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Genova, May 7.

BY a Bark arrived here from *Cagliari* we have advice, that two Gallies of that Kingdom have taken off of *Corfica*, after a Fight of several hours, a great Turkish Bark which had on board 130 Men. The Letters from *Rome* of the 30th past tell us, that the Troops the Pope sends to the assistance of the *Venicians* in the *Morca*, began their march the 27th of the last Month towards *Civita Vecchia*, where they are to embark on the Gallies which will then sail for *Messina*, to joyn with those of *Malta* and *Tuscany*.

Milan, May 8. Most of the Nobility here have, at the desire of the Count de *Menalida* our new Governor, put themselves into the Spanish Fashion, and will go habited so for the future. The Count de *Melgar* is still here, but intends to go very suddenly to *Venice*, where he will stay some time before he begins his Embassy to *Rome*.

Laghorn, May 1. The 27th past arrived in this Port the Gally called the *St. George*, which the Republick of *Genova* sends to joyn with the Popes Gallies; And the next day she sailed again for *Civita Vecchia*. The Gallies and Galliot of the Great Duke of *Tuscany* which are to serve against the *Turks*, will set sail to-morrow, having on board 800 Land Soldiers.

Venice, May 7. Some new raised Troops arrived this week at the *Lido*, which will embark the next week for the *Levant*. The Chief Ingenier will part at the same time with a great many Gunners; This Convoy will be composed of four *Marsiliques*, and eleven Vessels laden with Provisions and Ammunition. We have advice by a Vessel come from *Dalmatia*, that the Proveditor General *Cornaro* had detached Signior *Michiel*, General of the Horse, with some Troops to observe the *Turks*, who were drawing together near *Narenta*. By a Bark which came from *Corfou* the 28th of the last Month, we are informed, that the Captain General was with the Fleet at *Porto Trapano*.

Zolkiew, April 17. The King of *Poland* returned hither the 12th Instant from *Lemberg*, and intends to go in few days to *Jawarow*, where a great Council of War will be held to take the last Resolutions concerning the Operations of the Campaign. The Troops that are to compose the Army of this Crown, are ordered to Rendezvous the 8th of the next Month at four several places, from whence they will march to the General Rendezvous which is appointed near *Smiatin*. The King has received Advices from *Valachia*, which consist, That the *Turks* have built two Bridges over the *Danube*; That the Grand Visier was going for *Hungary*, to command in person the *Ottoman* Army on that side; And that the *Tatars* are to joyn with the Forces that are to act against this Crown. They write from *Leopol*, That a Party of *Cossacks* have lately cut in pieces 400 *Tatars* near *Baar*, and that

they have taken a great many Prisoners, and 200 head of Cattle. We are with great impatience expecting a farther Account from our Ambassadors at *Moscow*, of the Progress they have made in their Negotiation at that Court; It's feared that the *Moscovites* taking advantage of the present Conjunction, and the great desire this Crown has to make at this time an Alliance with them, will start some new Pretensions.

Vienna, May 8. The Imperial Troops are marching from all sides to the General Rendezvous between the Rivers *Wag* and *Gron*, where they are ordered to be the 20th of this Month. The chief Army commanded by the Duke of *Lorraine*, will be composed of 14000 Imperial Foot, and 12000 Horse, and of the Troops of *Saxony*, *Brandenburgh*, and *Suabia*, and 3000 *Hungarians*, which will make together 55000 Men; The Count de *Caprara*, and the Count de *Seavernberg*; are to command under the Duke of *Lorraine* as Marschal de Camp Generals, the Duke de *Croy* is to be General of the Foot, Prince *Louis* of *Neuburgh* and the Count de *Suse* Lieutenant-Generals; and the Baron de *Timbhen*, the Baron de *Thun*, and the Marquis *Nigrelly* Major Generals; The Count de *Schulez*, and Count *Dunewaldt*, are to be Generals of the Horse, Count *Taffe*, Count *Paffi*, and the Baron de *Mercy* Lieutenant-Generals, and Count *Philip de Thun*, the Baron de *Lodron*, and the Count de *Stimm* Major-Generals. A Detachment of five Regiments will be sent from this Army, to joyn with the Troops of *Croatia* on the *Drave*. The Army commanded by the Elector of *Bavaria* will be of 35000 Men, there will be 11000 Imperial Foot, and 8000 Horse, with his Electoral Highnesses own Troops, and those of *Franconia*, and 2500 *Hungarians*; Count *Leslie* is to command under his Electoral Highness, as Marschal de Camp General, Count *Sprun* will be General of the Foot, the Marquis de la *Vergne*, and the Count de *Scherffenberg* Lieutenant-Generals, and the Baron de *Wallich*, the Baron de *Becke*, and the Count d' *Aspremont* Major-Generals, Prince *Louis* of *Baden* is to be General of the Horse, Count *Caraffa* and Count *Gondola* Lieutenant-Generals, and Count *Piccolomini*, Count *Vetevani*, and the Baron *Heister* Major-Generals. The 7th Instant, 12 great pieces of Cannon for Battery were sent from hence by water for *Hungary*; The same day arrived here two large Vessels with Ammunition from *Ratisbonne*; and Boats pass daily down the River laden with Provisions and all sorts of Ammunition. The Siege of *Mongatz* is raised, it having been thought fit to continue only the Blockade, which was begun about five Months ago. General *Caprara* has drawn the Garisons out of *Esperes*, *Barfeldt*, and some other places in *Upper Hungary*, the Fortifications of which are ordered to be demolished. The last Letters from the Count de *Scherffenberg* left him on his march towards *Clausenburgh*. The news of the defeat

of the *Turks* by the Baron de Mercy, and General Heuster near *Segedin*, is confirmed. The Advice from the *Turkish* Territories say, that the Grand *Vizier* is expected at *Belgrade* the 10th of this Month with the Troops of *Asia* which may make about 40000 Men; That there is at present a Garrison of 9000 Men in *Buda*, and that *Agria* is likewise very well provided. The Hopes we had of the *Moscovites* entering into the War against the *Turks* are very much lessened, since the arrival of the last Letters from *Moscow*.

Berlin, May 7. We have advice that the Forces of our Elector are advanced as far as *Breslau* in *Silesia* in their march to *Hungary*. The Troops of *Saxony* have taken their march through *Bohemia*. The Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel* is expected here in few days. They write from *Poland*, that great preparations are making in that Kingdom for the Campaign; but that it will be the beginning of the next Month before the Army will be in the Field; The Troops are to assemble in distinct Bodies at *Stry*, *Stranislau* and *Trembowia*, from whence they will march to the general Rendezvous.

Hamburg, May 14. The Magistrates and Council of 30 of this City, not having received the Answer they expected to the respectful Letter they lately writ to the Duke of *Zell*, to desire him to withdraw his Troops that still continue within their Territories, resolved, we are told, at their last meeting, to make use of Force to oblige them to quit the Posts they are still possessed of. The Danish Troops, that are quartered in the Isles of *Peute*, *Wedel* and *Rebrocke*, have orders to retire from thence. Our Deputies at *Vienna* have received a Command from the Emperor not to leave that City, till they have given satisfaction upon the complaints made against them. The Landgrave of *Hesse Cassel* is arrived at *Berlin*. They write from *Stockholm*, that the King of *Sweden* had given orders for 16000 Men of his Troops to encamp this Summer near *Lindun* in the Province of *Schonen*.

Cologne, May 18. The Imperial Sub-Commissioners have within these few days examined several times the old Burghermasters *Bilstein* and *Rodenkirken*, who are now Prisoners here; but it is not yet known what Proceeding will be had against them. The Bishop of *Strasbourg* is at *Liege*; it's uncertain whether he will go from thence to *Borne*, or return to *France*. The Electors of *Menz* and *Trier* are still expected at *Borne*, to confer with the Elector of *Cologne*; There will be at this meeting Ministers from the Emperor, and the Elector Palatin. The Letters from *Hungary* say, That the Imperialists at the late Defeat of the *Turks* near *Segedin*, took a great deal of rich Booty, as Horses, Furniture, and Money. We are told from *Vienna*, That the design of besieging *Agria* is for the present laid aside, and that it was believed the Imperial Army would march directly to *Buda*, and set down before that place.

Hague, May 24. The Sieur *Raule*, Intendant of the Marine to the Elector of *Brandenburgh*, has had several Conferences with the Deputies of the States, and those of the *West-India* Company of this Countrey. The Count de *Serrum* is gone to the *Texel*, in order to set Sail with the Ships designed under his Command for the *Streights*. The Count de *Solms* returned hither yesterday from *Germany*. We are told from *Berlin*, That the Elector of *Brandenburgh* has resolved to pass greatest part of the Summer at *Cleves*. There are Letters from *Moscow* which say, that the *Polsish* Ambassadors were upon their departure from thence; with little success in their Negotiation.

Paris, May 25. The King has resolved to part from hence the 6th of the next Month to go to the Bath at *Saxege*; Part of the Regiment of Guards that is to attend his Majesty there, begin their march this day. The Letters from *Spain* tell us, that the difference about the 500000 Crowns raised in the *West-Indies* is quite made up. They write from *Portugal*, that a Marriage is treating between the King of *Portugal*, and a Princess of *Neuburgh*, Daughter to the Elector Palatin.
