

situate at the western entrance of the Cathedral Close, and numbered upon the said map or plan 106.

And also all that other gate house or porter's lodge, called the East Gate, and the common coach-house or stable and other premises, adjoining towards the west, called the Prebendal Coach-house, numbered respectively on the said map or plan 59, 60, and 61.

And also all that building called the Chapter House, and the Treasury Office adjoining, situate on the eastern side of the cloisters of the said cathedral church, and the vacant space of ground called the Cloister Square or Laurel Court.

And also all that newly erected building called the Almshouse, situate on the northern side of the said cathedral close, divided into several rooms, and occupied by poor people, assigned for that purpose by the said Dean and Chapter, with the yards and gardens to the same adjoining and belonging, numbered 80 on the said map or plan.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Peterborough.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the fifteenth and sixteenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis," it is enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, burials in any part or parts of the metropolis, or in any burial-grounds or places of burial in the metropolis, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that from and after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such part or parts of the metropolis, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time as circumstances may require;

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased, by Her Order in Council of the twenty-ninth of December last, to direct that burials should be wholly discontinued in the churchyard of *St. Paul Deptford*, from and after this first day of *May*;

And whereas the Right Honourable Viscount Palmerston, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has made a representation,

stating that he is of an opinion that the time for closing part of the said churchyard may be extended;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken the said representation into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be discontinued in that part of the churchyard of *St. Paul Deptford*, called the "best ground," in ground which has not yet been broken for interments, from and after the first of October, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-four, instead of from and after this first day of *May*, subject to the conditions imposed by the said Order in Council of the twenty-ninth day of December last.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial of the dead in England, beyond the limits of the metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the burial of the dead in the metropolis;" it is, amongst other things, enacted, that in case it appears to Her Majesty in Council, upon the representation of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that, for the protection of the public health, burials in any city or town, or within any other limits, or in any burial-ground or places of burial, should be wholly discontinued, or should be discontinued subject to any exception or qualification; it shall be lawful for Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order that after a time mentioned in the Order, burials in such city or town, or within such limits, or in such burial-grounds or places of burial, shall be discontinued wholly, or subject to any exceptions or qualifications mentioned in such Order, and so from time to time, as circumstances may require.

And whereas Her Majesty was pleased by Her Orders in Council of the eighteenth of February, twenty-ninth of March, and seventh of April last, to direct that burials should be discontinued in the burial-grounds and places hereinafter mentioned, from and after the time directed in such Orders;

And whereas the Right Honourable Viscount Palmerston, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has represented that the time for closing the said burial-grounds may be extended;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken such representations into consideration, is pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be discontinued in the parish churchyard, *Cheshunt*, from and after the first of August next; in the burial-ground of *Paul's Meeting House, Taunton*, from and after the first of June next; in the burial-ground of the parish of *Lindfield*, from and after the first of July next; and in the churchyards and other burial-grounds of *Newport*, in the county of *Monmouth*, from and after the first of July next, instead of from and after this first day of *May*; and that burials be discontinued in the burial-ground of the *Temple Parish*, in the city of *Bristol*, from and after the twenty-third of June next, instead of from and after the eighteenth of April last.
