### By the QUEEN. A PROCLAMATION.

VICTORIA, R.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, entitled "An Act to prevent the enlisting or engagement of His Majesty's subjects to serve in foreign service, and the fitting out or equipping in His "Majesty's dominions vessels for warlike purposes without His Majesty's license;" it is amongst other things enacted, that if any person, within any part of the United Kingdom, or in any part of

His Majesty's dominions beyond the seas, shall, without the leave or license of His Majesty, his heirs, or successors for that purpose first had and obtained, under the sign manual of His Majesty, his heirs, or successors, or signified by Order in Council or by Proclamation of His Majesty, his heirs, or successors, equip, furnish, fit out, or arm, or attempt or endeavour to equip, furnish, fit out, or arm, or procure to be equipped, furnished, fitted out or armed, or shall knowingly aid, assist, or be concerned in the equipping, furnishing, fitting out, or arming of any ship or vessel, with intent, or in order that, such ship or vessel shall be employed in the service of any foreign prince, state, or potentate, or of any foreign colony, province, or part of any province or people, or of any person or persons, exercising or assuming to exercise any powers of Government in or over any foreign state, colony, province, or part of any province or people, as a transport or store ship, or with intent to cruise or commit hostilities against any prince, state, or potentate, or against the subjects or citizens of any prince, state, or potentate, or against the persons exercising or assuming to exercise the powers of Government in any colony, province, or part of any province or country, or against the inhabitants of any foreign colony, province, or part of any province or country, with whom His Majesty shall not then be at war; or shall, within the United Kingdom, or any of His Majesty's dominions, or in any settlement, colony, territory, island, or place belonging or subject to His Majesty, issue or deliver any commission for any ship or vessel, to the intent that such ship or vessel shall be employed as aforesaid, every such person so offending shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanour, and shall, upon conviction thereof, upon any information or indictment, be punished by fine and imprisonment, or either of them, at the discretion of the Court in which such offender shall be convicted; and every such ship or vessel, with the tackle, apparel, and furniture, together with all the materials, arms, ammunition, and stores which may belong to, or be on board of, any such ship or vessel, shall be forfeited. And whereas it has been represented to Us, that ships and vessels are being built in several places within the United Kingdom, and are being equipped, furnished, and fitted out, especially with steam machinery, with intent that they shall be employed as aforesaid, without Our royal leave or license for that purpose first had or obtained, or signified as aforesaid: We have, therefore, thought fit, by and with the advice of Our Privy Council, to issue this Our Royal Proclamation, warning all Our subjects against taking part in such proceedings, which We are determined to prevent and repress, and which cannot fail to bring upon the parties engaged in them the punishments which attend the violation of the laws.

Given at Our Court at Buckingham-Palace, this ninth day of March, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fifty four, and in the seventeenth year of Our reign.

By the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council.

W HEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the eleventh and twelfth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to renew and amend an Act of the

"tenth year of Her present Majesty, for the more "speedy removal of certain nuisances and the prevention of contagious and epidemic diseases, after reciting that it is expedient, that when any part of the United Kingdom shall appear to be threatened with or affected by any formidable epidemic, endemic, or contagious disease, measures of precaution should be taken with promptitude, according to the exigency of the case; it is enacted, that in Great Britain, the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, or any three or more of them (the Lord President of the Council, or one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State being one), may, by Order or Orders to be by them, from time to time, made, direct that the provisions in the said Act contained for the prevention of epidemic, endemic, and contagious diseases, be put in force in Great Britain, or in such parts thereof, or in such places therein, respectively, as in such Order or Orders respectively may be expressed, and may, from time to time, as to all or any of the parts or places to which any such Order or Orders may extend, and in like manner revoke or renew any such Order, and, subject to revocation and renewal as aforesaid, every such Order shall be in force for six calendar months, or for such shorter period as in such Order shall be expressed.

And whereas, on the fifteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, an Order was made by the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, reciting that the United Kingdom appeared to be threatened with a formidable epidemic disease, and that a case had arisen for putting in force the provisions of the said Act, and directing, in pursuance and exercise of the powers so vested in them as aforesaid, that the provisions contained in the said hereinbefore recited Act, for the prevention of epidemic, endemic, and contagious diseases, be put in force throughout the whole of Great Britain immediately from and after the date of the said Order; and it was further directed that the said Order should continue in force for six calendar months from and after the date

And whereas it is expedient that the said Order be renewed: now, therefore, it is hereby directed by the Lords and others of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council (of whom the Right Honourable Viscount Palmerston, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State is one), in pursuance and exercise of the powers so vested in them as aforesaid, that the said Order, of the fifteenth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, be and the same is hereby renewed for a period of six calendar months from and after the date of this present Order.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Commissioners for the affairs of India, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the powers vested in Her by the said "Foreign Deserters Act, 1852," and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that from and after the publication hereof in the London Gazette, seamen, not being slaves, who desert from merchant ships belonging to subjects of the Grand Duke of Merklenburg-Schwerin within Her Majesty's dominions, or the territories of the East India Company, shall be liable to be apprehended and carried on board their respective ships.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of Her Majesty's Treasury, and the Commissioners for the affairs of India, are to give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the "burial of the dead in the metropolis," it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, burials in any part or parts of the metropolis, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial in the metropolis, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that from and after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such part or parts of the metropolis, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require; provided that notice of such representation, and of the time when it shall please Her Majesty to order the same to be taken into consideration by the Privy Council, shall be published in the London Gazette, and shall be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of the parishes in which any burial-grounds or places of burial affected by such representation shall be situate, or on some other conspicuous places, within the part or parts of the metropolis affected by such representation, one calendar month, or where any order, made under "The Nuisances Removal and Diseases Prevention Act, 1848," directing the provisions of that Act, for the prevention of epidemic, endemic, and contagious diseases, to be put in

force, is in force within such part or parts, then seven days at the least before such representation is so considered; provided always that no such representation shall be made in relation to the burial-ground of any parish until ten days' previous notice of the intention to make such representation shall have been given to the Incumbent and the Vestry Clerk of such parish:

And whereas an Order, dated the fifteenth day of September last, made under the last recited Act, directing the provisions of that Act for the prevention of epidemic, endemic, and contagious diseases to be put in force, is in force throughout the

whole of Great Britain:

And whereas the Right Honourable Viscount Palmerston, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Vestry Clerks of the parishes here-inafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has made a representation, stating that, for the protection of the public health, burials should be discontinued in the hereinafter-mentioned parishes and places:

And whereas Her Majesty in Council was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the thirtieth of January last, to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on the eighteenth day of February last; and such Order has been published in the London Gazette; and copies thereof have been affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of the said parishes, or on some conspicuous places within the part or parts of the metropolis affected by such representation, seven days at the least before he said eighteenth day of February.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with he advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be iscontinued, as follows, in the under-mentioned larishes and places, from and after the sixteenth cay of this instant March (except as is herein

(therwise directed); viz.:

ST. JOHN HACKNEY.—No more than one body to be buried in one grave, except in private vaults and graves, in St. Thomas-square Burial-ground; and burials to be wholly discontinued therein from and after the first day of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

St. Luke's Old-street.—Burials in the vaults under St. Barnabas Church, King-square,

to be wholly discontinued.

St. George Hanover-square.—The old and new burial-grounds to be closed; and burials to cease immediately in all the churches and chapels in the parish.

St. Saviour Southwark.—Burials to be wholly discontinued within the church and church vaults of St. Saviour and in the Col-

lege Burial-ground.
St. Leonard Shoreditch.—Burials to be wholly discontinued within Worship-street Chapel Burial-ground, and within Gloucesterstreet Chapel Burial-ground.

3T. MICHAEL BASSISHAW.—Burials to be wholly discontinued within the church, and in the

vaults connected therewith.

3r. Mary Stratford Bow .- No more than one body to be buried (except in private vaults and graves), in each grave in the Baptist Burial-ground, and burials to be wholly discontinued therein from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.

HEREAS the Right Honourable Viscount Palmerston, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned, ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to amend the laws "concerning the burial of the dead in England beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to " amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead " in the metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the undermentioned places, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications:

SHREWSBURY .- Burials to be wholly discontinued at once in St. Mary's Church, and from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in St. Mary's Churchyard. In St. Michael's Churchyard (except in private vaults and graves), no more than one body to be buried in any grave, and burials to cease wholly therein from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six. Burials to be discontinued in St. Alkmond's Church forthwith, and in the churchyard from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five. Burials to be discontinued forthwith in St. Mary's Roman Catholic Chapel Burialground and within the chapel, in Claremontstreet Chapel Burial-ground and the chapel, and in Swan Hill Chapel Burial-ground; and from and after the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the Quakers' Burial-ground. Burials to be discontinued forthwith in St. Julian's Church, and from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the old and new churchyards. In the churchyard of Trinity Coleham (except in private vaults and graves), no more than one body to be buried in any grave; and burials to be wholly discontinued therein from and after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six. Burials within St. Giles's Church to be wholly discontinued; no more than one body to be buried in any grave in St. Giles's Churchyard, and no burial to take place within twenty feet of the church. Burials to be wholly discontinued within the church and churchyard of Holy Cross.

KEW.—Burials underneath the parish church to be discontinued forthwith, and in the old portion of the parish burial-ground from and after the first of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four.

Petersham.—Burials underneath the church, and in the churchyard within five yards of the church or the houses which adjoin the churchyard, to be forthwith discontinued; with the exception of family vaults and graves, only one body to be buried in each grave; and from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, burials to be wholly discontinued in the churchyard.

PLYMOUTH.—Burials to be forthwith discontinued in the churches and churchyards of St. Andrew and of Charles the Martyr, in the burial-ground of St. Andrew's parish in West Well-street, in the Presbyterian Chapelyard, in Baher-street, and in the Ebenezer Methodist Chapel-yard, except in vaults in the open air, in which each coffin buried shall be imbedded in peat charcoal, and separately entombed in concrete or masonry.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty in Council is pleased hereby to give notice of such representation, and to order that the same be taken into consideration by a Committee of the Lords of Her Majesty's Most Honourable Privy Council, on

the twentieth day of April next.

And Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith published in the London Gazette; and that copies thereof be affixed on the doors of the churches or chapels of, or on some conspicuous places within, the parishes affected by such representation, one month before the said twentieth day of April.

Board of Trade, Whitehall, March 9, 1854.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a translation of a Sardinian Law (a copy of which is hereunto subjoined) repealing all duties on the exportation and importation of all kinds of grain, and farinaceous food.

(Translation.)

THE Senate and Chamber of Deputies have adopted, and we have ordained, and do ordain, as follows:

Art. 1. The modifications in the customs duties with regard to grains, sanctioned by the Royal Decrees of the 6th and 27th October, 1853, are approved of.

Art. 2. All duties, differential and others, on the importation, exportation, and bonding of the

following articles, are abolished:

Wheat, mixture (of wheat, rye, and pulse), maize, rye, rice, rice seed, beans, flour, French beans, pulse, barley, Turkish wheat, lentils, lupins, millet, peas, spelt, vetches, split and matted grains and legumes, flour of grain, chestnuts and roots, fecula of manioc and of potatoes, bread, semola, maccaroni stuffs, bran, and the residue of ground corns.

Art. 3. Communes cannot in future impose any duties on the consumption and manufacture

of the articles aforesaid.

Art. 4. From the 1st of April, 1854, all duties on the consumption and manufacture of the aforesaid articles, already imposed by communes, shall cease.

The President of the Council of Ministers, the Secretary of State for Finances, Agriculture, and Commerce, is charged with the execution of the present Law, which shall be registered at the "Controllo Generale," as published and inserted in the Government Acts.
