AT the Court at *Windsor*, the 27th day of *November*, 1852,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled "An Act for carrying into effect the reports of the Commissioners appointed to consider the state of the Established Church in England and Wales, with reference to ecclesiastical duties and revenues, so far as they relate to episcopal dioceses, revenues, and patronage," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the nineteenth day of November, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty, King William the Fourth, intituled 'An Act for carrying into effect the reports of the Commissioners appointed to consider the state of the Established Church in England and Wales, with reference to ecclesiastical duties and revenues, so far as they relate to episcopal dioceses, revenues, and patronage,' have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for apportioning and regulating the sums to be hereafter paid by the respective archbishops and bishops in England and Wales, in respect of first fruits and tenths.

"Whereas it is by the said Act provided, that so soon as the relative values of the several sees, under the new arrangements therein referred to, shall have been ascertained, apportionment be made of the sums to be thereafter paid by the respective bishops for first fruits, so as to leave the aggregate amount payable from all the sees to the Bounty of Queen Anne the same as at present; and that the tenths to be thereafter payable by the respective bishops be regulated by the amount of the first fruits payable under the preceding provision:

"And whereas by the same Act we are authorized and empowered to recommend and propose, in any scheme for carrying into effect the provisions thereof, such measures as may, upon further

inquiry, appear to us to be necessary for carrying such provisions into full and perfect effect; and to propose in any such scheme such modifications or variations, as to matters of detail and regulation, as shall not be substantially repugnant to such provisions:

"And whereas the relative annual values of the several sees under the new arrangements mentioned in the said Act, have been ascertained, to be the several sums set opposite to the names of the respective sees in the schedule hereunto annexed:

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, that the sums to be paid by the respective archbishops and bishops, for first fruits and tenths, shall be apportioned and regulated in manner following; that is to say: that from and after the next avoidance of each see, there shall be paid by the archbishop or bishop, as the case may be, who shall succeed thereto, in lieu and in full satisfaction and substitution of and for all sums of money now by law payable by such archbishop or bishop in respect of first fruits, and whether first fruits have been heretofore payable by such archbishop or bishop or not, an annual sum of money, free from all deductions whatsoever, to be calculated after the rate of one pound for every hundred pounds of the annual income so ascertained as aforesaid, for his see, and set opposite to the name thereof in the said schedule; and that with respect to all archbishops and bishops, who shall have been appointed to their sees since the first day of January, in the year one thousand eight hundred and thirty-six, and also all archbishops and bishops who shall be hereafter appointed, there shall be paid by each of such archbishops and bishops in full satisfaction and substitution of and for all sums of money now by law payable by the archbishops and bishops of such sees respectively, in respect of tenths, and whether tenths have been heretofore payable by such archbishops and bishops respectively, or not, an annual sum of money, free from all deductions whatsoever, to be calculated after the rate of seventeen shillings and sixpence for every hundred pounds of the annual income so fixed as aforesaid for the see of such archbishop or bishop, and set forth in the said schedule as aforesaid; and that all the said annual sums shall be payable and paid to the receiver for the time being of first fruits and tenths on such days, at such times, and in such manner, as tenths are now payable.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall alter or affect the

liability of any archbishop or bishop to the payment of first fruits and tenths, or shall alter or affect any laws, rules, or regulations now in force relating thereto, except as is herein expressly provided; and that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the several matters aforesaid, or any of them, in conformity with the provisions of the said Act or of any other Act of Parliament.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the respective Registrars of the dioceses of Canterbury, York, London, Durham, Winchester, Saint Asaph, Bangor, Bath and Wells, Carlisle, Chester, Chichester, Saint David's, Ely, Exeter, Gloucester and Bristol, Hereford, Lichfield, Lincoln, Llandaff, Manchester, Norwich, Oxford, Peterborough, Ripon, Rochester, Salisbury, and Worcester. *C. WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled “An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, the fourth report of the “Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and “Revenues,” and of another Act, passed in the

session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled “An Act “to explain and amend two several Acts relating “to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for Eng- “land,” and of another Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled “An Act to alter “and amend the law relating to Ecclesiastical “houses of residence,” duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the fourth day of November in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

“We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled, ‘An Act ‘to carry into effect, with certain modifications, ‘the fourth report of the Commissioners of Eccle- ‘siastical Duties and Revenues,’ and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled ‘An Act to explain and amend two ‘several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Com- ‘missioners for England,’ and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifth and sixth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled, ‘An Act to alter and amend the law ‘relating to ecclesiastical houses of residence,’ have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for substituting a money payment for certain property belonging to the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Carlisle.

“Whereas it was by the said recited Acts enacted and declared that, by the authority of a scheme prepared by us and ratified by an Order of your Majesty in Council, and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions of the said first recited Act, any sum of money which should have been invested in the public funds or in other security or securities, in trust for any ecclesiastical body, corporate, aggregate, or sole, might, upon application in writing to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, under the hand and seal of such body corporate, and in the case of any chapter with the consent of the visitor thereof, be directed to be sold, and the same shall be sold accordingly, and that the produce of such sale should be applied to such purpose, and in such manner, as should appear most conducive to the permanent benefit of such body corporate; and also, that for any like purpose any arrangement might be made with the consent in writing under the corporate seal of any chapter, for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments belonging to such chapter, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting, in any case, any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments; and that the aforesaid provisions, relating to the sale and application of any sum of money invested in trust for any ecclesiastical body corporate, did and should include and apply to all moneys and securities for money, and to all stock in the Government funds or elsewhere, standing in the name of the Accountant General of the Court of Chancery, or in the name or names of any other public officer, or of any individual or individuals, for or to the credit of or in trust for any bishop, dean and chapter, dean, or canon, whether for the purpose of being laid out in land or otherwise:

“And whereas the said Dean and Chapter are seised in fee of divers manors, lands, tithes, tene-

ments and hereditaments, the whole or the greater part of which have been heretofore demised on leases for years, at small annual reserved rents and upon payment of fines, and they are also beneficially interested in or otherwise entitled to certain sums of stock or cash, invested or held in trust as aforesaid, and particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed marked D.:

"And whereas there has not heretofore been any fund specially applicable to the maintenance of the fabric of the said cathedral church and other public buildings of the abbey, but by an order and decree of the said Dean and Chapter, bearing date the second day of this instant month of November, and duly confirmed as a statute by their visitor, and registered in the registry of the said Dean and Chapter, the rent charges awarded to the said Dean and Chapter in lieu of the tithes of certain townships in the parish of Hesket on the Forest, in the county of Cumberland, and particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked A., have been permanently appropriated towards providing such a fund for the future:

"And whereas it has been made to appear to us that by reason of the great antiquity of the said church, and of the want of due reparation in times past, it has become necessary to expend thereon forthwith such a sum of money as cannot be wholly charged on the present dean and canons:

"And whereas we have ascertained, by a careful survey and estimate, that the sum so required to be forthwith expended in such repairs, and in effecting improvements conducive to the security of the said cathedral church, amounts to fifteen thousand pounds, or thereabouts:

"And whereas one of the purposes of the said Acts is to provide a fund for making better provision for the cure of souls, and the said Dean and Chapter have proposed to us, with the consent of their visitor, that the said manors, lands, tithes, tenements, and hereditaments, stock, and cash, should be dealt with in manner hereinafter mentioned, and we are of opinion that it would ultimately conduce as well to the improvement of the said fund as to the permanent benefit of the said Dean and Chapter, that the same should be dealt with accordingly:

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Dean and Chapter of the cathedral church of Carlisle, and of the Honourable and Right Reverend Hugh, Bishop of Carlisle, as visitor of the said Dean and Chapter, testified by their having hereunto affixed their respective corporate seals, we humbly recommend and propose that, in consideration of the money payments hereinafter mentioned to be paid by us to or on account of the said Dean and Chapter, all the manors, lands, tithes, tenements and hereditaments which now belong, either in possession or reversion, to the said Dean and Chapter (excepting any right of ecclesiastical patronage, and excepting also the lands, tenements, tithes, and premises described in the schedules hereunto annexed, marked respectively A. and E., together with so much of the precincts of the said cathedral church as are not particularly described in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked B.); and all the estate and interest therein of the said Dean and Chapter shall, upon and from the day on which any Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this scheme, shall be duly published in the London Gazette, and without any other conveyance or assurance in the law, become and be transferred to and vested in us and our successors; and that we and they shall thereupon become and be absolutely seized or

possessed of the same in fee, and shall be entitled to the rents, profits, and proceeds thereof, as from the twenty-ninth day of September now last past; and that in part consideration of and for such transfer and conveyance there shall, on the first day of May and the first day of November in every year, be paid by us to the said Dean and Chapter in respect of the half year then last past, the sum of two thousand eight hundred and forty pounds, subject to such outgoings as are hereinafter mentioned, and that the receipt or receipts of the treasurer for the time being of the said Dean and Chapter shall be a good and valid discharge to us for all or any and every such sum or sums of money as shall therein be expressed to have been paid to him by us under the authority of such Order as aforesaid; and that upon the gazetting of such Order there shall be paid by us to the said Dean and Chapter the sum of two thousand pounds, as well in respect of the period between the said twenty-ninth day of September and the first day of November now last past, as of certain sums which would have accrued to the said Dean and Chapter if this scheme had not been passed:

"And we further recommend and propose that, as a further consideration for the said transfer and conveyance, there shall be forthwith paid and expended by us in effecting such repairs of the said cathedral church and improvements as aforesaid, according to plans and specifications to be approved by us and by the said Dean and Chapter, the said sum of fifteen thousand pounds, for which due allowance has been made in fixing the amount of the annuity so to be paid to the said Dean and Chapter as aforesaid:

"And we further recommend and propose that the liability now attaching to the said Dean and Chapter, in respect of the annual outgoings and charges enumerated and set forth in the schedule hereunto annexed, marked C., shall remain with such Dean and Chapter, to be paid and discharged by them out of the said half-yearly money payment so to be received from us; and that they shall also pay thereout to the clerk of the said Dean and Chapter the annual sum of one hundred and eighty pounds, in respect of the profits heretofore accruing to him on account of the management of the estates herein proposed to be transferred to us:

"And we further recommend and propose, that none of the moneys or estates to be received or acquired under the provisions of this scheme, shall be applicable to the purposes of our common fund, except only so far as it may be necessary to reimburse such fund any advances made thereout under the provisions of this scheme, until or unless by and under the like authority the said Dean and Chapter shall have been put into possession in fee simple of real estates within the counties of Cumberland, Westmoreland, or Northumberland, any or either of them, sufficient to secure to the said Dean and Chapter a clear annual income (after deducting rates, taxes, and other outgoings, including costs of management) of five thousand nine hundred pounds, or such other sum as at the date of such transfer shall, by the decision of arbitrators, to be appointed in the usual way, be equivalent to the sum of five thousand nine hundred pounds at the present time, subject however as well to the charges and outgoings mentioned in the said schedule marked C. as to all other capitular liabilities:

"And we further recommend and propose, with the like consent of the said Dean and Chapter, and of their visitor, that the said sums of stock and cash so described as aforesaid in the said

schedule marked D. shall, as soon as conveniently may be after the gazetting of such Order as aforesaid, be sold out or transferred, and the same or the proceeds thereof, be paid to our account at the Bank of England, to be applied towards the objects of this scheme, and particularly to investment in the purchase of any interest in the estates herein proposed to be transferred to us, or any or either of them, or of any other real estates:

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any further or other measures relating to the matters aforesaid in conformity with the said Acts, or either of them, or of any other Act of Parliament.

"And also all that burgage house and garth, or garden or yard behind the same, in Castle-street, Carlisle, containing in front thirty-five feet and two inches, and leased by indenture, bearing date the twenty-third day of June, one thousand eight hundred and forty-one, to William Nanson, for the term of forty years.
