Limits of Port and Legal Quay.

WE, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby, under the authority of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the ninth and tenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the Customs," appoint Teignmouth to be a port in that part of the said United Kingdom called England; and we do hereby declare that the limits of the said port shall commence at Langstone Point, in the county of Devon, being the western limit of the port of Exeter, and shall extend from thence in a southerly direction to a point of land in the said county, called Galmpton Point, at the south end of Broad Sands, in the bay of Torbay, being the eastern extremity of the port of Dartmouth, and shall include all bays, channels, roads, bars, strands, harbours, havens, rivers, streams, creeks and places within the said limits contained, and shall extend out to sea a distance of three miles from low water mark along the coast within the aforesaid limits.

And we the said Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury do hereby appoint the following places within the said port of Teignmouth to be a legal quay for the lading and unlading of goods; and we do hereby declare the bounds and extent of such quay to be as follows; that is to say:

All that open place, quay, or wharf at Teignmouth, commonly called or known as the New Quay, situate in East Teignmouth, being in length on the north side, one hundred and fifty-one feet, and on the south side, one hundred and thirty-five feet, and in breadth, eighty-nine feet, and except so much thereof as forms the site of the present store thereon.

Limits of Port.

WE, the undersigned, Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby, under the authority of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the ninth and tenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the laws relating to the Customs," appoint Exeter to be a port in that part of the said United Kingdom called England; and we do hereby declare that the limits of the said port shall commence at the boundary post on the beach which divides the parishes of Axmouth and Seaton, in the county of Devon, being the western boundary of the port of Lyme, and shall extend from thence in a westerly and southerly direction along the coast to Langstone Point, in the said county, being the eastern extremity of the port of Teignmouth, and as far up the River Exe as the bridge of the town of Exeter, and including the said river, together with all bays, channels, roads, bars, strands, harbours, havens, rivers, streams, creeks, and places within the said limits contained, and shall extend out to sea a distance of three miles from low water mark along the coast within the aforesaid limits.

And we, the said Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do hereby, under the powers contained in the said recited Act, annul all former limits of the port of Exeter.

Limits of Port.

WE, the undersigned Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, do hereby, under the authority of an Act passed in the session of Parliament holden in the ninth and tenth years of the reign of Her present Majesty Queen Victoria, intituled "An Act to amend the Laws relating to the Customs," appoint Dartmouth to be a port in that part of the United Kingdom called England; and we do hereby declare that the limits of the said port shall commence at a point of land in the county of Devon called Galampton Point, being the western limit of the port of Teignmouth, and shall extend from thence to a point of land called Berry Head; from thence, in a southerly direction, to a rock near the entrance of the River Dart, called Mew Stone; from thence to a point of land called Start Point; from thence, in a westerly direction, to Bolt Head westward of Salcombe; and

from thence, in a westwardly direction, to the east side of Erme Mouth, in Bigbury Bay, being the eastern limit of the port of Plymouth, and shall include all bays, channels, roads, bars, strands, harbours, havens, rivers, streams, creeks, and places within the said limits contained, and shall extend out to sea a distance of three miles from low water mark along the coast within the aforesaid limits.

And we, the said Lords Commissioners, of Her Majesty's Treasury do hereby, under the authority of the said recited Acts, annul all former limits of the said port of Dartmouth.

NEW INNER LIGHT IN CORK HARBOUR, SOUTH COAST OF IRELAND.

THE Corporation for Preserving and Improving the Port of Dublin hereby give notice, that a Lighthouse has been erected on the Spit Bank, in Cork Harbour, from which a Light will be exhibited on the evening of the 1st of March 1853, and thereafter will be lighted every night from sun-set to sun-rise.

Specification given of the position and appearance of the Light by Mr. Halpin, Inspector of Lighthouses:—

Spit Bank Lighthouse is erected on the North East point of the bank, in lat. 51 deg. 50 min. 41 sec. N. and long. 8 deg. 16 min. 20 sec. W. and bears

The Lighthouse is placed in a depth of 9 feet water at low water, and is based on screw piles, forming, with the bracing, an open framing, coloured red. The superstructure in dwelling of octagonal form is coloured light grey.

The Light will be a fixed red light, elevated 32 feet over the level of high water, spring tides, and open to seaward and to the harbour, from S. S. W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W. to N. W. b W. $\frac{1}{2}$ W.

Masters of Vessels are cautioned not to cross the bank between the Lighthouse and Haulbowline Island, and to give the Lighthouse and the detached Beacon Pillar sufficient berth in passing.

After the 1st of March next, the floating light heretofore moored off the North East point of the bank, will be discontinued.
