T the Court at Windsor, the 29th day of December, 1853.

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS there was this day read, at the Board, a report from the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council, dated the eighth of December, one thousand eight hundred and fiftythree, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty having been pleased by your Order in Council of the first of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, to refer unto this Committee the humble petition of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Bir-mingham, in the county of Warwick, in Council assembled, on the twenty-sixth day of October, setting forth that, by your Majesty's Royal Charter of Incorporation of the said borough, bearing date the thirty-first day of October, in the second year of your Majesty's reign, your Majesty granted to the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the said borough and their successors, that they and their successors from thenceforth for ever might have and hold within the borough aforesaid, a Court of Record for the trial of civil actions before the mayor of the said borough for the time being, in any convenient place within the said borough, on the third day in every week, which Court should have authority to try actions of assumpsit, covenant, and debt, whether the debt were by specialty or simple contract; and all actions of trespass or trover for taking goods and chattels, provided the sum or damages sought to be recovered should not exceed twenty pounds; and all actions of ejectment between landlord and tenant, wherein the annual rent of the premises, of which possession was sought to be recovered, should not exceed twenty pounds, and upon which no fine should have been reserved or made payable; and it was by the said charter provided that every presiding judge of such Court respectively, from time to time might make rules for regulating the practice of such Court, but so that no such rules should be of force until they should have been allowed and confirmed by three or more Judges of the Superior Courts of Common Law at Westminster; and that no action should be tried in such Court wherein the title to land, whether freehold, copyhold, or leasehold, or other tenure whatsoever, or to any tithe, tell, market, fair, or other franchise should be in question in any action; and it was by the said charter also provided, that if a recorder should be thereafter appointed for the

said borough, no issue either in law or in fact, should be tried and determined in the said Court, in the absence of such Recorder: that the said Borough Court still continues to be holden: that by virtue of the statute made and passed in the session of Parliament, holden in the ninth and tenth years of your Majesty's reign, cap. ninetyfive, it is declared that it is expedient that one rule and manner of proceeding for the recovery of small debts and demands, should prevail through-out England; and by the said Act, a County Court for Warwickshire was established and is holden in the said borough, and has jurisdiction throughout the whole of the said borough: that the said County Court has cognizance of all causes whereof the Borough Court hath jurisdiction, with the exception of certain actions of ejectment and assumpsit, for the prosecution of which the said Borough Court hath not heretofore been used: that the officers of the said Borough Court are, Isaac Spooner, Esq., Barrister-at-Law, the Judge (appointed by the Recorder of the borough, pursuant to an Act passed in the session of Parlia-ment, holden in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, cap. one hundred and five, intituled "An Act for the better administration of justice in certain boroughs"); Robert Kellie Douglas the Registrar, and Joseph Holl and Francis Osler Badham, the Serjeants at Mace: that the said Judge was appointed on the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-two, but no salary is paid to him by the petitioners, and the other officers of the said Court derive their emoluments exclusively from fees received from suitors: that the proceedings of the said Borough Court are dilatory, complicated, and expensive, the powers for enforcing its judgments and orders are in many instances ineffective, and no summary means are provided to remedy abuses in the conduct of the officers and practitioners of the Court: that the proceedings of the County Court are prompt, simple, inexpensive, and effective: that the County Court is amply sufficient to transact, in addition to its present business, the whole of the business which is now transacted in the Borough Court: that the said Borough Court has therefore become unnecessary, and its continuance is not conducive to the due administration of justice in this borough, and humbly praying that it may please your Majesty, by and with the advice of your Majesty's Privy Council, by an Order in Council, to declare that the jurisdiction of the said Court established by the said charter shall, from the

date of such Order be excluded in all causes whereof the County Court hath cognizance, or that by and with the advice aforesaid, your Majesty may make such other Order in the premises as to your Majesty shall seem meet: and likewise a counter petition of certain ratepayers and others of the said borough of Birmingham, in pursuance of the provisions of an Act, passed in the sixteenth year of your Majesty's reign, cap. fifty-four, entitled "An Act further to facilitate and arrange proceedings in the County Courts," the Lords of the Committee, in obedience to your Majesty's said Order of Reference, have taken the said petition and counter petition into consideration, and having heard the parties by their counsel and witnesses on both sides, their Lordships do agree humbly to report to your Majesty, as their opinion, that the jurisdiction of the said Borough Court, for the borough of Birmingham, ought to be excluded family causes whereof the County Court hath cognizance."

Her Majesty having taken the said Report into consideration, was pleased by and with the advice of her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the jurisdiction of the said Borough Court for the borough of Birmingham be and the same is hereby excluded in all causes whereof the County Court hath cognizance. Whereof the Mayor, Aldermen, and Burgesses of the borough of Birmingham for the time being and all other persons whom it may concern, are to take notice and govern themselves accordingly.

HEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An "Act for the further amendment of the Church "Building Acts," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, in the

words and figures following ; viz. :

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parishes of Caversham and Shiplake, in the county of Oxford, and of the parish of Sonning, in the county of Berks, and all in the dioceso of Oxford, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said three parishes, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes for the consecrated church of Saint John the Baptist, situate at Kidmore End, in the said parish of Caversham, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the ninth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts," and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named or called "The Consolidated Chapelry of Kidmore End," and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: the boundary of the said consolidated chapelry of Dean and Canons he Kidmore End commences at the south-west tive Common Seals.

corner at a point on the boundary of the parishes of Caversham and Mapledurham, near Shephard'slane, in the parish of Mapledurham aforesaid, proceeding castward thence by Farthingworthgreen, in the parish of Caversham, and along the road which leads to Grove Farm, as far as the road leading to Tanners Farm, both in the said parish of Caversham, passing for a short distance along this last-mentioned road it takes the fence which divides certain arable inclosures numbered 300 and 301 on the tithe award map of the said parish of Caversham, and thence along the fence which divides certain inclosures numbered 300 and 299 from numbers 301 and 298, on the tithe award map aforesaid, till it joins the road leading from Grove Farm to Tanners Farm, in the parish of Caversham aforesaid, crossing this latter road it proceeds eastwardly along a lane till it joins the road leading from Emmer-green to Kidmore End, both in the said parish of Caversham, from which point it follows for a short distance southerly this last-mentioned road towards Emmer-green aforesaid, till it comes to a fence dividing certain inclosures belonging to H. I. Shephard, Esquire, of Rose hill, in the said parish of Caversham, and numbered 261 and 262 from 260 and 259 respectively on the tithe award map aforesaid, until it reaches the road leading from Reading to Nettlebed, in the county of Oxford, along which road it proceeds northerly as far as the Bird in hand Public House, at or near which it takes the footpath leading thence to Crowsley Park, in the parish of Shiplake, till it reaches the boundary of the parishes of Sonning and Shiplake, along which it proceeds northward till it reaches the road leading by Wigmore Pond, in the said parish of Shiplake to Blounts-court, in the parish of Rotherfield Peppard, this lastmentioned road it follows till it joins the boundary of the parishes of Shiplake and Rotherfield Peppard, aforesaid, whence it proceeds northwestward along the boundary of the said parish of Shiplake to its junction with the parish of Checkendon, thence south-westerly along the boundary line of the said parishes of Checkendon and Shiplake until they meet the parish of Sonning aforesaid, thence along the boundary of the said parish of Sonning till it joins the parish of Caversham aforesaid, and thence along the boundary of the said parish of Caversham, south-westerly until it reaches the boundary of the parishes of Caversham and Mapledurham, then proceeding south-easterly and southerly along the boundary of those parishes until it reaches Shephard's-lane, at the point where the boundary of the said Consolidated Chapelry of Kidmore End commenced, and as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured

green, yellow, and blue.
"That the consents of the Right Reverend Samuel, Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford, and also patron in right of his see of the parish church of the said parish of Sonning, of the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Christ, in Oxford (patrous of the parish church of the said parish of Caversham), and of the Dean and Canons of your Majesty's Pree Chapel of Saint George, within your Majesty's Castle of Windsor (patrons of the parish church of the said parish of Shiplake), have been severally obtained to the formation of, the said Consolidated Chapelry of Kidmore End, as required by the Act and Section hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof the said Samuel Bishop of Oxford has signed and scaled this representation, and the said Dean and Chapter and Dean and Canons have hereto affixed their respec"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it has been mutually agreed between the said Samuel, Bishop of Oxford, the said Dean and Chapter and Dean and Canons as such respective patrons as aforesaid, testified as aforesaid, (with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners testified as hereinafter mentioned, and of the said Samuel, Bishop of Oxford, testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment of an Incumbent or perpetual Curate to serve the said Church of Saint John, at Kidmore End aforesaid, should be vested in, belong to, and whenever occasion may require, be exercised by, the Bishop of the said diocese of Oxford for the time being.

Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall

seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the consolidated chapelry therein mentioned for the consecrated church of Saint John the Baptist, at Kidmore End, in the parish of Caversham, be accordingly formed, and that the agreement mentioned in the said representation in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an Incumbent or perpetual Curate to serve the said church be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act; and that the right of presentation and nomination to the said church shall belong to, and be exercised by, the Bishop of the diocese of Oxford f.r the time being; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Oxford.

THEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An "Act for the further amendment of the Church "Building Acts," or under and by virtue of all powers or authorities whatever contained in the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation bearing date the fifth day of December, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, in the words and figures following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the extra-parochial place of Llanerchymedd (locally situate within or forming part for ecclesiastical purposes of the parish of Llanbeulan), of the parish of Amlwch, of the parochial chapelries of Llechcynfarwydd and Rhodygeidio, otherwise Ceidio, and of the parochial chapelry of Gwredog, (being severally locally situate within or forming part of (for ecclesiastical purposes) the parish of Llantrisaint,) and all being in the county

of Anglesey, and in the diocese of Bangor, it appears to your Majesty's said Commissioners to be expedient to unite and consolidate the whole of the said extra-parochial place of Llanerchymedd and part of that of Gwredog, together with contiguous parts of the said parish of Amlwch, and also of the said parochial chapelries of Llechcynfarwydd and Rhodygeidio, otherwise Ceidio, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes for the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Llanerchymedd aforesaid, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the ninth section of an Act of Parliament passed in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amend. 'ment of the Church Building Acts,' or under and by virtue of all powers or authorities whatever in this behalf contained in the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named or called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of' 'Llanerchymedd,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: The boundary line commences at the north, in the middle of the road leading from Amlwch to Llandyfrydog, and proceeds south-easterly along the middle of that road until it reaches the boundary line separating the parish of Amlwch from the parish of Llandyfrydog, and proceeds in a southerly direction along such boundary until it meets the parish of Coedana; thence proceeding westerly along the road leading from Llanerchymedd to Beaumaris, and south-westerly along the boundary line separating the parish of Coedana from Llechcynfarwydd, aforesaid, until it reaches a detached portion of the parochial chapelry of Gwredog, and continuing along the boundary line separating the said parish of Coedana from the said parochial chapelry of Gwredog until it meets the parish of Llandrygarn; then proceeding northerly along the boundary line separating Gwredog and Llandrygarn until it meets the boundary of Llechcynfarwydd, aforesaid, and proceeding northeasterly and south-easterly along the boundary thereof, as far as the western fence of farm or inclosure No. 36 on the tithe commutation map of Llechcynfarwydd aforesaid; then proceeding northerly along the western fence, and easterly along the northern fence, of such farm or inclosure. and also of the farm or inclosure No. 38, as far as the south-western corner of the farm or inclosure No. 6 on the tithe commutation map of Rhodygeidio, aforesaid, and proceeding north-westerly along such farm or inclosure as far as the road on the north-western side thereof; then proceeding along the middle of that road to the south-western corner of a small collection of cottages and gardens forming part of a farm or inclosure No. 5 on the said map (all which said cottages and gardens are included in the said consolidated chapelry), and proceeding northerly up the western side of such cottages and gardens, and crossing over the road from Trefor to the south-western corner of farm or inclosure No. 16 upon the said map; then proceeding north-easterly along the north-western fences of farms or inclosures Nos. 16, 15, 22, 23, and 26, on the said map, as far as the boundary line of the said parish of Amlwch; then proceeding northerly and north-easterly along the boundary line separating that parish from Rhodygeidio, aforesaid, as far as the northernmost fence senarating the farm or inclosure No. 19 on the tithe commutation map of the said parish of Amlwch, from land belonging to Mr. John Henry Treweek, and proceeding easterly along such fence and also along the northern fence of the farm or inclosure No. 21 on the said map, as far as the road leading to Amlweb, where the boundary line of the said

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Consolidated Chapelry of Llanerchymedd commenced, and which is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured pink, green, blue, vellow, and lilac.

coloured pink, green, blue, yellow, and lilac.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend Christopher, Bishop of the said diocese of Bangor, and also patron, in right of his see, of the parish churches of the said parishes of Llanbeulan, Amlwch, and Llantrisaint, and also of the said extra-parochial place of Llanerchymedd, has been obtained to the formation of the said Consolidated Chapelry of Llanerchymedd, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that the said Christopher, Bishop of Bangor, as such patron, as aforesaid, is willing and has agreed (testified as aforesaid) with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners (testified as hereinafter mentioned) that the right of presentation and appointment of an Incumbent or perpetual Curate to serve the said Church at Llanerchymedd aforesaid should be vested in, belong to, and whenever occasion may require, be exercised by the Bishop of the said diocese of Bangor for the time being.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your wisdom shall

seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation together with the map or plan thereunto annexed into consideration, was pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the consolidated chapelry therein mentioned, for the consecrated church of Saint Mary, at Llanerchymedd, in the parish of Llanbeulan, be accordingly formed, and that the agreement mentioned in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate, to serve the said church, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Act; and that the right of presentation and nomination to the said church, shall belong to, and be exercised by the Bishop of the diocese of Bangor, for the time being; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the said diocese of Bangor.

mentioned in the order, burials in such part or parts of the metropolis, or in such burial grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require;

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by Her Order in Council of the twenty-fourth of October last, to direct that burials should be discontinued in the Lambeth Burial Ground in High-street, on the thirty-first of October last, and in the Church of Saint John, Waterloo, in the said parish of Lambeth, entirely at the end of the year one thou-

sand eight hundred and fifty-three.

And whereas the Rt. Hon. Viscount Palmerston, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has made a representation stating that the time when burials should be discontinued in the said burial ground and churchyard may properly be extended to the first day of June, one thousand

eight hundred and fifty-four.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty having taken the said representat on into consideration, is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the time when burials shall be discontinued in the Lambeth burial ground, in High-street, and in the church yard of Saint John, Waterloo-road, in the parish of Lambeth, be extended to the first day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis," it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, burials in any part or parts of the metropolis, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial in the metropolis, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that from and after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such part or parts of the metropolis, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of the parishes in which any burial-grounds or places of burial affected by such representation shall be situate, or on some other conspicuous places, within the part or parts of the metropolis affected by such representation, one calendar month, or where any order made under "The Nuisances Removal and Diseases Prevention Act, 1848," directing the provisions of that Act, for the prevention of epidemic, endemic, and contagious diseases, to be put in force, is in force within such part or parts, then seven days at the least before such representation is so considered; provided always that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and the Vestry Clerk of such parish:

And whereas an Order, dated the fifteenth of September last, made under the last recited Act, directing the provisions of that Act for the prevention of epidemic, endemic, and contagious diseases to be put in force, is in force throughout the whole of Great Britain:

And whereas the Right Honourable Viscount Palmerston, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Vestry Clerks of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation, stating that, for the protection of the public health, burials should be discontinued in the hereinafter mentioned parishes and places:

And whereas Her Majesty in Council was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twenty-fifth November last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the seventeenth day of this instant December; and such Order has been published in the London Gazette; and copies thereof have been affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of the said parishes, or on some conspicuous places within the part or parts of the metropolis affected by such representation, seven days at the least before the said fifteenth day of November.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be discontinued, as follows, in the under-mentioned parishes and places, from and after the ninth day of January next (except as is herein otherwise directed); viz.:

- St. Anne Limehouse—In the burial-ground and in the vaults of *Brunswick Chapel*, situate in Three Colt-street.
- St. Peter ad Vincula—Tower of London; within the church and burial-ground, and in the vaults behind the church.
- St. George in the East—In Old Gravellane Chapel burinl-ground, and in the vaults under the chapel.
- St. Matthew Bethnal Green—In Gibraltar Burial-ground. Except in private vaults and graves, no more than one body to be buried in any grave in the Cambridge Heath and North-east London Cemetery; and burials to be wholly discontinued therein from and after the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.
- St. Nicholas Deptford—In the churchyard, and burial-ground, from and after the first of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four. In the vaults under the church to cease immediately.
- St. Paul Deptford—Under the church to be wholly discontinued, as also in that part of the churchyard which has already been buried in: no burial to take place in future at a less distance than ten yards from any dwelling-house; no more than one body to be buried in one grave; and burials to be wholly discontinued from and after the first May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty four. In the burial-ground of, and in the vaults under, the High-street Chapel; in the burial-ground

of and under the Wesleyan Chapel, Mary Ann's-buildings; in the Quaker Burial-ground; and in the General Baptist Burial-ground, Church-street, to be wholly discontinued from and after the said ninth of January next.

HOLY TRINITY BROMPTON—In the vaults under the church to be wholly discontinued; in the churchyard not more than one body to be buried in any grave, except in private vaults and graves, and burials wholly to cease from and after the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-nine.

LAMBETH-In Stockwell New Chapel burialground.

ST. PANCRAS—With the exception of private vaults and graves, not more than one body to be buried in any grave in Comden Town Cemetery, belonging to the parish of St. MARTIN-IN-THE-FIELDS, and situate in the parish of St. Pancras; and no burials to take place within ten yards of any inhabited house; and wholly to cease in the said cometery from and after the first of May, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six.

And whereas an Order, dated the fifteenth of September last, made under the last recited Act, directing the provisions of that Act for the prevention of epidemic, endemic, and contagious diseases to be put in force, is in force throughout the

whole of Great Britain:

And whereas the Right Honourable Viscount Palmerston, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and Vestry Clerks of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, burials should be discontinued

in the hereinafter-mentioned parishes:

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of the Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Lisbon, enclosing the following translation of an Edict from the Lisbon Board of Health, permitting suspected Vessels bound to Oporto to call at Aveiro or Vianna.

(Translation.)

THE Board of Health, in consequence of the information it has received, and considering that the present state and progressive improvement of the Bars of Aveiro and Vianna, already permit vessels of a certain size to enter and leave those ports without difficulty, and consequently render it practicable to ascertain the sanitary state of a great number of suspected vessels, and being desirous to afford to commerce all facilities compatible with the security of public health, hereby makes known, and enjoins the observance of the following:—

1st. Suspected vessels bound to Oporto may, before arriving at their destination, have their sanitary condition verified at either of the ports of Aveiro or Vianna.

2nd. Such vessels, in case they shall have fulfilled the conditions required by the 1st Article of the Edict of the 29th of September last at Aveiro or Vianna, shall be there admitted to free pratique, and receive from the chief of the health station a certificate in due form of their good sanitary condition.

3rd. Vessels proceeding originally from suspected ports, and appearing off the Bar of Oporto provided with certificates of free pratique at Aveiro or Vianna, shall at once be admitted, in free pratique, into the River Douro.

4th. Vessels bound to Oporto, and having been regularly visited at Aveiro or Vianna, but not having received the required certificates of free pratique, shall continue subject to the regulations established by the Edicts of the 24th and 25th of October, 1850.

#### TREASURY WARRANT.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the fourth year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the regulation of the duties of postage" certain scales of weight and rates of postage were fixed and made chargeable and payable upon, for, or in respect of letters, newspapers, parliamentary proceedings, and printed papers transmitted and forwarded by the post, and various regulations were made for facilitating the transmission of such letters and papers by the post.

And whereas by an Act, passed in the eleventh year of the reign of Her present Majesty, intituled "An Act, for giving further facilities for the transmission of letters by post and for the regulating the duties of postage thereon, and for other purposes relating to the Post-office," the proviso concerning the maximum weight of letters to be sent by the post, as fixed in and by the said firstmentioned Act, is repealed; and in order to prevent packets of an unwieldy bulk or an inconvenient size being transmitted by the post, power is given to the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, at any time or times thereafter, by Warrant under their hands, to fix a maximum weight of letters to be sent by the post, and from time to time to repeal or revoke such maximum weight, wholly or in part, and declare any other maximum of weight in lieu thereof; and all letters are to be forwarded, conveyed, and delivered by the post in conformity with any such Warrant, and also in conformity with and under and subject to all such orders, conditions, limitations, regulations, and restrictions as to the form, size, or dimensions | packet, if containing more than one printed book,

thereof, whether in proportion to the weight or otherwise, as the Postmaster General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, shall from time to time direct. And by the said Act power is also given to the Postmaster General to collect and receive the foreign and colonial postage charged or chargeable on any letters sent by the post, and also with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury to require the postage, British, colonial, or foreign, of any letters sent by the post, to be prepaid, either in money or in stamps as he may think fit, on the same being put into the Post-office, and also with such consent to abolish or restrict the prepayment in money of postage on letters sent by the post, either altogether or on certain letters, and to require the prepayment thereof to be in stamps, and to refuse to receive or send by the post any letters tendered contrary to any regulations thereby made. And it is also declared and enacted that it shall be lawful for the Postmaster-General and any officer of the Post-office to detain any letters which shall be posted or sent by the post contrary to the regulations of that Act, or the first-mentioned Act, or contrary to the regulations of any Treasury Warrant to be issued under or by virtue of that Act, or which had been or should be issued underor by virtue of the said first-mentioned Act, and to open such letters, and either to return them to the senders thereof or to forward them to the places of their destination, charged in either case with such rates of postage as the Postmaster-General, with the consent of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury shall, from time to time, direct.

Now we, the undersigned, being two of the Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, do, in exercise of the powers reserved to us in and by the said before-mentioned Acts, or either of them, and of all other powers enabling us in this behalf, by this Warrant under our hands, order and direct that printed books, printed magazines, printed reviews, printed pamphlets (whether British, colonial, or foreign), may be transmitted by the post between any part of the United Kingdom and the colony of New Brunswick, subject to the several regulations and rates hereinafter contained; that is to sav:

On every packet, consisting of a single printed book, or printed magazine, or printed review, or printed pamphlet, the several sheets or parts of which, when more than one, shall be sewed or bound together, if not exceeding half a pound in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of sixpence.

And on every such packet, if exceeding half a pound, and not exceeding one pound in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of one shilling

And on every such packet, if exceeding one pound, and not exceeding two pounds in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of two shillings.

And on every such packet if exceeding two pounds, and not exceeding three pounds in weight, there shall be charged and taken one uniform rate of postage of three shillings.

And for every additional one pound in weight,

of any such packet, above the weight of three pounds, there shall be charged and taken an additional rate of postage of one shilling, and every fraction of such additional pound shall be charged as an additional pound.

And we further order and direct, that no such

or printed magazine, or printed review, or printed pamphlet, or containing any paper or thing besides a printed book, printed magazine, printed review, or printed pamphlet, or containing any printed book, printed magazine, printed review, or printed pamphlet, the several sheets or parts of which when more than one shall not be sewed or bound together, or which packet, in length, or breadth, or width, or depth, shall exceed the dimensions of two feet or twenty-four inches shall be forwarded by the post under the provisions aforesaid.

And we further order and direct that as to any packet hereinbefore authorised to be sent by the post, under the provisions aforesaid, which shall be posted in the United Kingdom, the postage thereof shall in every case be prepaid at the time of the same being posted not in money but by being duly stamped with the proper British postage stamp or stamps affixed thereto, which stamp or stamps shall in every case be affixed or appear on the outside of every such packet, near the address, and shall be of the value or amount of the postage duty payable thereon under or by virtue of this warrant, unless any such packet be sent from any department or office in or connected with the public service of Her Majesty which shall keep a postage account with the General Post Office in London, in which case the same shall be charged in such postage account; and as to any such packet posted in New Brunswick the postage thereof shall in every case be prepaid, either in money or by the proper colonial postage stamp or stamps being affixed thereto at the time of the same being posted.

And we further order and direct that every such packet shall be sent without a cover, or in a a cover or envelope open at the ends or sides, and shall contain printed matter only, with the binding thereof, and there shall be no writing or marks upon the cover or envelope thereof, or upon or within any part of the contents thereof, other than the name and addres; of the person to whom the packet shall be sent, unless any such packet be sent from any department or office in or connected with the public service of Her Majesty which shall keep a postage account with the General Post Office in London, in which case the same may, in addition to the name and address of the person to whom it shall be sent, have printed or written thereon or upon the cover or envelope thereof, the words "On Her Majesty's Service," and also the name of the department or public office from which the packet shall be forwarded, together with the name of any public officer employed in or belonging to any such department or office who may be authorised to affix his name to letters and packets sent by the post as a certificate that they are on the public service.

And in order to prevent any obstacles to the due and regular transmission of letters by the post we further direct, that it shall be lawful for any officer of the Post Office in the United Kingdom to delay the transmission of any packet posted or forwarded by the post under the provisions of this warrant, either for the space of twenty-four hours from the time at which (or at his option until the despatch of the mail next after that by which) the same ought otherwise to have been forwarded by him.

And we further direct, that nothing hereinbefore contained shall be construed to interfere with or affect the transmission by the post of printed votes and proceedings of the Imperial Parliament, or of printed votes and proceedings of the Colonial Legislatures, nor of printed papers or other printed publications which are allowed to pass by the post under the newspaper privilege.
