## Board of Trade, Whitehall, September 30, 1853.

(Translation.)

THE Council of Public Health of the Kingdom considering the difficulties which have occurred in the sanitary service in consequence of the present classification of *susceptible* goods, mer-chandize, and substances, and wishing, for the benefit of commerce, to obviate, as far as may be compatible with the security of public health, the recurrence of such difficulties, makes known that by virtue of the powers given to it by the 19th Article of the Decree of the 3rd January, 1837, it has resolved as follows; viz. :

1st. Are considered susceptible-

Cotton, raw or manufactured.

Hair, manufactured, or in any other state.

Hemp, raw or manufactured.

Letters, newspapers, and correspondence.

Horse-hair, in any state.

Hides, fresh, dry, or manufactured. Fresh remains of animals.

Wool and flax, raw or manufactured.

Skins and feathers, manufactured or in any other state.

Silk, raw or manufactured.

2nd. All the merchandize and substances mentioned in the preceding Article are subject to quarantine, and to the expurgation prescribed by the regulations in force.

3rd. Are revoked,—the edicts of the 3rd January, 1821, 9th November, 1844, and 1st September, 1848.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of the Privy Council for Trade and Plantations, with a view of preventing the spread of Cholera on board Merchant Shipping, have caused to be issued and circulated the following Instructions and Notice for the information and warning of Mariners and Shipowners :

#### CHOLERA.

Instructions to Captains of Ships prepared by the General Board of Health.

"CAPTAINS of Ships are hereby warned,-

I. What to avoid.

Overcrowding .- The amount of breathing space for the men which may suffice in ordinary times is insufficient in an epidemic season. Increase space as much as practicable. Permit no sails, large trunks, or any part of the cargo to occupy the forecastle. If sufficient additional space cannot be otherwise obtained, erect a temporary tent on deck by awning, sails, &c., for the men at night, taking care that they sleep warm and dry. Ventilate the forecastle and every part of the ship with fresh air as freely as possible. Pure air is the first essential requisite to safety.

DAMPNESS.—To lessen the danger from damp-ness let the boards be dry-rubbed. Let the men change their wet clothes whenever practicable, and never allow the wet clothes to remain below an instant. A thick flannel belt or bandage around the stomach or loins would be a great defence for sailors. Flannels or Guernsey frocks should be worn next the skin. Sudden and violent attacks of cholera often follow a chill.

FILTH .--- Let every part of the ship be kept as clean and sweet as possible, and enjoin personal cleanliness on the men. Vessels affected by bilge water should be pumped out frequently, especially steamers.

UNWHOLESOME FOOD.-Articles of food which may be taken with little inconvenience in ordinary times may be dangerous in an epidemic season. The best articles of food are meat, good biscuits, rice, oatmeal, and good potatoes. Solid food is better than fluids, and therefore at this time it would be desirable to give the crew beef and mutton instead of soup. Care should be taken to avoid all tainted meat and decayed vegetables. Special attention should be paid to having a supply of pure water. All river water near towns should be avoided.

Excess.-Great moderation both in food and drink is absolutely essential to safety. A single act of indiscretion has been followed by a severe attack ; intemperance at such a time is fraught with extreme danger. An epidemic atmosphere commonly produces great depression, both of body and mind, and a desire for stimulants. If for the relief of this feeling recourse be had to gin or brandy, the result may be fatal.

PURGATIVE MEDICINES .- No purgative medicines of any kind should be taken at this season, unless under medical direction. Glauber's Salts dangerous. and Epsom Salts are especially Owners and masters should provide themselves with the necessary medicines immediately.

#### II. What to do.

**n**.,

Cholera is commonly not so sudden in its attack as is supposed. It usually gives warning of its approach for some hours, and often for a day or two, by some degree of looseness of the bowels. This may be slight, and it is almost always without pain; but let no one be put off his guard by this circumstance. The Master should, by observation and inquiry, take notice of the health of the crew; and for his guidance, until such time as he may be able to obtain medical assistance, the following recommendations are subjoined :

If any man should be attacked with any degree of looseness of the bowels the following medicine should be given to him at once : fifteen or twenty grains of opiate confection, mixed with two table spoonsful of peppermint water, or with a little weak brandy and water warm. This should be repeated every three or four hours, or oftener if the attack is severe. If this medicine is not at hand, eight or ten drops of laudanum may be substituted for the opiate confection.

If the purging is severe, and especially if at-tended with vomiting or coldness, the man should go to bed immediately, and be kept warm. Bottles of hot water, or bags filled with salt or bran, should be applied to the stomach and feet and along the spine.

A large poultice of mustard and vinegar should be put over the stomach, and kept on fifteen or The above medicines should be twenty minutes. continued every hour, or every two or three hours, according to the emergency of the case, until a doctor can be got. Rest and warmth in bed are essential until medical assistance arrives; but not a moment should be lost in seeking medical aid."

#### CHOLERA.

#### Notice to Masters and Owners of Ships prepared and issued by the Board of Health.

"THE approach of cholera having rendered it necessary to take all possible precautions, and experience having shown that the disease spreads rapidly and fatally wherever there is over-crowding, dirt, and want of ventilation, the attention of Masters and Owners of Ships is

specially called to the following sections of the Mercantile Marine Act-

Section 63. 'Every place in any ship occupied by seamen or apprentices, and appropriated to their use, shall have a space of not less than nine superficial feet for every adult, measured on the deck or floor of such place, which shall be kept free from stores or goods of any kind not being their personal property in use during the voyage; and every such place shall be securely and properly constructed and well ventilated.

Section 69. 'If any place in any ship occupied by seamen or apprentices, and appropriated to their use, is not in the whole sufficiently large to give such space as hereinbefore required, or if any such place is not securely and properly constructed and well ventilated, the Owner shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding twenty pounds; and if any such space as aforesaid is not kept free from goods and stores as aforesaid, the Master shall for every such offence be liable to a penalty not exceeding ten pounds.

Masters and Owners of Ships are hereby warned that the Board of Trade will, if occasion shall arise, take measures to enforce the above enactments, by inspection, and, if necessary, by legal proceedings.

British Consulate, Acapulco, August 23, 1853.

It is my duty to inform your Lordships, that all vessels coming from European or from other foreign ports to this country, are, according to the laws of the Republic, bound to have with them three sets of papers; that is: three manifests and three bills of lading : or if one set is forwarded by the Mexican or other Consul at the port from which the vessel sailed to the Minister of Finance of the Republic, then the vessel need have only two sets—one for the Captain himself, and one for the Custom House.

Without conforming to this regulation the ves-sel is liable to a fine of fifty dollars, or ten pounds sterling ( $\pounds 10$ ).

#### British Consulate, Santo Domingo, September 6, 1853.

I HAD the honour of enclosing to your Lordships, on the 22nd of August last, a "Notice to Mariners," conveying information respecting the Santo Domingo Lighthouse.

My Lords,

I state in that notice, among other details-

"The fixed white light consists of nine reflectors of the first class, the patents of Messrs. Alcot and Brothers, at Rochester, in the state of New York, and may be seen with a clear atmosphere in from 18 to 20 miles."

Since this was written the Dominican Government has directed that only six, and sometimes only five, reflectors shall be lighted, which greatly lessens the power and distance at which the light can be observed.

As the notice that it may be seen in from 18 to 20 miles might tend to lead mariners astray and into danger, considering themselves when first observing the light at a much greater distance from the port than they are in reality, I beg your Lordships will cause the following change to be made in the notice; namely:

"The fixed white light consists originally of nine reflectors, of the first class, the patent of Messrs. Alcot and Brothers, at Rochester, in the State of New York, and might be seen with a clear atmosphere, were all those reflectors properly lighted, at a distance of from 18 to 20 miles. But as the Dominican Government have recently given orders that only 6, and sometimes only 4 reflectors shall be lighted, by which its effect is greatly lessened, the distance at which it can be seen does probably not surmount 10 or 11 English miles."

If the former notice should have been already published, your Lordships will perhaps consider it expedient to make likewise this correction known.
