tion, while the difficulties which arise between the Custom House and the trade on the subject of the correctness of the values declared at the period of importation of the merchandize, would disappear.

It appears to me, moreover, that the benefit of the measure should be extended to Cape Town, which is the seat of a considerable trade in wool.

Such, Sire, is the object of the Decree which I have the honour of submitting for the approbation of your Majesty.
