THE undersigned Commanding Officer of Her
Britannic Majesty's ships at anchor off the port,
presents his compliments to his Excellency the
Governor of Gamla Carleby, and trusting to the
high and honourable feeling that should always
exist between civilized nations, to alleviate, when
possible, the horrors of war, has sent in to request
his consideration for the wounded and prisoners
who have fallen into his hands, that the former
may be permitted the aid of surgical attendance in
mitigation of their sufferings.

His Excellency will confer a favour on the
undersigned by informing him of the number of
killed and wounded of the party captured in last
night's attack.

THE English Admiral will not molest or injure
private persons or their property.

He only intends to destroy the castles and de-
fences, shipping, and the property of the Emperor

and children should be sent out of the town.
