WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend "and render more effectual an Act passed in the "last session of Parliament for building and pro-"moting the building of additional churches in "populous parishes," and in the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, "for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to "churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," or of any other powers in that behalf contained in the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the thirty-first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, in the words following, viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent, that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Saint James, Clerkenwell, in the county of Middlesex, and in the diocese of London, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated chapel of Saint James, situate at Pentonville, in the said parish of Saint James, Clerkenwell, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend 'and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes, and in the third section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' or of any other powers in this behalf, contained in the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed district should be named or called 'The District Chapelry of Pentonville,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The district chapelry of Pentonville is to consist of the northern extremity of the parish of Saint James, Clerkenwell, and is bounded on the east, north, and west, by the parish of Saint Mary Islington, and on the south by the parish of Saint Pancras, and the northern boundaries of the district chapelry of Saint Philip and the district parish of Saint Mark Clerkenwell, as follows:

The boundary line commences at that corner of London.

White Lion-street situated in High-street, Islington, and proceeding northerly to the south side of Sermon-lane; thence westerly, in the line of the parish boundary across White Conduit, Penton, Rodney, Cumming, and Southampton-streets, including the south side of South-street and Melville-terrace; then across the Caledonian-road and southerly across a portion of Caledoniancrescent, crossing Pentonville-hill, the same being the boundary-line separating the parishes of Islington and Clerkenwell; then to the south-east, along Hamilton-row, to the west end of Pentonplace, the same being the boundary-line separating the parishes of Saint Pancras and Clerkenwell; from thence in a north-easterly direction, by line of south boundary of garden walls belonging to the houses of Penton-place and Queen's-row, which walls are the boundary between Mr. Penton's estate and the estate of the New River Company; it then arrives at the north-west Company; it then arrives at the north-west corner of Claremont-square, from which, pro-ceeding northerly, across the New-road to Penton-street, and up the middle of Penton-street, as far as White Lion-street; then proceeding easterly along the middle of White Lion-street, to the corner whence the boundary commenced as the said district chapelry of Pentonville is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured blue.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings, should be solemnized or performed in the said chapel, at Pentonville aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be received for or on account of and paid to the present incumbent of the said parish of Saint James, Clerkenwell, during his incumbency thereof, but upon the first avoidance of the said parish which shall occur, the said fees should be paid and belong to the incumbent for the time being, of the said chapel of Saint James, Pentonville.

"That the consent of the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Charles James, Bishop of the said diocese of London, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections, hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof the said Charles James, Bishop of London, has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the said consecrated chapel of Saint James, at Pentonville, in the parish of Saint James, Clerkenwell, be accordingly made, and the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, and churchings in the said chapel, and in respect of the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese C. "Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Tipton, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint John, situate at Princes End, in the said parish of Tipton, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building 'and promoting the building of additional 'churches in populous parishes,' and in the third section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to 'churches or chapels augmented by the Gover-'nors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for 'other purposes,' and that such proposed district should be named or called 'The District Chapelry of Saint John Tipton,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:—commencing on Wednesbury Oak Bridge, erected over the Upper Level of the Birmingham Canal, and then proceeding southerly along the middle of the said canal to a bridge erected over a side branch of such canal, which leads into the enclosures of the Gospel Oak Works; and thence in a direct line south-easterly to a point in the middle of a bridge erected near Gospel Oak House, over the Ocker Hill Branch of the Upper Level of the said Birmingham Canal; and thence towards the south in a direct line to the western corner of an ancient house called 'Cotterill's;' and from thence towards the south-east in a direct line to Toll End Bridge, and from the said bridge in a westerly direction along the middle of the canal, over which the said Toll End Bridge is erected, to within about fifty yards of Moat Bridge; and thence it proceeds north-easterly (excluding Moat House,) to a bridge called Chatwin's Bridge, over the Wolverhampton Level of the Birmingham Canal, and proceeds along the middle of the said canal northwestwardly to a bridge called Soaker's Bridge, over the said canal; and then proceeds over the

said bridge in a direct line north-westwardly, to the point where the turnpike-road leading from Dudley to Gospel Oak and Bilston commences; it then proceeds north-eastwardly along the middle of that road to Wednesbury Oak Bridge, where the boundary of the said district chapelry of Saint John Tipton commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereunto annexed, and thereon coloured pink.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Consul at Mexico, inclosing translation of a Mexican Decree (a copy of which is subjoined), respecting the regulations to be observed by Commercial Associations of mixed nationality, with a view to their being placed under the protection of one Government

(Copy.) (Translation.)

Ministry for Foreign Affairs. His Serene Highness the General President has been pleased to send me the following Decree.

Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna,

&c. &c.

Art. 1. In those Commercial Association contracts in which all the partners are foreigners, if three-fourths of them are of the same nation, the Association will bear the character of that nationality.

If the partners be of two nations, and equally divided as to persons, the nationality of the Company will be that of the persons who represent the greatest amount of capital; and should this be variable amongst partners of different nations, they must choose amongst themselves the nationality which they may deem most convenient, within three months after the publication of this Decree for already existing Companies, and within one month for those which may be formed in future.

This notice must be given in to the Ministry for Foreign Affairs, that the necessary inscription be made in the registry relating to foreigners

Art. 2. The infraction of this Law will be punished by a fine of from one thousand to ten thousand dollars, to be destined to the support of some beneficial establishment; and the Associa-tion will not be able to claim the protection of any foreign nationality.

Wherefore I command that this be printed, made public, circulated, and that due fulfilment

be given to it.

The Queen, taking into Her royal consideration that, upon the decease of John Earl of Shrewsbury without issue male, in the month of November last, the title and dignity of Earl of Shrewsbury devolved upon Bertram Arthur Talbot, now Earl of Shrewsbury, as eldest and only surviving son of Charles Thomas Talbot, the only son that left issue of Francis Talbot, younger brother of George Earl of Shrewsbury, who died in 1787; whereby, according to the ordinary rules of honour, the sisters of the said Bertram Arthur, now Earl of Shrewsbury, cannot enjoy that rank, place, and precedence, which would have been due to them had their late father Charles Thomas Talbot survived John, late Earl of Shrewsbury, and had thereby succeeded to the title and dignity of Earl of Shrewsbury, Her Majesty has been graciously pleased to ordain and declare that Mary Annette Talbot and Gwendaline Elizabeth Talbot, sisters of the said Bertram Arthur, now Earl of Shrewsbury, shall henceforth have, hold, and enjoy the same title, place, pre-eminence, and precedence as if their said late father, Charles Thomas Talbot, had succeeded to the said dignity of Earl of Shrewsbury:

And Her Majesty has been further pleased to command, that the said royal order and declaration be registered in Her College of Arms.
