dmaria, that the Proveditor General Cormaro had detached Signior Michieli, General of the Horfe, with fome Troops to obferve the Turks, who were drawing together near Narentia By a Bark which came from Corfou the 28th of the laft Month, we are informed, that the Captain General was with the Flect at Porto Trapano.

Zolkicin, April 17. The King of Poland re-turned hither the 12th Instant from Lemberg, and intends to go in few days to Jawarcu, where a great Council of War will be held to take the laft Refolutions concerning the Operations of the Campagne. The Troops that are to compose the Army of this Crown, are ordered to Rendezvous the 8th of the next Month at four leveral places, from whence they will march to the General Rendezvous which is appointed near Snintin. The King has received Advices from Valachia, which confirm, That the Turks have built two Bridges over the Danube; That the Grand Visier was going for Hingary, to command in perion the Ostoman Arnay on that fide; And that the Tarkars are to join with the Forces that are to act against this Grown. They write from Leopol, That a Party of Cossacks have lately cut in pieces 400 Tarsars near Baar, and that] they havotaken a great manyPrifoners, and 200 head of Cattle. We are with great impatience expecting a farther Account from our Ambaffadors at M/conv, of the Progrefs they have made in their Negotiation at that Court; It's feared that $t \in M/$ ov res taking advantage of the prefent Conjuncture, and the great defire this Crown has to make at this time an Alliance with them, will flart fome new Pretenfions.

Vienna, May 8. The Imperial Troops are marching from all fides to the General Rendezvous between the Rivers Wacg and Grin, where they are ordered to be the 20th of this Month. The chief Army commanded by the Duke of Lorrain, will be composed of 14000 Imperial Foot, and 12000 Horfe, and of the Troops of Saxony, Brandenburgh, and Suddia, and 3000 Hum, grans, which will make together 55000 Men; The Count de Caprara, and the Count de Staremburg; are to command under the Duke of Lorrain as Marefchal de Camp Generals, the Duke de Croy is to be General of the. Foot, Prince Louis of Neuburgh and the Count de Suse Lieutenant-Generals; and the Baron de Tinghen, the Baron de Thun, and the Marquis Nigrelly Major Generals ; The Count de Schultz, and Count Duneuraldt, are to be Gene-rals of the Horfe, Count Taffe, Count P.tlf, and the Baron de Mercy Lieutenant-Generals, and Count Philip de Thaun, the Baron de Lodron, and the Count de Stirum Major-Generals. A Detachement of five Regiments will be fent from this Army, to join with the Troops of Croatia on the Drave. The Army commanded by the Elector of Bavariatwill be of 35000 Men, there will be 11000 Imperial Foot, and 8000 Horfe, with his Electoral Highneffes own Troops, and thole of Francoma, and 2500 Hungarians; Count Leflie is to cortinand under his Electoral Highness, as Mareschal de Camp General, Count Serim will be General of the Foot, the Marquis de la Vergne, and the Count de Scherffemberg Lieutenant Generals, and the Baron de Wallis, the Baron de Becke, and the Count d'Aspre-mont Major-Generals, Prince Lours of Baden is to be General of the Horie, Count Caraffa and Count Gondola Lieutenant-Generals, and Count Piccolomini, Count Veterani, and the Baron Heu-Sler Major-Generals. The 7th Inftant, 12 great pieces of Cannon for Battery were fent from hence by water for Hungary; The fame day arrived here two large Veffels with Ammunition from Ratisbonne; and Boats pass daily down the River laden with Provisions and all forts of Ammunition. The Siege of Mongatz is raifed, it having been thought fit to Mongarz is rancu, it naving occur chought in the continue only the Blockade, which was begun about five Months ago. General *Caprara* has drawn the Garilons out of *E/peries*, *Bartfeldt*, and fome other places in *Upper Hungary*, the Fortifications of which are ordered to be demolified. The laft Letters from the Count de Scherffemberg left him on his march towards Claufemburg. The news of the defea

of the Tinks by the Baron de Mercy, and Gr-General Heusler near Segedin, is confirmed. The Advices from the Turk for Territories fay, that the Grand Willer is expected at Belgradel the 10th of this Month with the Troops of Alias which may make about 40000 Men; That there is at prefent a Garilon of 9000 Men in Buda, and that Agria is likewife very well provided. The Hopes we had of the Molcovites entring into the War against the Turks are very much leffened, fince the arrival of the last Letters from Mo/com.

Berlin, May 7. We have advice that the Forces of our Elector are advanced as far as Breflan in Silefia in their march to Hungary. The Troops of Saxony have taken their march through Bohemia. The Landtgrave of Heffe Caffel is expected here in few days. They write from Poland, that great preparations are making in that Kingdoni for the Campagne; but that it will be the beginning of the next Month before the Army will be in the Field; The Troops are to allemble in diffinct Bodies at Stry, Stanifluw and Trembowia, from whence they will march to the general Rendezvous

Hamburgh, May 14. The Magistrates and Coun-cil of 30 of this City, not having received the Anfiver they expected to the refpectful Letter they lately writ to the Duke of Zell, to defire him to withdraw his Troops that ftill continue within their Territories, refolved, we are told, at their laft meeting, to make use of Force to oblige them to quit the Posts they are full possessed of. The Danifh Troops, that are quartered in the Ifles of Pente, Wedel and Rebrocke, have orders to retire from thence. Our Députies at Vienna have received a Command from the Emperor not to leave that City, till they have given fatisfaction upon the complaints made against them. The Landtgrave of Heffe Caffel's arrived at Berlin. They write from Stockbolme, that the King of Sweden had given or-ders for 46000 Men of his Troops to encamp this Summer near Lundun in the Province of Scho-

Cologna, May 18. The Imperial Sub-Commiffioners have within these few days examined feveral times the old Burghermasters Bilftein and Rodenkirken, who are now Prisoners here ; but it is not yet known what Proceeding will be had againft them. The Bishop of Strasburgh is at Liege; it's uncertain whither he will go from thence to Bonne, or return to France. The Electors of Mentz and Trier are flill expected at Borne, to confer with the Elector of Cologne; There will be at this meeting Ministers from the Emperor, and the Elector Palatin. The Letters from Hungary fay, That the Imperialists at the late Deftat of the Turks near Segedin, took a great deal of rich Booty, as Horfes, Furniture, and Money. We are told from Vienna, That the defign of befieging Agria is for the pre-fent laid alide, and that it was believed the Imperial Army would march directly to Buda, and fer down before that place.

Hague, May 24. The Sieur Raule, Intendant of the Marine to the Elector of Brandenburgh, has had feveral Conferences with the Deputies of the States, and those of the West-Hidra Company of this Countrey. The Count de Stirum is gone to the Texel, in order to fet Sail with the Ships de-The figned under his Command for the Streights. Count de Solms returned hither yesterday from Germany. We are told from Berlin, That the Ele-ctor of Brandenburgh has refolved to pais greateft part of the Summer at Cleves. There are Letters' from Moleon which fay, that the Polific Ambailadors were upon their departure from thence; with itle fuccels in their Negotiation.

Paris, May 25. The King has refolved to part from hence the 6th of the next Month to go to the Bath at Barrege.; Part of the Regiment of Guards that is to attend his Majesty there, begin their march this day. The Letters from Spain tell us, that the difference abouts the 500000 Crowns raifed in the West-Indies is quite made up. They write from Porsugal, that a Marriage is treating between the King of Portugal, and a Prince's of Neuburgh, Daughter to the Elector Palatin.
