

and have visited a French Tartane that was going from Portofino to Cagliari; and took out of her several Passengers of different Nations; The Patron is come back to make his complaint to the French Consul here, who has dispatched a Felucca to Marseilles to give advice thereof to the Court of France.

Madrid, July 6. The Spanish Fleet sailed from Cadix the 20th of the last Month, commanded by the Count d'Quilar, to meet the Gallions. The Chamber of the Contratacion, and the Consulat of Seville have, upon the Orders that were lately sent to them from hence, reported, That they are of opinion that, the Gallions designed for the West Indies cannot undertake that voyage this year, without being exposed to great danger, because of the Season, which will be very far advanced before they can be ready to sail; so that it's believed the Fleet will not depart this year. We have advice that the Count de Stirum was arrived at Gibraltar with the Squadron under his Command, and a great many Merchant Ships. The Envoy of Portugal made his publick Entry here the first Instant.

Danzick, July 5. The last Letters from Poland told us, that the Forces of that Crown were at the General Rendezvous, to the number of 30000 Men; That those of Lithuania, which are about 15000, were expected there in few days, besides the Cossicks, which may make about 10000 more: The King parted from Strye the 23 of the last Month, and we expect our next Letters will give us an account of the opening of the Campagne, which many believe will be with the siege of Cuminec.

Ratisbonne, July 22. The Deputies of Bavaria, Suabia, Franconia, &c. are still assembled at Augsburg, but we do not hear they have yet concluded any thing. The last Letters from Hungary informed us, that the Count de Steinam, who was sent with a detachment towards Hatwan, had let the Imperial Generals know, that the Garison being reinforced, and they appearing resolved to defend the place, he did not think fit to attack it, unless he was supplied with more Men, and with the Cannon and Ammunition that was necessary for the forcing a Siege. The Turks when they abandoned Pest, broke down only part of the Bridge over the Danube; on that which remains they have since planted several pieces of Cannon to hinder the communication between the Imperialists in Pest, and the Army before Buda; upon which, that Garison has raised a Battery to destroy the rest of the Bridge.

Paris, July 24. The King went yesterday to see the Troops of his Household, which are encamped in the Plain of Acheres. The Duke d'Atri is made Lieutenant-General of Champagne, in the place of the Duke de Roquelaure, who has resigned that Command. We have an account that the Marechal d'Estree retired from before Cadix the 17th. of the last Month, with the French Fleet under his Command; That the next day the Duke de Mortemar separated from him off of Cape Spartell, and took his course towards the Isles Fomeniers, intending to go over from thence to the coast of Barbary with five men of War and the Gallies with Bombs; and that the Chevalier de Joinville arrived the 6th Instant at Tunis, with the rest of the Ships of the Duke of Mortemar's Squadron. The Dauphin, and the Duke and Dutchess of Orleans went last Sunday to Choisy, where they were very magnificently entertained by Mademoiselle de Monpensier. The Ambassadors of Syam are expected here to Morrow. The Letters from the Imperial Camp before Buda of the 3d of this Month tell us, That the first Instant, the Auxiliary Troops of Suabia had their Posts assigned them. The 2d, ano-

ther detachment of Cavalry was sent towards Alba Regalis, and the Imperialists and Bagarians battened the place from their several Batteries. The third the Forces of Brandenburg arrived in the Camp, and took their Posts, two Imperial Regiments, and the Troops of Franconia and Suabia being joyned with them; and a third Attack was assigned them between the Castle and the Lower Town. The Bavarians had made a breach of 15 paces in the outward Wall, behind which there is another, with a great deal of earth thrown up behind it, and the Trenches were advanced within 125 Paces of the Body of the place; The Besieged do not make so vigorous a Defence as they did two years ago; the reason of which is believed to be, that the Garison is very weak, or under a great consternation and discouragement; and indeed, all the prisoners and deserters declare unanimously, that these were not 7000 Soldiers in the place, and that they had no expectation of relief. The Elector of Bavaria observing that his Troops suffered very much by pursuing the Enemy too far when they made their Salies, they having always Bodies of Reserve, has caused Pickaxes to be stuck into the earth, and has commanded his Troops not to pass beyond them. Orders have been sent to General Caprara who commands the Imperial Cavalry near Alba Regalis, to detach 2000 Horse towards Carnisia, to destroy the Forage and Harvest on that side. And after this Expedition, it's believed a strong detachment will be sent to make an attempt upon the Bridge of Essecke. From Venice we have advice of the taking of two important places, and of the defeat of 8000 Turks in the Morea, by the Forces of the Republick. The Seraskier advanced with 8000 Men to relieve New Navarino, upon which General Comingsmark leaving the Troops necessary to maintain the Siege, went to meet him, and after a Fight of two or three hours, entirely defeated him; of the Enemy 500 were killed, 800 taken prisoners, with 800 Tents, and all their Artillery, Ammunition, and Baggage: It's said the Seraskier was dangerously wounded in the Head by the shot of a Pistol which the Prince de Turenne fired at him. There marched out of Navarino 3000 Men, of which 1500 were Soldiers, Horse and Foot. The Veterans found 150 pieces of Cannon in the place (which is fortified with 6 Bastions, and is very considerable for its Port and situation) with a prodigious quantity of Ammunition and Provisions.
