

# The London Gazette.

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Naples, May 7.

**T**HE Squadron of the Pope's Gallies designed for the assistance of the Venetians which parted from Civita Vecchia the 2d, arrived here the 4th Instant, and will sail again to-morrow for Messina, where they are to join with those of Malta and Tuscany.

Genova, May 12. The Great Council resolved the 9th Instant, to take off the Imposition of four per Cent that was laid about two year ago upon Foreign Wine. We have advice from Corsica, That the two Gallies which brought hither the Count de Fuenfalida, the new Governor of Milan, in their return home, met with an Algerine Vessel, having on Board 130 men, which they took after a Flight of 8 hours.

Madrid, May 23. The 8th Instant the Duke of Mortemar, General of the Gallies of France, arrived before Cadix with a Squadron of 9 Men of War, and the 11th the Marechal d'Estrep with the Ships from West-France. The 14th the whole Fleet, composed of 20 Men of War, besides Fireships and Gallies with Mortars, anchored in the Entrance of the Port, not suffering any Vessel to go in or out, of which the Governor of Cadix has by an Express given the King an account. Orders have been sent to hasten the departure of 500 Seamen which have been raised in Biscaye for the Service of the Spanish Men of War that are sitting at Cadix. The Pope's Nuncio has written to the Chapters of the Cathedral Churches in this Kingdom, about the raising the extraordinary Contribution which has been granted the Emperor for the War against the Turks.

Vienna, May 26. Their Electoral Highnesses of Bavaria are now at Neustadt, where the Elector will make but a very short stay, intending to go the beginning of the next week for Hungary. The Duke of Lorrain was in his Journey thither taken ill at Odenburgh, where he still is; The Emperor has sent his chief Physician and Chirurgion to attend him; This Accident will retard the General Resolutions for some days at least. The Count de Sobatz is, we are told, named by the Emperor to command the Army in Croatia in the place of Count Leslie, who, if his health will permit it, is to command the Army under the Elector of Bavaria; And the Count de Staremberg is to command under the Duke of Lorrain. The designs of the Campaigne are kept very secret, so that all that's said of them is only by conjecture. In the mean time we have advice, that the Turks have reinforced the Garrison in the Town of Essecke to 5000 Men, and that in Buda to 12000, and that these places are besides very well furnished with Ammunition and Provisions. Two days ago arrived here an Express from Upper Hungary with Letters from General Caprara, which give an account, That having left

Mongatz blocked up by 700 Horse under the Command of Colonel Moller, and by the Garrison of Unguar, &c. he was marching with the rest of his Troops to join with those commanded by Lieutenant-General de Mercy, and Major-General Heussler (which are very much harassed with the continual Service they have been upon during the whole Winter), to observe the Turks and Rebels who were drawing what Troops they could together on that side. The same Letters say, That the Rebels in Mongatz began to want Provisions, and that if they were not Relieved, they would in a short time be forced to Capitulate. This week were Embarked here for Hungary six Mortars, and four pieces of Cannon for Battery, the largest that were ever seen here; The Ingenier Gonzalez is recovered of the Hurt he received by the late Accident that hapned in the Arsenal of this City, but three Bombardiers who were hurt at the same time are since dead, and two others lie very ill. The last News we had of the Brandenburg forces was, that they were marching through Silesia; They, as likewise the Troops of Saxony, are expected at the General Rendezvous near Barkan about the 25th of this month. The last Letters from Poland seemed to doubt very much of the good success of their Ambassadors Negotiation at Moscove, but we hope our next will give a better account. The Electoral Prince Palatin arrived here the 16th Instant, and went the next day to Neustadt. A great many Persons of Quality pass daily through this place for Hungary, to serve the Campaigne there.

Hamburg, May 27. The Letters from Copenhagen of the 21 Instant tell us, That 12 Men of War are Equipping there; And that they had Advice from Sweden, that a Squadron of Men of War was likewise fitting out in that Kingdom; But that the Swedish Minister at the Court of Denmark had declared, that the Report of the said Equipage, as well as that of the King of Sweden's intention to send 12000 Men to his Territories in Germany, was without any ground. Several Danish Officers have lately passed through this City, who are going to serve in Hungary. The Letters from Berlin continue to speak of the Elector of Brandenburg's Journey to Cleves.

Cologne, May 31. The Imperial Sub-Commissioners have, in pursuance of the last Orders they received from Vienna, pronounced Sentence against the Sieur Juden, who was formerly Suddick of this City, and Six other persons who are now Prisoners. The first is Banished during his Life; And the rest for a certain number of years; And of these Three are besides to be whipt by the Common Executioner.

Brussels, May 31. The differences between the Two Crowns as well about the Ships that were seized at the Groene and at Malines, as about the money raised in the West-Indies being quite composed, we are expecting to hear that the Seizures of

The Estates of his Catholic Majesties Subjects in the New Conquests are discharged, upon the Instances which the Pope's Nuncio at Paris has made, for that purpose. The Letters from Vienna of the 9th Instant tell us, That the Duke of Lorraine was taken ill with a Fever at Oedemburg; And that the Elector of Bavaria had been likewise indisposed at Neustadt, but was pretty well again. The Advices from the Turkish Territories say, That the Grand Visier was on his march towards Hungary; And that the Turks were drawing together on the side of Croatia, upon which two Imperial Regiments were ordered to march thither, to reinforce the Imperial Troops which are to act on the Drave.

Brussels, June 4. On Saturday last, in the Evening, arrived here, Colonel Porter, Envoy from His Majesty of Great Britain, to Compliment the Marquis de Gastanaga, upon his coming to this Government. The next day his Excellency sent the Captain of his Guards to welcome him; And this morning Colonel Porter had his Publick Audience, with the usual Ceremonies, after which he was entertained very magnificently at Dinner by his Excellency with the Ministers, Generals, and principal of the Nobility. The Count de Sularz is returned from England. Prince William, Eldest Son to the Prince of Nassau, Governor of the Spanish Gelderland, is gone for Hungary, to serve in the Campaigne under his Uncle the Prince of Baden. The Letters from Vienna of the 23d Instant tell us, that the Elector of Bavaria was quite recovered of his Indisposition, and was on his departure for Hungary. That the Duke of Lorraine was still at Oedemburg, but it was hoped would in a day or two be in a condition to continue his Journey; That in the mean time all the General Officers were gone to the General Rendezvous, which, by reason of his Highnesses Indisposition, was put off till the 29th of the last month. It was said at Vienna, That the Count de Staremberg would advance with part of the Army, and besiege Alba Regalis, while the rest of the Forces blocked up Buda, which place they will formally attack, so soon as Alba Regalis is taken. The Elector of Bavaria is to act with the Forces under his Command on the other side of the Danube, and it's still believed he will besiege Atria. The same Letters say, That the Emperor had received an account by an Expres from General Scherffenberg, that Prince Abaz had declared that he will march to the Frontiers, with a whole of his Imperial Army against the Turks. The Letters from Poland say, That the Treaty between that Crown and the Muscovites is quite broken off, and that the Czars had sent Orders to their Minister at the Porte, to acquaint the Grand Signior with their Resolution to continue in Amity and good Correspondence with him.

Hague, June 4. The States of Holland are adjourned till the 13th of this month; They had, it's said, before they separated, some debate about fitting out a Squadron of Men of War to be commanded by Admiral Tromp, but came to no Resolution upon it. The Regiments of Horne, Nassau, and Egel, are ordered to march to Zealand, to reinforce the Garrison of Middleburgh, Vlissinge, Terweer and Terpolen. There will, it's said, be a Review of the Troops of this State on the Veluwe, in the month of July.

Paris, June 8. The 2d Instant, being Whit-funday, was performed the Solemnity of the King's giving first the Order of St. Michael, and afterwards the Blew Ribbon, the Cloak, and Collar of the Order of the Holy Ghost, to the Duke de Chartres, the Duke de Bourbon, the Prince de Conti, and the Duke de Maine. The Business of the 50000 Crowns raised in the West-Indies is quite accommo-

dated, and the French Fleet has Orders to return home. The Marquis de Previlly sailed from Brest the 30th of the last month with 11 Ships under his Command. We have an account that an Algerine Man of War, carrying 24 pieces of Cannon and 120 Men, commanded by Mustafa Reis a Dutch Renegade, was lately Cast away upon the Coast of Brittany. The Sieur Guardou, Ambassador from this Crown at the Porte, had Audience of the Grand Signior the 17th of March last at Adrianople.
