**W**HEREAS the population of the parish of Llandingad, in the county of Carmarthen, according to the last census, exceeds two thousand persons:

And whereas, at a meeting of the Vestry of the said parish, held, after public notice in that behalf, on the sixteenth day of June last, it was resolved,—

“That the Churchwardens and Overseers of this parish do, on Saturday next, through the Board of Guardians of Llandoverly Union, make application to the Poor Law Board for their authority to appoint a Vestry Clerk for the parish of Llandingad.”

And whereas the Churchwardens and Overseers of the said parish have made their application in writing to the Poor Law Board, pursuant to the above resolution.

Now, therefore, we, the said Poor Law Board, under the authority of the several Statutes in that behalf made and provided, do hereby order and direct:—

**ART. 1.** That so much of the said Act, passed in the fourteenth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, as relates to the appointment of a Vestry Clerk, shall forthwith be applied to, and be put in force within, the said parish of Llandingad.

**ART. 2.** That a copy of this order shall be published in the London Gazette.
