He Letters from the Camp before Budi of the 6th inftant tell us, that all their Batteries and Lines of Communi-cation were finished, and their Trenches very much advanced ; That they had fhot a great many Bombs and Carcaffes into the Town, which had at three feveral times fet it in a flame; That they had fo ruined with their Cannon three finall Towers, that the Enemy had been obliged to retire from thence; That a deferter who came into the Camp had informed the Imperial Generals, that the faid Towers were Mined, upon which, Orders were given to countermine them. That the 4th inftant the Brandenburg Forces commanded by Lieutenant-General Schonecke, being reinforced with fome Imperial Regiments, opened the Trenches on the fide of the Lower Town, which were advanced the next day within 250 paces of the first Wall: That day the Befieged made a furious Sally upon these Auxiliary Forces, but were beaten back with great lofs; the Brandenburgers purfuing them almost to the Gate of the Town, where they lodged themselves, notwithfanding the continual Fire the Enemy made upon them from the Town. The Trenches on the file of the Duke of Lorraines Attack were advanced very fiear to the Ditch, and they had made a breach of 80 pages in the Wall. General Schultz is marched with the Troops under his Command towards the Buildge of Effick, to endeavour to burn it. It's reported that the Grand Viller is ar-rived at Begrade: and that the Turks have aban-doned Poe a, Walpe, Oravita, and other places on that fide, to reinforce their Army with the T:oops that are drawn from thence.

Vieuna, July 14, They write from the Camp before Buda, That the 7th inftant they fixed the Miner with the loss of 10 Men killed and wounded; that they had made a parallel Line from the Lower Town to the Ronde or Tower, which is in the unddle of the three about 20 paces bload; that the 8th they made a like Line to the Tower on the Right; that they were railing two finall Batteries of 3 pieces of 24 Pounders each, fo near the Walls of the Town that 20 Men were killed or wounded with Stones and Hand Grenado's, Majot-Ge-peral Dinghen being of the Number of the wounded. The 9th, the Belieged Sprang, Two Mines at 20 paces diffance from the Wall, and followed it with a Sally, between the Duke of E reaches attack and that of the Brankunburghs, which pot our Men at furft into for e diforder, but being affifted nom the next Guard they repulsed the Energy of whom \$0 were killed, many wounded and 6 taken Prisoners; on our fide about 150 were killed and wounded. That day the Bavarians discovered two of the Enemies Mines and took the Poweer out of them; their Attack as well as that of the Duke of Lorram was fo advanced that they were preparing to give an Affault; but the breach being the argest on the Duke of Lorrain's Attack,'t would be given first on that fide. We have an account from

Zolnocke that the Serafquier Achmet Baffa who had passed the Theysfe to conduct a Convoy to Agrid, understanding that Buda was belieged, returned towards Seged, and from thence marched towards the Bridge the Turks have over the Danube below Effecke; and that General de Mercy was marched with the Porces under his command to observe the Enemy. It is confirmed that the Grand Vifier marches with 50000 Men to relieve Buda. From the Camp before Buda, July 14. dwd Battalions of the Regiment of Souches and Keyferstein; The Enemy seeing them advance, fprang two Mines, but without doing any harm to our Men, who, notwithftanding all the opposition they met with, mounted the Breach, and maintained themselves there two full hours, but not being able to cover themfelves from the Enemies Fire, who had made a Retrenchment behind the Breach, fortified with Palifadoes, and a deep Ditch, they were at laft obliged to retire, which they did in very good order : In this occafion it's reckoned 300 Men were Killed, and 400 wounded, among which were divers persons of quality, as well Officers as Volontiers The Prince de Veldentz, the Count de Donaur, and Count Herberstein, Major to the Regiment of Scherfgenberg with four Captains, and feveral inferior Officers were killed, the Duke de Vejar Grandee of Spain, and Prince Picolomini being mortally wounded, died the next day; The Prince de Commercy, the Marquis de Valero, the Count d'Ursel, Count Guido de Staremberg, Lieutenant-Colonel to the Regiment of that name, the Count de Hauensberg likewife, Lieutenant-Colonel, and about 30 inferior Officers were wounded. Of the English Volontiers there were 11 or 12 killed and wounded; The Enemy's lofs in this Affault was not much inferior to ours, as three Turkish Deferters reported, who affured the Imperial Generals, that the Town was filled with . dead and wounded Men. After this Action the Turks made a Sally upon the Brandenburgers, but were fo well received by them, that they were forced to retire in great diforder, with the lofs of 43 killed, and 15 taken prifoners, belides wounded. We are told that a general Aflault will be made upon the place the next week from all the three Áttacks.
