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Vienna, July 11.

THe Letters from the Camp before *Buda* of the 6th instant tell us, that all their Batteries and Lines of Communication were finished, and their Trenches very much advanced; That they had shot a great many Bombs and Carcasses into the Town, which had at three several times set it in a flame; That they had so ruined with their Cannon three small Towers, that the Enemy had been obliged to retire from thence; That a deserter who came into the Camp had informed the Imperial Generals, that the said Towers were Mined, upon which, Orders were given to countermine them. That the 4th instant the *Brandenburg* Forces commanded by Lieutenant-General *Schonecke*, being reinforced with some Imperial Regiments, opened the Trenches on the side of the Lower Town, which were advanced the next day within 250 paces of the first Wall: That day the Besieged made a furious Sally upon these Auxiliary Forces, but were beaten back with great loss; the *Brandenburgers* pursuing them almost to the Gate of the Town, where they lodged themselves, notwithstanding the continual Fire the Enemy made upon them from the Town. The Trenches on the side of the Duke of *Lorrains* Attack were advanced very near to the Ditch, and they had made a breach of 80 paces in the Wall. General *Schultz* is marched with the Troops under his Command towards the Bridge of *Ejck*, to endeavour to burn it. It's reported that the Grand Visier is arrived at *Begrade*: and that the *Turks* have abandoned *Poco*, *Waspr*, *Oravitza*, and other places on that side, to reinforce their Army with the Troops that are drawn from thence.

Vienna, July 14. They write from the Camp before *Buda*, That the 7th instant they fixed the Miner with the loss of 10 Men killed and wounded; that they had made a parallel Line from the Lower Town to the *Ronde* or Tower, which is in the middle of the three about 20 paces broad; that the 8th they made a like Line to the Tower on the Right; that they were raising two small Batteries of 3 pieces of 24 Pounders each, so near the Walls of the Town that 20 Men were killed or wounded with Stones and Hand Grenado's, Major-General *Dingben* being of the Number of the wounded. The 9th, the Besieged Sprang Two Mines at 20 paces distance from the Wall, and followed it with a Sally, between the Duke of *Lorrains* attack and that of the *Brandenburgs*, which put our Men at first into some disorder, but being assisted from the next Guard they repulsed the Enemy, of whom 80 were killed, many wounded and 6 taken Prisoners; on our side about 150 were killed and wounded. That day the *Bavarians* discovered two of the Enemies Mines and took the Powder out of them; their Attack as well as that of the Duke of *Lorrain* was so advanced that they were preparing to give an Assault; but the breach being the largest on the Duke of *Lorrain's* Attack, it would be given first on that side. We have an account from

Zolnocke that the Serafquier *Achmet Bassa* who had passed the *Thyffe* to conduct a Convoey to *Agrid*, understanding that *Buda* was besieged, returned towards *Seped*, and from thence marched towards the Bridge the *Turks* have over the *Danube* below *Effecke*; and that General *de Mercy* was marched with the Forces under his command to observe the Enemy. It is confirmed that the Grand Visier marches with 50000 Men to relieve *Buda*. We have advice that the Hussars have surprized the Castle of *Coloffa* situated not far from the Isle of *St. Marvace* on the side of the *Danube*, putting all the Garrison to the Sword.

From the Camp before *Buda*, July 14. The Duke of *Lorrain* having resolved to attack the Breach of the Town, and to try to make a Lodgment upon it, and all things being accordingly disposed for the Assault, the Signal was given yesterday about seven in the Evening; Most of the Volontiers were ready at the Head of the Trenches, and followed the Grenadiers who were to clear the Breach, they mounted it in two places, and in both found the *Turks* in a posture to receive them; The Fight was very obstinate for near an hour, and many Faggots and Sacks of Earth were placed to cover our Men, but the *Turks* fought very desperately, and most of the Officers and Volontiers who bore their fury being killed or wounded, the Soldiers quitted their Post, and retired; The English Volontiers shewed all possible Bravery in this occasion; of Twenty, only Mr. *Fitz-James* (who since he came into the Camp has been constantly in the Trenches, and the forwardest in all danger), and five of six more are not hurt, the rest are killed or wounded, Captain *Talbot* and Mr. *Moore* had their Heads broke to pieces with Stones, Mr. *Wijemans* was struck down on the top of the Breach with a Slinger, and was not seen afterwards, Captain *R. Speer* was shot through the Body, and died this Morning, Mr. *Bellasis* is shot into the Breast, Lieutenant Colonel *Farbes* in the Groyn, and the Lord *Georg* *Saxville* through the Belly, and Mr. *St. George* in the Shoulder, and Mr. *Speward* has two Wounds by Stones, but it's hoped these will do well; My Lord *Mountjoy* is lightly hurt with a blow of a Stone on the Thigh, and Mr. *Vadrez* and Mr. *Cuffs* are bruised with Stones, Besides these the Prince de *Veldentz* and Count *Danaw* were killed, The Duke de *V. de* and his Brother were wounded, the former is since dead; the Prince de *Commerce* and Count *August* are wounded, and several other Persons of Quality were killed, or wounded. The *Turks* have likewise lost a great many brave Men in this Action.

Vienna, July 22. The 16th Instant arrived here an Expres from the Camp before *Buda*, with an account, that the 13th about 7 in the Evening the Imperials gave an Assault on the side of the Duke of *Lorrain's* Attack; Count *Hoyerstein* commanded 300 Foot and 50 Grenadiers on the Right, and the Count *de Auzberg* 280 Foot, and a like Detachment of Grenadiers on the Left; and the Miners and other Workmen marched in the middle being supported by a great many Volontiers,
