Naples; May 21.

**T**HE Duke of Mantua arrived here the 19th Instant from Rome; The Marquis del Carpio, our Viceroy, having sent one of his chief Officers to receive and compliment him on the Confinet of the Kingdoms; and going himself to *Aversa*, to meet and welcome his Highness, who being *incognito*, would not receive the Honours his Excellency intended him. at his Entering into this City.

*Venice, June 1.* The 23d past, being *Ascension Day*, the Doge, accompanied with the Senate, and the Ambassadors of the Emperor and of France, performed the accustomed Ceremony of Marrying the Sea; After which he gave a very splendid Entertainment to the whole Company. The Court of *Melgar* is arrived here from *Milan* with the Duke of *Andria*. We have an Account from *Dalmatia*, that the *Bassa* of *Bosnia*, and the *Sangiac* of *Arcegovina*, were on their march towards *Hungary*, not having left above 2000 in their several Garisons in *Dalmatia*. And that the *Morlaques* of *Sebenico* and *Clissa* were no sooner informed of it, but they marched out, and attacked the Fortrets of *Otrich*, not far from *Sing*, which they took, putting 230 *Turks* to the Sword, and releasing about the same number of Christians. The Fleet of this State was, according to our last Advice, at *Porto Giorno*, where the great Convoy that went lately from hence with *General Cornin*, *Sinark* and the Prince of *Brunswick* had joined it: All things were ready for the opening of the Campaign, so that they only stay'd for the Auxiliary Gallies. We have Advice that the *Seraskier* of the *Moraa*, is encamped with 16000 Men between *Nixi* and *Calamata*; And that he had sent 600 *Grecks* to cut down all the Olive Trees about *Coron*.

*Milan, May 23.* The Count de *Eusefalis* our Governor, has reformed ten Companies of Foot, and five Troops of Horse, the Soldiers being put into other Bodies, to compleat them. There are now encamped near *Pavia*, by his Excellencies Order, Eighty Companies of Foot, and Thirty six Troops of Horse.

*Lemburg, May 20.* The *Sieir Potoski*, who is posted on the Frontiers with a small Body of Men to observe the Enemy, has given the King an account that 3000 *Turks* and 4000 *Tartars* are ordered to march with the Convoy prepared at *Jassy* for the Relief of the Garison of *Camuliec*, and desires a Reinforcement of 2000 Horse, with which he hopes he shall be able to dispute their Passage.

The Letters from *Jawar* of the 15th Instant affirm, that the King and the whole Court will part from thence the 22d of this month for *Stry*, where his Majesty will stay about 7 or 8 days, and then go to the General Rendezvous at *Frembowla*. The Forces of *Lithuania* have already begun to draw together not far from that place. The Conclusion of the League with the *Moscovites*, is confirmed by all hands; This Crown yields to them the Palatinates of *Kiovia* and *Smolensko* for ever, in consideration whereof, the Czars are to give a Sum of Money presently, and are to employ their Forces against the Common Enemy. 7 7 7 7

*Breslaw, May 24.* The Letters from *Moscow*, of the 8th Instant, give an Account, that a Treaty of Perpetual Peace and Alliance being concluded between the Czars and the King and Crown of *Poland*, the same was published there the 14th of the same Month with a great deal of Solemnity; And that the Czars had already sent Orders to their Troops to march against the *Turtars*.

*Vienna, June 2.* The Imperial Forces are now at the General Rendezvous, and so soon as the Auxiliary Troops of *Saxony* and *Brandenburg* have joined them, will pass the *Danube* at *Gren*, and march towards *Buda*; but it's not yet known whether they will besiege that place, or *Alba Regalis*. There is in *Buda* a Garison of 14000 Men, of the best Troops, commanded under the *Vicer* of that place by five *Bassas*; The Magazines are filled with Ammunition and Provisions; The Breaches in the Walls are very well repaired, the *Entrenchments* made deeper and wider; and secured with several new Works. And besides, they have made Countermine in such places where they think the Christians may make their Attacks. We have an Account from *Upper Hungary*, that the *Seraskier* was at *Torniswan* with 3000 Men; That *Katkeley* was with him, having been joined by 300 *Hungarians*; And that the *Seraskier* pretends, in a short time, to have an Army of 24000 Men. The 18th of the last Month, the *Bassa* of *Gren Waras* came with 1500 Horse before *St. Joly*, thinking to make some Attempt upon that place, but was so well received by the *Imperialists*, that he was forced to retire with several Wagons filled with wounded Men, having left 300 killed behind him, and being himself dangerously wounded. The Emperor has ordered a Regiment of eight Companies to be formed of the *Spanish* Volunteers.

*Vienna, June 6.* On Saturday last the Duke of *Lorraine* came to *Neustadt* from *Raab*; where upon a Council of War was immediately held in the Emperor's presence, after which his Highness parted again in great haste for *Hungary*. Lieutenant-General *...* arrived the 11th of the last month with

with several Regiments at the General Rendezvous near *Barzan*, and General *Caprera* was expected there the next day. The Forces of *Saxony* being three Regiments of Foot, and two of Horse, passed the *Boog* the 28th near *Scinda*; But those of *Brandenburgh* have not yet passed the Hills of *Fabionca* which lie between *Silesia* and *Hungary*. General *Schulze*, whom the Emperor has named to command his Forces in *Croatia*, is arrived here from his Estate in *Silesia*, and will go the next week to his Command. The private Advices from the *Turkish* Territories say, That the *Turks* cannot bring above 40000 fighting Men into the Field this Summer; And add, That 30000 *Asiaicks* have deserted in their march between *Adrianople* and *Belgrade*. The News of the Conclusion of the League between the *Poles* and the *Moscovites* is confirmed, with these Particulars, That the *Moscovites* are to pay the *Poles* 200000 Crowns, in consideration of their yielding the Cities of *Kiovia* and *Smolensko*, and the Countrey thereon depending; That the *Moscovites* are this Campaigne to give the *Turks* a powerful diversion to hinder them from joining with the *Ottoman* Forces, and that the *Czars* have solemnly promised the next year to employ all their Forces against the *Turks*.

*Hamburg*, June 16. There will be a Review to morrow at *Bowströnde* of the Troops which the King of *Sweden* sends to the Emperor's Assistance; They are to march through *Pomerania* and *Silesia*, and arriving in *Hungary*, are to join with the Forces of *Brandenburgh* under the Command of Lieutenant-General *Suböwink*, as Auxiliary Troops of the Empire. The *Danish* Regiments which are quartered in these Parts, have, we are told, received Orders to remove; And, its said, they will march to morrow. The Baron *de Hornwart*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Emperor, is expected here in few days; He comes, among other things, to require these Magistrates, in his Imperial Majesty's Name, to restore the Estate of the old *Burghers* *Van Meurer*, and to pay the Four hundred thousand *Florins*, pursuant to the Emperor's Decree of April last.

*Brussels*, June 12. The 16th Instant, his Excellency gave Colonel *Rorter* a great Entertainment in the Labyrinth, at which were most of the general Officers and principal Nobility; And perhaps his Excellency shewed him his Horse-Guards, which were drawn out in three Squadrons between the Port and Bridge of *Laken*. To morrow he will have his Audience of Leave. The Letters from *Vienna* of the 6th Instant tell us, That the Elector of *Bavaria* and the Duke of *Lorraine* were arrived at the General Rendezvous, and that the Campaigne would be opened in few days with the Siege of *Alba Regalis*. They write from *Upper Hungary*, That the *Turks* draw together on that side with a design to sack *Mongaux*. We are told, that a strong Party of that *Garison* made lately an Excursion, but were beaten back with considerable loss; and that 700 of them deserted, and took Service with the *Imperialists*.

*Hague*, June 18. The Prince and Princess of *Orange* are gone to *Honstertike*, to pass a Month or six weeks there. The Count *de Clermont* is very suddenly expected here from *Brussels*. It is said that some more Ships are ordered to be fitted out for the Security of our Trade against the *Algerines*.

*Paris*, June 19. The Marquis *de Beufflers* is to command the Camp at *Tartas*, near *Tarbes*; where there are to be about 5000 Horse; Monsieur *de St. Ruth* is to command that on the *Saone*, where there will be the same number of Horse. On the *Saar* there are to encamp nine Regiments of Horse, and one of Dragoons, under the command of Monsieur *Bulonde*. The fourth Camp is to be at *Terrovanc*, commanded by the Count *de Montlron*. These Troops are to encamp two Months. This week were Christned here seven *Turks*, who were taken at *Coron* in the *Morea*; and brought hither by Prince *Philip* of *Savoy*, who was in that Siege a *Volontier*.
