Vienna, July 11. He Letters from the Camp before Budi of the 6th instant tell us, that all their Batteries and Lines of Communi-cation were finished, and their Trenches very much advanced; That they had shot a great many Bombs and Carcasses into the Town, which had at three several times set it in a slame; That they had so ruined with their Cannon three finall Towers, that the Enemy had been obliged to retire from thence; That a deferter who came into the Camp had informed the Imperial Generals, that the faid Towers were Mined, upon which, Orders were given to countermine them. That the 4th instant the Brandenburg Forces commanded by Lieutenant-General Schonecke, being reinforced with some Imperial Regiments, opened the Trenches on the fide of the Lower Town, which were advanced the next day within 250 paces of the first Wall: That day the Befieged made a furious Sally upon these Auxiliary Forces, but were beaten back with great loss; the Brandenburgers pursuing them almost to the Gate of the Town, where they lodged themselves, notwithstanding the continual Fire the Enemy made upon them from the Town. The Trenches on the file of the Duke of Lorrain's Attack were advanced very near to the Ditch, and they had made a breach of 80 pages in the Wall. General Schultz is marched with the Troops under his Command towards the Ecidge of Effick; to endeavour to burn it. It's reported that the Grand Visier is arrived at Bograde: and that the Turks have abandoned Poo a, Walpo, Oravirga, and other places on that fide, to reinforce their Army with the Troops that are drawn from thence.

Vieuna, July 14. They write from the Camp before Buda, That the 7th instant they fixed the Miner with the loss of 10 Men killed and wounded; that they had made a parallel Line from the Lower Town to the Ronde or Tower, which is in the middle of the three about 20 paces broad; that the 8th they made a like Line to the Tower on the Right; that they were raising two small Batteries of 3 pieces of 24 Pounders each, so near the Walls of the Town that 20 Men were killed or wounded with Stones and Hand Grenado's, Major-General Dinghen being of the Number of the wounded. The 9th, the Belieged Sprang, Two Mines at 20 paces distance from the Wall, and followed it with a Sally, between the Duke of E multis attack and that of the Brandenburghs, which put our Men at furt into fon e diforder, but being affiited from the next Guard they repulled the Enemy; of whom to were killed, many wounded and 6 taken Prisoners; on our side about 150 were killed and wounded. That day the Bavarians discovered two of the Enemies Mines and took the Powe'er out of them; their Attack as well as that of the Duke of Lorraus was so advanced that they were, preparing to give an Assault; but the breach being the argest on the Duke of Lorrain's Attack, it would be given first on that side. We have an account from

Zulnocke that the Serasquier Achmet Bassa who had passed the Theysse to conduct a Convoy to Agrid, understanding that Buda was belieged, returned towards Seged, and from thence marched towards the Bridge the Turks have over the Danube below Esseche; and that General de Mercy was marched with the Porces under his command to observe the Enemy. Captain Repet was shot through the Body, and died this Morining. Mr. Rellasis is shot into the Breast. Lieutenant Colonel Farbes in the Groyn, and the Lord Geerg Sivile through the Belly, and Mr. St. George in the Shoulder, and Mr. Stemard has two Wounds by Stones, but it's hoped these will do well; My Lord Mountgo, is lightly huit with a blow of a Stone on the Thigh, and Mr. Vadrez and Mr. Surge are brusted with Stones.
