

mince, with the Troops they drew from thence. An Officer who arrived here some days ago from Valachie, has told the King, that the Veyvode or Prince of that Country, is resolv'd to quit his Engagements with the Turks so soon as he can be assur'd of protection from hence.

Paris, July 13. The 10th Instant, the Troops of the King's Household began to encamp in the Plain of Acheres, where, it's said, they will continue till the end of the next month; The Dauphin is General, and the Duke de Noailles commands under him. Yesterday his Majesty went to Maintenon, to see the Aqueduct, and other Works that are making, to bring the River d'Eure to Versailles. The Sieur Foran, who commands a Squadron of the King's Ships, having met the 25th past near Cape Finister, two Spanish Galeons (which had on Board 1500 Men) and not knowing of the Accommodation, after an obstinate Fight took them, and carried them to Rochelle. The King, upon the News of it, sent Orders for the discharging the said Galeons, and commanded that particular care should be taken of above 150 Spanish Officers and Soldiers that were wounded in the Fight. His M. C. Majesty has likewise given Orders for the taking off the Seizures on the Spanish Estates within the French Conquests. The Letters we have from the Imperial Camp before Buda tell us, that the Resolution having been taken in a Council of War the 11th of the last Month to besiege Buda, and two Prisoners that were taken the next day by a Party which had been sent out to learn News of the Enemy, having confirm'd the Advice, the Duke of Lorraine had received of the condition of that place, the Imperial Forces pass'd the Danube the 13th at Gyra, the Troops of Bavaria reinforced with a Detachment of four Imperial Regiments marching at the same time towards Pest. The 14th, by break of day, the Imperial Cavalry advanced towards Szegrad, the Detach, and the ill ways obliging the Foot to stay behind with the Cannon. The 15th, the Horse advanced an Hungarian mile beyond Kecvad, followed by the Foot and the Artillery. The 16th, they came within sight of Buda, but none of the Troops of the Garrison appeared. The 17th, the Cavalry made a Halt to rest themselves, and to give the Foot time to come up. The 18th, the Infantry arriv'd before Buda, and took their Posts within half a mile of the Town, and the same day they began to work on their Lines of Circumvallation. The Enemy, while the Imperialists were taking their Posts, fired upon them with their Cannon, but did them no harm; And a Detachment of Horse and Foot of the Garrison appeared without the Vienna Gate, who seeing some Imperial Horse advance, to charge them, presently retired. The 19th, the Duke of Lorraine caus'd the Army to approach nearer to the Town, and fix'd the Head-quarter within a quarter of a mile of it. In the mean time the Elector of Bavaria had made himself Master of Pest, the Turks that were there retiring to Buda; And having put a good Garrison into the Place, his Electoral Highness march'd towards the Ill of St. Andrew to pass the Danube there. The gottas Janissary who got out of the Town, were in the Camp, and reported that there were not in the Place above 7000 Men of regulat'd Troops, besides the Inhabitants, which the Viceroy had oblig'd to bear Arms. And that some few days before the Place was invested, 2000 Men were sent from thence to reinforce the Garrisons of Agria, and as many to Alba Regalis, the Turks not believing the Imperialists would undertake the Siege of Buda. The same day (the 20th) the Cannon arriv'd in the Camp.

The 21, the Trenches were opened, and the Elector of Bavaria arriv'd before the place. The 22; they began to batter the Lower Town from two Batteries. The 23th, they had made a Breach of 24 Paces. And the Night following they lodg'd themselves there, with the loss of three or four men only, the Turks retiring into the Castle.

Paris, July 17. The King returned the 15th to Versailles.
