

stance of the Treaty lately concluded by his Deputies here, he would join his Forces with those of his Imperial Majesty against the Turks. The Treaty between the Poles and the Muscovites is quite broken off. Two Imperial Regiments of Foot, and four of Horse, are ordered to march towards Croatia.

*Vienna, May 26.* We have Advice that a Body of Turks, having advanced to the Frontiers of Transylvania, had sent to Prince *Abassi*, to demand the Tribute he used to pay to the Grand Signior, but that he had answered, That since the Port was not able to protect him, it was not reasonable they should expect any Tribute from him. That at the same time Prince *Abassi* had joined his Forces with those commanded by Lieutenant-General *Scherffenberg*, and that they had attacked the Turks, and defeated them, many of the Enemy being killed, and the rest put to flight. They write from Hungary, that the Turks do assemble near *Alba Regalis*, that there are already 4000 Men, and that they expected a considerable Body of *Astiaticks*.

*Francfort, May 28.* There will be a meeting of the Deputies of the Circles of *Bavaria, Suedia, Franconia,* and the *Upper Rhine*, the beginning of the next month at *Ausburgh*, at which the Count *de Hohenloe* will be present on the part of the Emperor. The Advices from Hungary say, That the Turks pretend to have a considerable Army in Croatia this Campaigne, and that therefore several Imperial Regiments were sent to reinforce the Troops that are to act on that side under the Command of General *Schiltz*. The Imperial Army is to Rendezvous the 30th of this month near *Barkan*, and, it's said, their first Enterprize will be against *Alba Regalis*.

*Hamburgh, May 28.* We are told from *Berlin*, That the Elector of *Brandenburgh* had received an account from Lieutenant-General *Schonacke*, that he was entred into Hungary with his Electoral Highnesses Forces under his Command, and that he hoped to be with them at the General Rendezvous the 26th of this month. The News we had from *Stock-holme*, That the King of *Sueden* had resolved to go to *Schonen* to see his Troops which he had ordered to encamp near *Lundum*, is not confirmed. They write from *Warsaw*, That the King of *Poland* will have 10000 *Cossacks* in his Service this Summer, besides those commanded by *Mobila*.

*Brussels, June 7.* We had yesterday our Spanish Letters, which gave an account that the affair of the 500000 Crowns was adjusted; the Marquis *de los Balbaces* having obliged himself to the French Ambassador to pay that Sum at one payment upon the arrival of the Galeons, and that an Express had been thereupon sent by the said Ambassador to the Marechal *d'Estrees*, to give him notice of what was done, and to desire him to retire with the Ships under his Command from before *Cadix*. We expect to have this News confirmed by our next Letters from *Paris*, and to hear at the same time that Orders have been given for the taking off the Seizures on the Spanish Estates in the New Conquests. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 26th past tell us, that the General Rendezvous was to be the 30th of the last month, but that it was doubted the Duke of *Lorraine* could not be present at it, by reason of his Indisposition, which had seized him at *Oedenburg*; He had had 5 Fits of an Ague, and though he had missed his Fit the day the last Letters which were of the 22d came from *Oedenburg*, and that it was hoped he would have no more, yet his Physicians did not think fit he should remove from thence in some days at least. In the mean time

all things were preparing for the opening of the Campaigne, which the common Discourse was, would be begun with the Siege of *Alba Regalis*. The Advices from Hungary say, That the Prince of *Transilvania* had joined his Forces with those commanded by Lieutenant-General *Scherffenberg*, and that they had already had some Action with the Turks, whom they defeated, and afterwards possessed themselves of a Pass called *Hermansburg*.

*Hague, June 11.* The States General have added to their Proclamation for Banishing the English Rebels, that such as do not retire out of these Countries, and the Territories thereof, within 15 days from the date of the said Proclamation, shall be punished with loss of Life and Goods. The Heer *Van Staremborg* was yesterday in the Assembly of the said States to take his Leave, in order to return to his Embassy at the Court of France. The Sieur *Diest*, the *Brandenburgh* Minister, has given in a Memorial about the Arrears of Subsidies that are due to his Electoral Highness from this State. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 30th past tell us, that the Elector of *Bavaria* parted from *Neustadt* the 26th of the same month for *Hungary*, visiting in his way the Duke of *Lorraine* at *Oedenburg*; And that the said Duke was, before these Letters came away, likewise gone to the General Rendezvous, which was put off till the 3d of this month.
