Venice, May 24. The Master of a Vessel which arrived here about the end of the last week from the Morea, reports, that there are but 9001 Turks in Garison at Modon; and that these are in great want of Provisions, being blocked up by the Aluanians inhabiting the Mountains, who have possessed themselves of all the Passages that lead to the place. That the Turks have reinforced the Garifon of Naparino with 200 Janifaries; And that the Serafquier was posted at Nixi with 12000 fighting Men, most Horse. The Turki, com-manded by the Bassa of Arcegovina, after having taken the Fort of Narin, encamped on the River Narenta, where they were attacked by 800 Morlaques, who entred their Camp, and slew divers of the Enemy, but were at last forced to retire with loss. At the same time that the Bassa of Arcegovina marched towards Narin, the Balla of Bossina took likewise the Field with the Troops under his Command, and marched towards Sebenico; but that hindred not the Morlaques from furprizing the Fort. of Chanaver, in which was a Garison of 100 Men. The Governor of Sebenico had a Correspondence in the place, by means whereof the Morlaques entred it almost in fight of the said Bassa, and afterwards faturned to Sebenica with several Prisoners, and a considerable Booty, We are farther told, that the Chevalier Janco had made an Incursion with the Morlaques under his Command into the Enemies Country, where he burnt four or five Villages, and took 200, Prisoners. The Bassa of Arcegoving has, it's said, received Orders to march with his best Troops towards Hungary! We have Letters from Adriable which give an account, that the 12th of April the Grand Vilier caused his Tents to be set up without the Gates of that City; that the 17th the Ago of the Janifaries began his march towards Hingary, and was followed the 19th by the Grand Vilier with a Body of Horse. Brussels, June 11. The Count de Clermont is going for Holland to reside there in the quality of Envoy Extraordinary from the Crown of Spain, in the place of the Marquis de Castel Moncayo, who is named to be Ambassador at Venice. The Letters from Vienna of the 30th past, confirm the news we had of the Prince of Transylvania's having embraced the Emperor's Protection, and joyned his Troops with those of his Imperial Majesty: and add, that he hath put two of his chief Fortresses into the hands of Lieutenant-General Scherffenberg. The fame Letters fay, that the Emperor had received an account from Poland, that the League between that Crown and the Mojcovites is concluded.

Brussels, June 14. The Deputies of Flanders are come hither, to acquaint his Excellency that the States of that Province have granted him for the year enfuing a Subfidy of 22000 Rations a day at 5 Stivers, which comes to 5500 Florins daily, a great Sum, confidering the Losses that Province has fustained. The Nations of this City have been like-wife affembled, and have unanimously agreed to the Continuation of the Import upon Beer. The Letters from Vienna of the 2d Instant tell us, that the Elector of Bavaria and the Duke of Lorrain were gone to the General Rendezvous, where it was believed they would be the 3d or 4th of this

Month, Hag.ie, June 14. The States-General have received an account from their Conful at Cadiz, that the Duke of Mortemar who had with him eight Men of War, having on the 6th of the last Month, met two Ships of this State, commanded by Capt. Menart and Capt. Eurycke, he obliged them to go with him towards Cadizi In the night Capt. Emycke changed his courfe, but was followed by a French Man of War, commanded by the Sieur de Belle Isle, who being come up with him the next Morning, fired several shot at him, Captain Emycks neturned a broad fide, upon which there begun a fharp Fight between them, which dasted several hours, divers being killed and wounded on both fides; at last the Dutch having lost their Captain who was killed with a Cannon shot, and feeing two French Ships more appear, sent on board Monseum Belle Isle, to let him know, that they would take what course he would have them, and accordingly failed with him to the Bay of Cadiz, where they arrived the 22d. That the Mareschal d'Estree who was then before Cadiz, had fent for the Dutch Conful on board, kind had told him, that he was forry for what had happened; but that the fault was the Dutch Captains, who had broke the word he had given the Duke of Mortemar to go with him to Ca-That he had no intention to give any diffurbance to the Subjects of the States General; but on the contrary, to thew them all Priendthips; and that he would give their Merchants Ships that wanted it, a Convoy to fecure them from the Tilrky.

That the Sieur de Belle Isle received the Mesfenger very kindly, and (after having lamented the loss of the Dutch Captain, as of a very brave Man lent him back, and gave the Dutch time till the Evening to repair their Ship, which the French Cap-tain had not much less need of than the other, having 14 Men killed, and 16 wounded. The Amhalfador concludes, That the States will see by this Relation, that Capt. Emycke was the Aggressor, and doubts not but they will disapprove his Conduct; and that they will give fuch Orders to the Commanders of their Ships, that nothing may happen at Sea that may alter the good correspondence his M. C. Majesty will always entertain with this State.
