

Ninden, July 10. This day the Elector of Brandenburg arrived here: On Friday next his Electoral Highness will continue his journey towards Cleve, where he purpose to be the 17th of this Month. Upon his arrival here the Cannon of the place were thrice discharged.

Cologne, July 12. The Imperial Commissioners are still here. They examined again this week several of the prisoners, against whom it is believed, they will in few days pronounce Sentence. The Deputies of Bavaria, Franconia, Suabia, and of several other Princes and States of the Empire, are now met at Augsburg.

Hamburg, July 15. The King of Denmark arrived the 8th Instant at Altona, and having stayed there three or four hours, which he chiefly employed in visiting the Fortifications and the Magazines, his Majesty parted from thence for Pinneberg, where he took a Review of the Regiment of Dragoons, commanded by Colonel Levendall, and then went to Glasholz, to take likewise a Review of the Garrison of that place. After which his Majesty intimated to return to Gootorp to meet the Queen there. The Differences between the Duke of Zell and this City are in the same State they were three months ago; and there seems to be little appearance of their being very suddenly composed; however the Imperial Ministers continue still here, employing their good Offices in order to an Accommodation. There are Letters from Poland, which say that the Forces of Lithuania were actually joined with those of the Crown, and that a Detachment of Poles and Russians had so posted themselves about Caminie, as that the place was quite block'd up. They write from Stockholm, That the King of Sweden was returned either from Finly or Lando; And that the States of that Kingdom are assembled at Stockholm September next. These Letters say nothing of the King's Journey towards Schonen.

Berl's, July 19. The last Letters from Kiennoy, which were of the 9th Instant, told us, That all the Imperial Cavalry, except 3000 Men, were sent towards Alba Regia to encamp the Fergage, which they say, is very plentiful in that Quarter. That General Dunenfeld had put a Garrison into a Castle on this side of Alba Regia, which the Turks had not yet taken; And that he afterwards marched to Salza, and battered that Fortress with several pieces of Cannon. We can add nothing to the account you find in our last of the Siege of Alba, but that we have ground to hope from the Progress that has been already made in it, that the Imperialists will be Masters of the place before the end of this month. As for the Enemy, there does not yet appear any disposition in them to attempt the Relief of it. The Gerasquier, according to our last Advice, was still encamped between Triesen and Great Wessende. Yet thousand Men were posted near the Bridge of Beck, and 3000 under the Walls of Alba Regia, which are all the Forces the Turks have, besides their Garrisons, in Hungary. They write from Zof Quelle, that Lieutenant-General Scharffenberg was intimated with the Troops under his Command towards Clausthal, and that if the Prince and States of Transylvania did not accept of the Conditions he had Orders to propose to them, he would march to Hermsdorf, to possess himself of that place. The Letters from Venice say, That Captain-General Mbrofni was gone with the Fleet to attack Malaspina, having left good Garrisons in Old and New Navarino.

Tewkesbury in Gloucestershire, July 12. The New Charter His Majesty has been Graciously pleased to grant unto this Corporation, was brought hither on Thursday last, having been met before Miles from hence by above 800 Gentlemen of this County, and the principal Inhabitants of the Town on Horseback, who were conducted with Drums beating, Bells ringing, and with great Acclamations and Expressions of Joy and Loyalty, to the Town-Hall, where the Charter being read, the New Mayor and other Officers were sworn, after which they went in their Formalities to a very Noble Entertainment.
