Naples, May 23.

THE Galleys of the great Duke of Tuscany arrived the 19th instant at Nizza; The Admiral Guadi, who commands them, came hither and had a private Audience of our Viceroy; and in the Evening the Galleys sailed again for Sicily, to joyn with those of the Pope and of Malta.

Milan, June 4. The Count de Fuensalida our Governor, being accompanied with the Maistre de Camp General, and the General of the Horse, parted from hence the 30th of the last month for Pavia, to visit the Fortifications of that place, and to take a review of the Troops in Garison there; and went from thence to Alexandria, Valencia, Tortona and Novare, to give Orders for the repairing the Fortifications of those places. After his return hither, his Excellency will take a general review of the Horse in the service of this Dutchy.

Venice, June 1. We have an account, by Letters of the 13th of the last Month, That Prince Maximilian of Brunswick and the Marechal de Comingmarke had joyned the Fleet with the last Convoy that went from hence. That Captain General Morosini had upon their arrival held a Council of War, where it was debated whether they should continue to act in the Morea, or go and attack the Turks in some other parts, but we do not know what Resolutions were taken. The Captain General had sent a Squadron of Men of War to Porto Veralo, with Arms for the Malinotes, who continue to make Incurfions into the Enemies Country. The Parties of the Garison of Coron have lately taken above 30 Prisoners, and several Head of Cattle out of the Neighbourhood of Modon, the Turks of that Garison not daring to stir out of the place to engage them. The same Letters from the Fleet tell us, That the Marquis de Courbon and Count Bernabo Visconti had fought a Duel; That one of them was killed, and the other taken as he endeavoured to make his Escape. The last Advices from Dalmatia said, That the Morlaques, Commanded by the Chevalier Janco, were returned from a new Incurfion they had made into the Territory of Licca, where they had burnt several Villages, and got a rich Booty. The Privateers of Cattaro have taken a Vessel of Dulcigno, in which were 30 Turks who were all made Prisoners. This Day happened here a Fire in the Quarter of St. John and St. Paul, and a great many Houses were burnt.

Marseilles, June 14. We have advice by a Bark of this place, which arrived here yesterday from Sally, that an Algerine had lately taken a Ship of about 200 Tuns, belonging to St. Malo, bound hither with Poor-Jack, and having sunk the Vessel with her Lading, carried the Men and some fine

Goods they found on board, to Sally; but the French Consul there demanded the Men of the Governor, and obtained, it's said, an Order to have them put into his hands. The Duke of Mortemar will in his return from Cadix visit Arrier, Tunis and Tripoli.

Warsaw, May 24. The King of Poland intends to part from hence to morrow for Strig, on the Frontiers of Hungary, whither it's said some Officers are sent by the Emperor to confer with his Majesty concerning the designs of the Campagne. The Troops of this Crown are marching to the general Rendezvous, which will not be held till towards the middle of the next month, for that there will not be Forage sooner for the Horse. The Tartars continue to infest the Frontier Provinces of this Kingdom with their Incurfions.

Vienna, June 6. All the Generals are now with the Army, which was to Rendezvous yesterday near Barkan; The Auxiliary Troops of Saxony are arrived there; but those of Brandenburg, who march very slowly, cannot be there yet in some days; The Count de Dimentaldt is gone by the Emperor's Order towards the Frontiers of Silesia to hasten their march. It is not yet known whether the Campagne will be begun with the Siege of Buda, or Alba Regalis. The first of these Places, as we are informed by some Persons who are lately come from thence, is in a very good Condition; The old Fortifications are repaired, and some new ones built near the Danube; The Ditches are made larger and deeper; They have unpaved the Streets, and covered their Houses with Earth to hinder the effect of our Bombs and Carcasses: In the middle of the Place is a great Cistern of Water, encompassed with a high Wall; The Garison consists of 10000 Janizaries and Spahis, all chosen Men, Commanded by six Bassas, and is provided with Ammunition and Provisions sufficient to support a Siege of Six Months. Some Detachments of the Garisons of Raab, Comar and Velspern, made the last Week an Excursion as far as Buda, from whence they returned with several Prisoners, and a considerable Booty. The Letters from Upper Hungary tell us, That Tockey is with 5000 Men near Temeswarer, and that the Turks are drawing their Troops together to give the Imperialists a Diversion on that side. We have advice, That part of the Ottoman Forces have passed the Bridge of Eschocke; but we do not yet hear that the Grand Visier is arrived at Belgrade.

Vienna, June 9. Their Imperial Majesties are returned hither from Newstadt. The Elector of Bavaria arrived last Monday at Comorra; And the Duke of Lorraine the next day at Raab, from whence they continued their Journey to the general Rendezvous near Barkan. The Auxiliary Troops of Sumbria are at the Rendezvous, but those of Brandenburg will not be there till the 14 or 15 of this month. We have advice that the Bassa of Alba Regalis fearing a Siege, hath burnt the Suburbs of that place.

There are private Letters from *Boyside*, which say, That the Grand Visier was gone back to *Adrianople*, but we cannot give any great credit to them. This being the Emperor's Birth-Day, his I. M. coming into his 47th year, was observed here with great Solemnity.

Ratisbonne, June 4. The States of the Circles of *Franconia* and *Saxonia*, are now assembled, to consider of the Instructions they are to give the Deputies they send to the Conference at *Ausburg*. The Prince of *Waldecke* and the Prince of *Dietrichstein*, have been received into the College of Princes. The Letters from *Hannoy* tell us, That the Imperial Regiments were all arrived at the general Rendezvous; and we expect our next will inform us, that the Army has passed the *Danube*.

Paris, June 12. The Imperial Minister at this Court has complained to his Electoral Highness of the slow march of his Forces, that are to leave this Campaign in *Hungary*; The last news we had of them was, that they had passed the Hills of *Sabauz* on the Frontiers of *Silesia*. His Electoral Highness has declared his intention of going to *Cleves*, to pass part of the Summer there, but has not yet fixed the day for the beginning his Journey. Preparations are making for the celebration of the Marriage between the Duke of *Mecklenbourg-Gustrow* and the Princess *Mary of Brandenburg*.

Hamburg, June 10. They write from *Stockholm*, That an Ambassador was arrived there from the Czars of *Moscow*, who had Audience of the King of *Sweden* the 18th of the last Month, and desired Commissioners might be appointed to renew the Treaty concerning the Separation of the Limits between the two Nations. The Succours which the States of the Dutchy of *Bremen* send to *Hungary*, are on their March under the Command of the Baron *de Bidal*, being 450 Foot, 100 Horse, and 100 Dragoons; At *Stetin* they will join with the Auxiliary Troops of *Pomerania*, which are about the same Number, and so continue their March to *Hungary*. There are Letters from *Jawarow* in *Poland* of the 20th of the last Month, which say, That the Turks had put a great Convoy of Provisions into *Caminica*. The Forces of *Lithuania* and *Rendezvous* near *Bresla*, being 15000 Men.

Hague, June 21. The 19th Instant the Heer *Von Doff*, Envoy Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and the Sieur *Rand*, Intendant of the *Marine* to his Electoral Highness, had a long Conference with the Deputies of the States-General and those of the *Netherlands* Company of this Country, about making some Regulation between the said Company and the Subjects of his Electoral Highness Trading on the Coasts of *Africa*. The States have given Orders for the fitting out Eight Men of War more, which are to join with those that are already gone to the *Straghter*, under the Command of the Count *de Steinn*, to secure our Commerce and Navigation against the *Algerines*. The States of *Holland* are adjourned till the 25th of this Month. The last Letters from *Moscow* told us, That the Czars had sworn with great Solemnity faithfully to observe the Treaty of Perpetual Peace lately concluded between them and the Crown of *Poland*; And that they had given Orders to the General of their Forces to march against the *Tatars*.

Westminster, June 15. *Miles Prance* having last Term pleaded Guilty to an Information exhibited against him for Wilful and Malicious Perjury, as to the Evidence he gave at the Tryals of *Green, Berry* and *Hill*, relating to the Death of *Sir Edmund-bury Godfrey*, he was this Day brought up to the *Kings-Bench* to receive Judgment thereon: And after the Court had admonished him of the Heinous-

ness of his Offence, for which the said *Prance* declared his hearty Sorrow and Repentance, They proceeded to give Judgment as followeth; viz. That he pay a Fine of 1000 l. That he be bound on Monday next to all the Courts of Westminster, with a Paper on his Head declining his Office; And that he stand the same day in the Pillory before Westminster-Hall-Gate; And on Wednesday following at the Royal Exchange; and Monday following at *Charing-Cross*; and that he be Whipt from Newgate to *Tyburn*; And committ'd in Execution until he has paid the Fine.
