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Voices, June 18.

WE have Advice by a Vessel from Cor-
 fou, that the Auxiliary Gallies, as
 likewise the Convoy that went lately
 from hence, were advised there, And
 that the Captain-General, having taken
 a Review of the Forces of the State, which
 together make 25000 Men, sailed the 25th of
 the last Month from *St. Jago*, with a Fleet
 of above 100 Sail. The Letters from *Dakota*
 give an account, That the Provost for General *Cornaro*
 did assemble what Troops he could with a
 Resolution to fall upon the *Turks*, who were En-
 camped near *Nwenda*. They write from the *Ma-
 rca*, that the Parties of the Garrison of *Corn* make
 frequent Incursions upon the Enemy, from which
 they return for the most part with good Booty.
 The Count *de Melchior*, late Governor of *Milan*, is
 still here, preparing for his Embassy to *Rome*. The
 Deputies from *Rogusa* have had Audience; They
 come, it is said, to complain of the Hostilities the
Herdukes have committed upon some of the Sub-
 jects of that Republick.

Genoa, June 18. We have an Account by a Ves-
 sel come in 17 days from *Argiera*, that a *Chalup*
 was arrived there from the Grand Signior, to re-
 quire that Government to send Ten of their Ships to
 join his Fleet, but that the Dey, with the advice
 of the Divan, had answered, That they could not
 send any of their Ships to the *Levant*, by reason of
 the War they are engaged in against *Tunis*, in fa-
 vour of the two Brothers *Beys*, to whom they are
 obliged to send a new assistance of Ships and
 Troops.

Milan, June 18. The Count *de Pausalida*
 our Governor, parted from hence the 7th Instant
 to go and visit several places in this State, but the
 excessive heat obliged him to stay at *Loda*, from
 whence he returned hither the 5th, having put off
 his visiting those places to some other time. It is
 believed that the Troops which are encamped near
Prato, will be in few days sent back to their se-
 veral Quarters. The Marquis *de Castel Rodrigo* is
 named to be General of the Horse in the service
 of this Dutchy.

Marseilles, June 28. We have advice by a Bark
 which arrived here this week, that the two Brothers
Beys have, with the help of the *Alger* Sultors, ta-
 ken the City of *Tunis*. It is said the French Fleet is
 retired from before *Cadix*, and that they have Or-
 dered to go over to the Coast of *Barbary* before they
 return home.

Warsaw, May 28. The Forces of this Crown are

in Marching to the general Rendezvous; Those of
Lithuania, that are about a 6000 Men, assemble
 near *Briscia*. The Train of Artillery is ready to
 march, and all things are ordered for the opening
 of the Campaign about the middle of the next
 Month. We have advice, that the *Turks* have
 drawn their Garrison out of *Spain* with *Miscel*
 to reinforce that of *Cambrai*. The Convoy
 they put lately into this place was thoroughly de-
 stroyed as we heard at first, but they have repaired
 it greater, which they intend to conduct here be-
 fore the Army of this Crown is in the Field. We
 are told that *Prince Bala* is arrived in *Constanti-
 nople* and that his predecessor has Order'd to go and serve
 in *Hungary*. Some Letters from *Vienna* said
 that the *Polish* Ambassadors have been very spleen-
 dily entertained by order of the *Czar*, and that
 they were preparing for their departure.

Vienna, June 28. The Count *de Straetman*
 Chancellor of *Austria* who went the last week to
 the Army, having had several Conferences with the
 Elector of *Brandenburg*, and the Duke of *Lorraine*, and
 the Resolution being taken to besiege *Buda*, the
 Elector of *Brandenburg* marched the 12th Instant from
Barran at the Head of 24000 Men, towards *Han-
 den* and *Pist*, to hinder, by the taking of those pla-
 ces, the Communication between *Buda* and *Agria*,
 after which his Electoral Highness will pass the *Da-
 nube*, and join the Imperial Army before *Buda*. The
 Duke of *Lorraine* passed the *Danube* over
 the Bridge at *Barran* with the Imperial Forces un-
 der his Command, and marched towards *Buda*, which
 place he will be able to take by this time if not be-
 sieged; The last Letters from the Army were of the
 7th Instant, when was then encamped near the
 City of *Andant*. According to our best Advices,
 there are in *Buda* 6000 *Hungarians*, and 4000 *Span-
 ish*, besides 2 or 3000 of the *Turks* who bear
 Arms, and the Garrison is provided with *Munition*
 and *Provisions* for six Months. They write
 from *Upper Hungary*, that the Troops which the
 Seraphim assembled between *Temeswar* and *Wra-
 dia*, are to conduct a Convoy of *Provisions* to *Agria*,
 but that *Cobach* is now abroad with the *How-
 ses* under his Command to hinder their design. The
 Deputies that are here from the Prince and States of
Transylvania, were the 7th and 12th of this month
 in Conference with the Commissioners appointed to
 treat with them upon a new Project of a Treaty,
 which, it is said, they received some days before
 by an Expres from Prince *Abassi*. The Duke *de Va-
 lence*, Grandee of *Spain*, the Marquis *de Varna* his
 Brother, and several other Persons of Quality, pas-
 sed lately through this place, going to serve as Vol-
 unteers in *Hungary*.

Ratisbonne, June 24. The Colledge of Princes assembled extraordinarily the 18th of this month, the Subject of their Debate, we are told, related to the Conference which will begin in few days at *Ausbourg*. In the mean time the Electoral Colledge have renewed their Instances to the Princes and States of the Empire, to deliberate concerning the Execution of the Treaty of Truce, the Regulating the Limits, and other important Points which concern the Peace and Security of the Empire. The Ministers residing at the Dyet on the part of the Kings of *Spain* and *Sweden*, and the Elector of *Bavaria*, are gone to the meeting at *Ausbourg*. The last Advices from the Imperial Army, commanded by the Duke of *Lorraine*, left them Encamped not far from *Buda*, which, it's believed, was invested the 17th or 18th of this month; There is a very good Garrison in the place, and the *Turks* have not been wanting to provide all things necessary for the defence of it. There is yet no News of the Grand Visier's arrival at *Belgrade*, which makes People begin to believe, that the Reports of his intention to command the *Ottoman Army* in Person this Campaign, have been only spread abroad to encourage the Soldiers, and to prevent the Disorders which were feared at *Adrianople* and *Constantinople*. We are told from *Upper Hungary*, That the Garrison in *Mongatz* is very much weakened, the *Hungarians* as well as *Germans* (who find Provisions grow very scarce, and that *Teckelej* is not able to make good his promises to relieve them) deserting daily.

Frankfort, June 20. There will be a Meeting the next week at *Ausburgh* of the Deputies of *Bavaria*, *Sualia*, *Franconia*, and the *Upper Rhine*, at which will be present the Ministers of *Spain* and *Sweden*, and the Count de *Hohenloos* on the part of the Emperor.

Cologne, June 26. The Imperial Sub-Commissioners are still here; but it's believed they will now in a short time have finished their Commission. The Letters from *Hungary* say, that the Imperial Army was before *Buda*.

Hamburg, June 24. The Baron *Herwart*, the Imperial Minister, is come hither from *Zell*, where he has been several months, endeavouring to compose the differences between the Duke of *Zell* and this City. He has, since his Arrival, had a Conference with these Magistrates, to whom, it's said, he has made some new Proposals, but we do not hear with what success. There remain still great difficulties which hinder an Accommodation, though we are not without hopes, that by the good offices of the Princes who employ their Mediation, they will be at last removed, and all matters amicably composed. The Letters from *Berlin* of the 22d Instant tell us, That the Elector of *Brandenburgh* had declared his Resolution to part from thence the first of the next Month for *Cleves*. We are told from *Crancomb*, That the King of *Poland* was gone from *Warsaw* to *Soye*, where part of the Forces of that Crown were drawn together, and that the General Rendezvous would be held the 15th of this month near *Smalain*. The Advices from *Moscow* confirm what we told you in our last, of the *Czars* having sent Orders to the *Cossacks*, subject to them, to make War upon the *Tartars*.

Paris, July 6. The differences between the Two Crowns being adjusted, as we have already told you, the Baron *Dewal*, Envoy from the King of *Spain*, has obtained an Order for the taking off

the Seizures upon the Estates which the Subjects of that Crown have within the *French Conquest*. And he intends to go this week for *Brussels*, to give the Governor of the *Spanish Netherlands* an account of his Negotiation at this Court. The *French Fleet* that was before *Cadix* has orders to return home, except some Ships that are to cruize in the *Mediterranean*. The King's journey to *Maintenon* is put off till the next week. The Troops of the King's Household began to encamp on Wednesday last.

Whitehall, June 28. On Thursday last the Sieur *Sarotti*, Resident of *Venice*, had Audience of the Queen Dowager; On Saturday of her Royal Highness the Princess *Ann*, and yesterday of Prince *George*, of *Denmark*, being Conducted by Sir *Charles Cottrell* Master of the Ceremonies.
