

Minden, July 10. This day the Elector of Brandenburg arrived here: On Friday next his Electoral Highness will continue his journey towards Cleve, where he is supposed to be the 17th of this Month. Upon his arrival here the Cannon of the place were thrice discharged.

Cologne, July 12. The Imperial Commissioners are still here. They examined again this week several of the prisoners, against whom it is believed, they will in few days pronounce Sentences. The Deputies of Bavaria, Franconia, Suabia, and of several other Princes and States of the Empire, are now met at Augsburg.

Hamburg, July 13. The King of Denmark arrived the 8th Instant at Acona, and having stayed there three or four hours, which he chiefly employed in visiting the Fortifications and the Magazines, his Majesty parted from thence for Wismar, where he took a Review of the Regiment of Dragoons, commanded by Colonel Lovendall, and then went to Eldena, to take likewise a Review of the Garrison of that place. After which, his Majesty intended to return to Gustorp, to meet the Queen there. The Differences between the Duke of Zell and this City are, in the same state they were three months ago, and there seems to be little appearance of their being very suddenly composed; however, the Imperial Ministers continue still here, employing their good Offices, in order to an Accommodation. There are Letters from Poland, which say that the Forces of Lithuania were actually joined with those of the Crown, and that a Detachment of Poles and Cossacks had so posted themselves about Camniec, as that the place was quite blocked up. They write from Stockholm, That the King of Sweden was returned thither from Finlyndia, and that the States of that Kingdom were appointed to assemble September next. These Letters say nothing of the King's Journey towards Schonen.

Brissel, July 19. The last Letters from Vienna, which were of the 9th Instant, told us, That all the Imperial Cavalry, except 5000 Men, were sent towards Abd Regalia, to cut up the Passage, which they say, is very plentiful in that Quarter. That General Dumenil had put a Garrison into a Castle on this side of Alba Regalia, which the Turks abandoned; and that he afterwards marched to Balata, and battered that Fort with several pieces of Cannon. We can add nothing to the accounts you had in our last of the Siege of Budak, but that we have ground to hope from the Progress that has been already made in it, that the Imperialists will be Masters of the place before the end of this month. As for the Enemy, there does not yet appear any disposition in them to attempt the Relief of it. The Seraskier, according to our last Advice, was still encamped between Temeswar and Great Walladina. Ten thousand Men were posted near the Bridge of Eszack, and 5000 under the Walls of Abd Regalia, which are all the Forces the Turks have, besides their Garrison, in Hungary. They write from Zof-Nick, of that Lieutenant-General Scherffner, was marched with the Troops under his Command towards Clusenburg, and that if the Princes and States of Transylvania did not accept of the Conditions he had Orders to propose to them, he would march to Herminster, to possess himself of that place. The Letters from Venice say, That Captain-General Fabrosini was gone with the Fleet to attack Maldiva, having left good Garrisons in Old and New Navarino.

Temkesbury in Gloucestershire, July 12.
