

two Battalions of the Regiment of *Sonches* and *Keyserstein*; The Enemy seeing them advance, sprang two Mines, but without doing any harm to our Men, who, notwithstanding all the opposition they met with, mounted the Breach, and maintained themselves there two full hours, but not being able to cover themselves from the Enemies Fire, who had made a Retrenchment behind the Breach, fortified with Palisadoes, and a deep Ditch, they were at last obliged to retire, which they did in very good order; In this occasion it's reckoned 300 Men were killed, and 400 wounded, among which were divers persons of quality, as well Officers as Volontiers The Prince de *Veldenz*, the Count de *Donau*, and Count *Herberstein*, Major to the Regiment of *Scherfgenberg* with four Captains, and several inferior Officers were killed, the Duke de *Vejar* Grandee of *Spain*, and Prince *Picolomini* being mortally wounded, died the next day; The Prince de *Commercy*, the Marquis de *Valero*, the Count d'*Orfel*, Count *Guido de Staremberg*, Lieutenant-Colonel to the Regiment of that name, the Count de *Hauensberg* likewise, Lieutenant-Colonel, and about 30 inferior Officers were wounded. Of the *English* Volontiers there were 11 or 12 killed and wounded; The Enemy's loss in this Assault was not much inferior to ours, as three *Turkish* Deferters reported, who assured the *Imperial* Generals, that the Town was filled with dead and wounded Men. After this Action the *Turks* made a Sally upon the *Brandenburgers*, but were so well received by them, that they were forced to retire in great disorder, with the loss of 43 killed, and 15 taken prisoners, besides wounded. We are told that a general Assault will be made upon the place the next week from all the three Attacks.

Brussels, July 26. The States of this Province have given his Excellency a Subsidy of 800000 Guilders, which is a great Sum, considering the present condition of this Country. His Excellency went yesterday to *Gaunt* to visit the new Fortifications that are making there. The Letters from the Camp before *Buda* tell us, That so soon as the *Brandenburgers* had begun their approaches, the Besieged made a furious Sally, thinking to have ruined that Quarter, but they were beaten back with great loss, and pursued to the Gates of the Town. That the Ninth the *Turks* sprang a Mine on the *Brandenburgers* side, which buried several of them, and at the same time made a great Sally, which put the *Brandenburgers* at first into some disorder, but being seconded by their Reserve, they repulsed the Enemy, and pursued them to the Gate. On the side of the Duke of *Lorraine's*, as well as the Elector of *Bavaria's* Attack, the Trenches were carried so near to the Ditch, and the Breaches they had made with their Cannon were so large, that they were preparing for an Assault; the *Turks* have made Retrenchments behind them, which the *Imperialists* were endeavouring to ruine, having made two or three small Batteries so near the foot of the Wall, that several of the Workmen were killed with Stones and Hand-Grenadoes from thence. These Letters add, That the Duke of *Lorraine* having advice that 8000 *Turks* were marching towards *Buda*, on the other side of the *Danube*, in order to put a new Commander with some Relief into the Place, had sent a strong Detachment of Horse and Dragoons to observe them. The Advices from the *Turkish* Quarters say, The Grand Vicer was arrived at *Belgrade*, July 28. On Sunday morning his Excellency returned hither from *Flandres*. Our *Vienna* Letters of the 18th instant tell us, that by an Express from the Camp before *Buda*, they had an account of an Assault that was made the 13th on the side of the Duke of *Lorraine's* Attack by 3000 Foot,

seconded by a great number of Volontiers, who attacked the Enemy with that bravery, that they posted themselves upon the Breach, which being somewhat narrow, and fortified within with Palisadoes and double Retrenchments, they could neither advance farther, nor maintain what they had gotten, so that after a sharp Engagement of two hours, they were obliged to retire. In this action were slain the Prince *Ve denez*, Prince *Picolomini*, the Duke de *Vejar* Grandee of *Spain*, Count *Herberstein*, the Count de *Korfstein*, and divers other Officers and Volontiers, and about 300 common Soldiers; among the wounded are Count *Guido de Staremberg*, the Count de *Hausburg*, and many other persons of Note, and about 500 common Soldiers; during the Assault the *Turks* sprang two Mines, but without any damage to the Besiegers; and after it was over, they made a Sally, thinking to have attacked the Besiegers in flank, but the *Brandenburgers* very bravely defended their post, and beat back the Enemy, who left 24 dead upon the place. The loss of the *Turks* in the Assault is esteemed almost equal to that of the *Christians*. In this occasion twelve *English* Volontiers were killed and wounded. The Letters farther say, that the *Imperial* Generals had resolved to give the 19th a General Assault in three several places.

Lichfield, July 5.
