WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board the Draft of a Proclamation, extending the provisions of a Proclamation regulating the rates at which certain foreign coins are

to pass current within Her Majesty's West India (lolonies, and also extending the same to Her lujesty's province of British Guiana.

Her Majesty having taken the same into con-ideration was pleased, by and with the advice of ler Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said Proclamation do take effect and come into force in each of her said colonies, and in her said proince, upon and after such day as shall be for : hat purpose limited by the Governor or Officer : dministering the government of each of the said colonies or province respectively, by any pro-clamation to be by them respectively issued for uch purpose in each of such colonies or province.

And the Right Honourable the Lords Commis-Noble the Duke of Newcastle, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, are to rive the necessary directions herein accordingly.

DRAFT PROCLAMATION.

Whereas by our Proclamation, given at our Court at Osborne House, Isle of Wight, on nineeenth August, one thousand eight hundred and ifty-three, rates were fixed at which certain gold poins of the United States of North America hould circulate and be received in payment in our West India Colonies, and whereas it is expeclient to extend the provisions of such Proclamation to other gold coins of the said United States not specified in the same, and also to extend the provisions thereof, as well as of this our Proclamation, to our province of British Guiana.

Now, therefore, We, by the advice of our Privy Council, have thought fit to declare and ordain, and, by the advice aforesaid, We do hereby eleclare and ordain that the rate fixed by our said Proclamation for the gold coin of the said United States, called the eagle, shall apply proportion-tely to the double eagle or other multiple or aultiples of the eagle; and, further, that the pro-isions of our said Proclamation, and of this our Proclamation, shall extend to our province of British Guiana, so that in all payments to be nade in our said province, tender of payment in the gold coins of the said United States, or either of them, at the rates specified, shall be deemed and taken to be a lawful tender, in the same :nanner as if such tender had been made in the current coin of our United Kingdom.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the third year of the reign of His late Majesty King Beorge the Fourth, intituled "An Act for the ' further continuing, altering, and amending several Acts for the better regulation of lastage and bal-' lastage in the River Thames, and for enabling the Corporation of the Trinity House, Deptford Strond, to reduce, alter, modify, relinquish, or 'abolish dues payable to the said Corporation, and for other purposes connected therewith," it was macted that certain rates and prices should be paid by the owners, masters, or agents of vessels passing and repassing in the River Thames, for ballast

supplied to them by the Corporation of the Trinity House;

And whereas the said Trinity House have, under the said recited Act, been in the habit of supplying ballast in the manner, and on the terms therein provided, but were not under the said recited Act in the habit of placing the same on board vessels,

or of unloading the same therefrom;

And whereas by the fourteenth section of the "Merchant Shipping Law Amendment Act, 1853," it was provided that if, in addition to the duties theretofore performed, in consideration of the said ballastage rates received under the said recited Act, the Trinity House, at the request or with the consent of the owners or masters of, or agents for, any ships, should undertake to place ballast on board thereof, or to unload ballast therefrom, they should be entitled to charge for such additional duties such reasonable additional charge per ton for ballast so placed on board, or unladen, as Her Majesty, by Order in Council, might from time to time approve;

And whereas by an Order in Council, dated the twenty-fourth day of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-three, Her Majesty, acting in pursuance of the said fourteenth section of the "Merchant Shipping Law Amendment Act, 1853," was pleased to approve of certain rates specified in the said Order, as rates which might be properly established and paid to the Elder Brethren of the Trinity House, by the owners or masters of, or agents for, any ships, who might be desirous that the Trinity House should undertake to place ballast on board, or unload it from such ships, in addition to the rates already payable for placing the ballast alongside the same;

And whereas the Elder Brethren of the Trinity House have submitted to Her Majesty that the said scale of rates fixed by the said recited Order may, so far as respects the delivery of ballast on board such ships as therein mentioned, be reduced, and that the following rates may be substituted in lieu

thereof, viz.:

For vessels having ports, 3d. (three pence) for every ton of ballast placed on board;

For vessels not having ports, 5½d. (five pence and one half-penny) for every ton of ballast placed on board;

such rates to be in addition to the rates now payable for placing the ballast alongside the same;

And whereas such reduced scale of rates appears to be proper and reasonable;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, by virtue of the power vested in Her by the said recited Act, and by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, is pleased to approve, and doth hereby approve of the said scale of rates so submitted as aforesaid, in lieu of the rates fixed for the same service by the said recited Order in Council.

"Commissioners appointed to consider the state "of the Established Church in England and "Wales with reference to Ecclesiastical Duties "and Revenues, so far as they relate to Episcopal "Dioceses, Revenues, and Patronage," and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, "with certain modifications, the fourth report of "the Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and "Revenues, " and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fourth and fifth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act "to explain and amend two several Acts relating " to the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-third day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the words and figures following; that is to say:

. "We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, intituled 'An Act for carrying into effect the reports of the Commissioners appointed to consider the state of the Established Church in England and Wales, with reference to Ecclesiastical Duties and Revenues, so far as they relate to Episcopal Dioceses, Revenues, and 'Patronage,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, ' the fourth report of the Commissioners of Eccle-'siastical Duties and Revenues,' and of another Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the fourth and fifth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to explain and amend two several Acts relating to the Ecclesiastical Com-' missioners for England,' have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council the following scheme for substituting a money payment to the Bishop of Exeter for certain estates belonging to his see.

"Whereas it was, by the secondly and thirdly recited Acts enacted, that by the authority therein provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same), and for the purpose of fully carrying into effect any of the provisions of the same Acts, or of the said first recited Act, any arrangement might from time to time be made with the consent in writing, under the corporate seal of any bishop, for the sale, transfer, or exchange of any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments belonging to the see of such bishop, or for the purchase of other lands, tithes, or other hereditaments in lieu thereof, or for substituting in any case any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments, for any money payment, or any money payment for any lands, tithes, or other hereditaments.

"And whereas the right Reverend Henry, Bishop of Exeter, is seised, in right of his see, of the manors or lordships, lands, and hereditaments described in the first schedule hereunto annexed, the whole or the greater part of which are comprised in certain leases which are enumerated in the second schedule hereunto annexed.

"And whereas one of the purposes of the said Acts is to provide a fund for making better provision for the cure of souls, and we are of opinion that it would ultimately conduce to the improvement of the said fund that the said manors, lands, and hereditaments should be transferred from the

said see of Exeter to us, and that an annual money payment to the said Henry, Bishop of Exeter, and his successors, should forthwith be substituted for the same.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the said Henry, Bishop of Exeter, testified by his having signed this scheme and sealed the same with his corporate seal, that from and after the day of the due publication in the London Gazette of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law, other than such duly gazetted Order, the manors or lordships, lands, and hereditaments so described or referred to in the said schedules hereunto annexed (excepting any right of ecclesiastical patronage), and all the estate, right, title, and interest therein and thereto of the said Henry, Bishop of Exeter, and of his successors, bishops of Exeter, shall be, and become conveyed and transferred from the said bishop, and his successors, bishops of Exeter, and shall be absolutely vested in us (subject to any legally subsisting leases or grants thereof), as from the sixth day of May now last past for the purposes of the said Acts.

"And we further recommend and propose, that in consideration of, and for such conveyance and transfer, and in substitution for the said manors or lordships, lands, and hereditaments, there shall be paid by us to the said Henry, Bishop of Exeter, and his successors, bishops of Exeter, the annual sum of one thousand one hundred and ten pounds, by equal half-yearly payments, and that the first of such payments shall be considered to have accrued due on the sixth day of November now last past, and that the next of such payments shall be made on the sixth day of May now next

ensuing.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

All that the manor or lordship of Penryn, com-prising the lordship of the borough of Penryn, the manors of Penryn Forryn and Minster, with the harbour dues and other rights in the ports of Penryn, Falmouth, and Helford, and all and singular its rights, members, and appurtenances, situate, lying, and being in the parishes of Saint Gluvias, Mylor, Mabe, Budock, Constantine, Manaccan, and elsewhere, in the county of Cornwall or elsewhere; and also all that the manor or lordship of Tregaire, with all and singular its rights, members, and appurtenances, situate, lying, and being in the parishes of Saint Gerrans, Saint Just, Philleigh, Ruan, Langhorne, and elsewhere, in the said county of Cornwall or elsewhere; together with all and singular the messuages, houses, buildings, barns, stables, structures, shops, mills, dove-houses, haggards, gardens, orchards, lands, tenements, meadows, leasows, fields, fens, nastures, feedings, commons, ways, fisheries, fishings, fishing-places, woods, underwoods, soil of woods, and hereditaments, with their and every of their appurtenances unto the said several manors or lordships respectively belonging or in anywise appertaining, or to or with the same or any of them used, occupied, or enjoyed or accepted, reputed or taken to be part, parcel, or member thereof, or thereunto belonging or appertaining; together also with all free and copyhold and other rents arising within or belonging to the said

several manors or lordships, and all fairs, and | exigent, escheats, reliefs, heriots, fealties, services, markets, and courts, to the same belonging, tolls, customs, piccage, stallage, bushelage, measurage, wharfage, anchorage, keelage, carinage, and wrecks, and also all views of frankpledge courts-leet, courts-baron, borough-courts, and other courts, perquisites and profits of courts, fines, amerciaments, waifs, estrays, deodands, goods of felons

warrens, mines, quarries, furze, heaths, commons, moors, wastes, marshes, turbaries, waters, water-courses, streams, wears, banks, stanks, floodgates, fishings, winnowing places, hawking, hunting, and all other royalties, privileges, profits, and advan-tages whatsoever to the said several manors or lordships respectively belonging or in anywise and fugitives, and persons outlawed and put in appertaining, or therewith used or enjoyed.

WHEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners VV for England have, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to carry into effect, with cer-"tain modifications, the fourth report of the "Commissioners of Ecclesiastical Duties and "Revenues," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-third day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the words following, that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the third and fourth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to carry into effect, with certain modifications, ' the fourth report of the Commissioners of Ecclesi-'astical Duties and Revenues,' have prepared and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for augmenting the income of the Archdenconry of Salop, in the diocese of

Lichfield.

"Whereas it was by the said recited Act enacted, that so soon as conveniently might be, and by the authority therein provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying the same), any archdeaconry might, subject to the consent of the bishop, be endowed, amongst other modes, by augmentation out of the common fund in the same Act mentioned, but not so as in that case to raise the average annual income thereof, to an amount exceeding two hundred pounds, with a proviso that no archdeacon should be entitled to hold any endowment or augmentation, or other emolument as such archdeacon under the provisions of the same Act, unless resident for the space of eight months in every year within the diocese in which his archdeaconry should be situate, but subject to the same provisions as to licenses for non residence, which are enacted with respect to incumbents of benefices by the Act relating to pluralities and residence in the same Act mentioned.

"And whereas by an Order of your Majesty in Council, bearing date the tenth day of December, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fortytwo, and duly gazetted, it was provided that the annual sum of one hundred and fifty pounds should be paid by us to the Archdeacon of Salop, for the

time being.

"And whereas the amount of the said grant of one hundred and fifty pounds per annum was fixed on the assumption that the average annual income of the said archdeaconry, arising from other sources, amounted to fifty pounds, and it has been made to appear to us that such average annual income did not exceed the sum of thirty-four

"We therefore humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Lichfield, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, that in addition to the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds in the said first recited Order mentioned, there shall be paid by us out of the Common Fund in the said Act mentioned, to the Archdencon of Salop, in the diocese of Lichfield, for the time being, the further annual sum of sixteen pounds; and that a rateable payment from the date of his appointment to the I

first day of January now last past, shall be forth-with made to the Venerable John Allen, the present holder of the said archdeaconry, and that every future payment shall be made only on production to us of a certificate from the bishop that the archdeacon claiming the same has duly resided within the Diocese of Lichfield, according to the provisions of the said recited Act, or has been legally exempt from such residence.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the said archdeaconry, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other

Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law, immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the Diocese of Lichfield.

HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners VV for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for "the spiritual care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-third day of February, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the spiritual care of 'populous parishes,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for authorizing the sale of certain property formerly belonging to the prebend of Grantham Australis, in the cathedral church of

Salisbury, and now vested in us.

"Whereas it is by the said Act (amongst other things) enacted, that notwithstanding the charge by that Act created (being a charge created in favour of the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne), all the same and the like powers and rights of ownership as are possessed and enjoyed respecting and over any lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or other hereditaments whatsoever, by any absolute owner thereof, shall be enjoyed by us with respect to and over all or any lands, tithes, rent-charges, tenements, or other hereditaments vested in us under certain Acts therein mentioned (being the Acts under which the property hereinafter described is vested in us), and may, subject to the provisions of the same Acts, and of the now reciting Act, be exercised by us, by proper instruments in writing, duly executed according to law, with a certain proviso respecting the application

of every sum of money received as the consideration or purchase money for the sale, transfer, or conveyance by us of any of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments, or of any estate or interest therein, and with a further proviso that none of such lands, tithes, tenements, or other hereditaments be sold, transferred, or conveyed, except by the authority of a scheme, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council ratifying the same:

"And whereas all the lands, tenements, hereditaments, and endowments formerly belonging to the said prebend of Grantham Australis (except any right of ecclesiastical patronage), became vested in us under or by virtue of an Order of your Majesty in Council, dated the thirteenth day of June, one thousand eight hundred and fiftythree, and duly published in the London Gazette on the seventeenth day of the same month, subject to any legally subsisting lease or leases thereof:

"And whereas application has been made to us for the purchase of all our estate and interest in certain portions of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments; and, after due consideration, it appears to us to be expedient that we should be empowered to dispose of our interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, in such manner as

shall appear to us to be advisable:

"We, therefore, humbly recommend and propose, that we may be authorized and empowered, by instrument or instruments in writing duly executed according to law, from time to time to sell and duly to convey, according to the provisions of the said Act, all or any of the said lands, tenements, hereditaments, or endowments heretofore belonging to the said prebend of Grantham Australis, and so vested in us as aforesaid, with their appurtenances, and all our estate, right, title, and interest therein, or in any part or parts thereof, unto and to the use of any person or persons desirous or willing to purchase the same, and his or their heirs, executors, administrators, or assigns, or otherwise, as he or they shall direct or appoint, and for such consideration as shall upon due calculation and inquiry appear to us to be just and reasonable.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Salisbury.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the

fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend "and render more effectual an Act passed in the "last session of Parliament for building and pro-"moting the building of additional churches in "populous parishes," and in the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision "for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to "churches or chapels augmented by the Governors "of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other "purposes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the twenty-first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the words following, viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Tatenhill, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Mary, situate at Dunstall, in the said parish of Tatenhill, under and by virtue of the powers contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous pa-'rishes,' and in the third section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to 'make better provision for the assignment of 'ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen 'Anne, and for other purposes,' and of all other powers in this behalf contained in the Church Building Acts, and that such district should be named or called 'The District Chapelry of Dunstall, and that the boundaries thereof, should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

Commencing at a fence on the north-west side of the public road, between Dunstall and Tatenhill, and which fence divides the townships of Dunstall and Tatenhill, and being the division fence between number 66 in the tithe apportionment plan of the township of Dunstall, and number 302 in the tithe apportionment plan of Tatenhill; and proceeding north-westwardly along the said fence, to the Highlands Park boundary fence; thence south-westwardly, westwardly, and northwardly; and thence westwardly along the said boundary fence, between Dunstall and Highlands Park, to the ancient fence between the said Highlands Park and the late Forest of Needwood, at a point of the fence abutting upon the north-west corner of number 25 in the said Dunstall plan; thence south-westwardly along the fence dividing the old inclosures of Dunstall Township (numbered in the said plan, 22, 21, 2, and 1) from Her Majesty's allotment on the said late forest, numbered 405 in the first award, to the south-west corner of Three Stile Hole; thence westwardly along a fence dividing the said allotment 405 from allotment 500, in the second award, to the public road from Barton-gate to Tutbury, called Barton-road; thence across the said road, and thence northwardly along the west side thereof to the fence dividing Her Majesty's Allotment 412, in the said first award, from Tatenhill Tithe Allotment 414, in the said first award; thence westwardly along the said fence, for the distance of about two hundred and sixty yards, to a fence dividing the said townships of Dunstall

and Barton-under-Needwood, in the said tithe allotment; thence south along the said fence to the public road between Dunstall and Yoxall, called the Dunstall Road; thence westwardly along the north side of the said road to opposite the north-east corner of Sherholt Lodge Farm; thence across the said road, and south-eastwardly along the fence dividing the said Sherholt Lodge Farm from the allotment on the said late forest, number 568, in the said second award, to the south-east corner of the said Sherholt Lodge Farm; thence north-eastwardly along the fence dividing the said allotment 568 from allotment 569, in Barton aforesaid, to the public road from Barton to Yoxhall Lodge, called Mosey Meer Road; thence south-eastwardly along the south-westward side of the said road to its junction with the Barton Road; thence across the said road, and northwardly along the east side thereof, to the fence dividing allotment 521 from allotment 522, in the second award; thence south-eastwardly along the said fence to the Long Close, near Woodside; thence south-westwardly along the fence dividing the said allotment 522 from an old inclosure in Dunstall township, called Long Close, and numbered in the said Dunstall plan 113; thence south-eastwardly along the fence dividing the said townships of Dunstall and Barton, to the south-east corner of the said number 113 (and having on the Barton side numbers 568, 569, 570, and 572); thence north-eastwardly along the south-east end of the said number 113; thence north-eastwardly, eastwardly and northwardly, and again eastwardly, and then northwardly and eastwardly, to the public road leading from Barton to Tatenhill, public road leading from Barton to Tatenhill, along the boundary between the said townships of Dunstall and Barton, chiefly by a broken boundary line, and having on the Dunstall side numbers 112, 114, 115, 116, 117, 119, 119a, and 121, and on the Barton side numbers 574, 575, 576, 577, 578, 578a, 578b, and 586); thence across the said road, and then southwardly along the east side thereof, for the distance of about fiftysix yards; thence eastwardly along the line of an old fence, now stocked up, to where it falls into the line of the new fence, at or near the fence between numbers 587 and 610, in the said Barton Tithe Plan; thence eastwardly along the boundary fence between Dunstall and Barton to Gorse Hall Farm (and having on the Dunstall side numbers 122, 129, 130, 131, and 134, and on the Barton side 610, 611, 612, 613, 614, 617, and 618a); thence eastwardly to the Newbold Farm, through Barton township, by a fence dividing 619 on the north, from 618 and 618a, on the south; thence southwardly, south-eastwardly, southwardly, eastwardly and northwardly, and again eastwardly, and crossing the Grand Trunk, or Trent and Mersey Canal, to the turnpike-road between Lichfield and Burton-on-Trent, and surrounding Newbold on three sides, by and along fences, and the lines of broken fences between the said townships (and having on the Dunstall side numbers 176, 177, 178, 179, 180, 181, 182, 183, 184, 185, 186, 187, 188, and 189, and on the Barton side numbers 618, 436, 435, 432, 431, 638, 637, 636, 635, 634, 630, 631, 642, and 643); thence eastwardly across the said turnpike-road, and by the boundary fence to and over the Midland Railway, to the south-east corner of number 219, in Dunstall; thence north-eastwardly to Tatenhill township, along the boundary fence between Dunstall and Barton as aforesaid (and having on the Dunstall side 216, 217, 218, 219, 220, and 221, and on the Barton side 648a, 644, 662, 684, 684a, 685, and 687); thence eastwardly along the boundary fence between Barton aforesaid and Tatenhill

township, and having on the Tatenhill side numbers 368, 369, and 370, in the said Tatenhill plan, and on the Barton side the said number 687; thence southwardly to the River Trent, along the boundary line between a detached part of Dunstall township, number 223, and the said number 687 in Barton; thence eastwardly along the middle of the said river, to opposite the fence dividing the said township of Tatenhill from Branston township, in the parish of Burton-on-Trent, at the eastern corner of number 380; thence north-westwardly along the boundary line separating the parish of Burton-upon-Trent from the parish of I atenhill, as far as the south-eastwardly corner of enclosure number 363, in the township of Tatenhill, at the point where two watercourses meet; thence westwardly, south-westwardly. and north-westwardly, by and along the watercourse on the south-westward side of such enclosure, and by the northeastern side of Tatenhill Common-lane to the said public road between Dunstall and Tatenhill first hereinbefore mentioned (and having on the Dunstall side numbers 204 in Dunstall, 361, part 359, 328, 327, 326, and 325, in Tatenhill, 157 in Dunstall, and 312 and 307 Tatenhill Commonlane, in Tatenhill, and on the Tatenhill side 363, 362, part 359, 358, 329, 331, 332, and 333 in Tatenhill, and 153 and 152 in Dunstall, and 309 and 308 in Tatenhill; thence across the said road, and along the north-westwardly side thereof, to the point where the boundary of the said district chapelry of Dunstall commences at the northeast corner of number 66 as aforesaid, and which said district chapelry is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon tinted green.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed in the said church of Saint Mary, at Dunstall, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time being.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections, herein-before mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment for a district chapelry to the said consecrated church of Saint Mary, at Dunstall, in the parish of Tatenhill, be accordingly made, and the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials in the said church, and in respect of the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act * to amend the laws concerning the burial of the " dead in England, beyond the limits of the metro-"polis, and to amend the Act concerning the "burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for he protection of the public health, the opening of my new burial-ground in any city or town, or vithin any other limits, save with the previous approval of one of such Secretaries of State, should pe prohibited, or that burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that no new burial-ground shall be opened in any city or town, or within such limits, without such previous approval, or (as the case may require), that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require.

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the eighteenth of February last, to direct that burials should be discontinued in the churchyard of St. Mary Magdalene, Taunton, from and after the first of March, one thousand

eight hundred and fifty-four.

And whereas the Right Honourable Viscount Palmerston, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has represented that the time for closing the said churchyard may be extended to the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four.

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said representation into consideration, is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials in the churchyard of St. Mary Magdalene, Taunton, be discontinued from and after the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, instead of from and after the first of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four.
