Venice, June 18.

We have Advice by a Vessel from Corfu, that the Auxiliary Gallies, as likewise the Convoy that went lately from hence, were arrived there; And that the Captain-General, having taken a Review of the Forces of that State, which together make 25000 Men, sailed the 25th of the last Month from Corfu, having joined a Fleet of above 100 Sail. The Letters from Dalmatia give an account, That the Proveditor General Cossano did assemble what Troops he could, with a Resolution to fall upon the Turks, who were encamped near Nicchia. They write from the Morea, that the Parties of the Garrison of Corfu make frequent Incursions upon the Enemy, from which they return for the most part with good Booty. The Count de Maffei late Governor of Milan, is still here, preparing for his Embassy to Rome. The Deputies from Ragusa have had Audience; They come, it's said, to complain of the Hostilities the Herdukes have committed upon some of the Subjects of that Republick.

Genua, June 18. We have an Account by a Vessel come in 17 days from Argiera, that Aghiaia was arrived there from the Grand Signor, to require that Government to send Ten of their Ships to join his Fleet, but that the Dey, with the advice of the Divan, had answered, That they could not send any of their Ships to the Levant, by reason of the War they are engaged in against Tunis, in favour of the two Brothers Bey, to whom they are obliged to send a new assistance of Ships, and Troops.

Milano, June 18. The Count de Fuenfaldia our Governor, parted from hence the 17th Instant to go and visit several places in this State, but the excessive heat obliged him to stay at Loc, from whence he returned hither the 5th, having put off his visiting those places to some other time. It's believed that the Troops which are encamped near Pavia, will be in few days sent back to their several Quarters. The Marquis de Cerral Rodriguez is named to be General of the Horse in the service of this Dutchy.

Marseille, June 28. We have advice by a Barke which arrived here this week, that the two Brothers Bey have, with the help of the Alger Soccors, taken the City of Tunis. It's said the French Fleet is retired from before Cadiz, and that they have ordered to go over to the Coast of Barbary before they return home.

Warsaw, May 28. The Forces of this Crown are

preparing to the General Reduction of those of Lithuania, which about a 4500 Men assemble near Brusela. The Train of Artillery is ready to march, and all things are ordered for the opening of the Campaigne about the middle of the next Month. We have advice, that the Poles have drawn their Garrisons out of Grodno and Miziel, to reinforce that of Czernowitza. Convoy they put lately into this place was so well fitted as we hear at first, that they never prepared a greater. Which they intend to conduct before the Army of the Crown is in the Field. We are told that Prince Bassa is arrived at Crimone, and that his Predecessor has Ordained and sent in Hungary. The last Letters from Lubetek say, that the Polish Ambassadors have been very splendidly entertained by the Order of the Czars, and that they were presenting for their departure.

Vienna, June 28. The Count de Serravalle, Chancellor of Austria, who went last week to the Army, having had several Conferences with the Elector of Bavaria, and the Duke of Lorraine, and the Elector being thence to besiege Buda, the Elector of Bavaria marched the 12th instant from Parker at the Head of 24000 Men, towards Hanau and Pforzheim, to hinder, by the taking of those places, the Communication between Buda and Austria, after which his Electoral Highness will pass the Danube, and join the Imperial Army before Buda. The 13th, the Duke of Lorraine passed the Danube over the Bridge at Borken with the Imperial Forces under his Command and marched towards Buda, which place we doubt not is by this time formally besieged. The last Letters from the Army were of the 14th instant, which was then encamped near the Hill of St. Andrew. According to our best Advices, there are in Buda, good Juniper, and 4000 Spies etc, besides 3 or 4000 of the Turkish forces who beat about, and the Garrison is provided with Ammunition and Provisions for six Months. They were soon Upper Hungary. That the Troops which the Scanderbeg assembled between Temesvare and Warna, are to conduct a Convoy of Provisions to Buda, but that Colonel M. de Ruy was abroad with the Forces under his Command to hinder their design. The Deputies that are here from the Prince-bishopric of Tyrol, were the 14th and 15th of this month in Conference with the Commissioners appointed to treat with them upon a new Project of a Treaty, which it's said, they received some days before by an Express from Prince Abas. The Duke de Vendome, Grandee of Spain, the Marquis de Vero his Brother, and several other Persons of Quality, passed lately through this place, going to receive as Vice Admirals in Hungary.
