Genova, July 13.

THE 10th Instant arrived here three Spanish Gallies from Naples. The Algerines are gone from this Coast. They write from Milan, that their Governor the Count de Fuenfali-da was so very ill, that they despaired of his Recovery.

Dantzick, July 20. The Letters from Poland tell us, That the Army of that Crown was encamped the 9th Instant near *Tynznico*; That upon Advice that the Turks were carrying all the Corn and Forage about *Caminiac* into that Fortrefs, the *Sieur Rewuski* had been sent thither with a Detachment of Horse and Dragoons, who meeting 1000 Turks that were going with a Convoy of Provisions to *Caminiac*, he defeated them, 500 of the Enemy being killed upon the place, but the Poles pursuing too far, a strong Party of the Garison of *Caminiac* fell upon them, and obliged them to retire in some disorder. They write from *Lemberg*, That General *Mobila*, who commands the *Cossacks*, having joined with a Detachment of the Garison of *Sniatin*, marched towards *Jass* in *Moldavia*, and meeting not far from that place a Party of *Tatars*, he charged and defeated them the 22d of the last Month; Many of them were slain, and 32 taken Prisoners with 5 Colours, which the said General has sent to the King of Poland.

From the Imperial Camp before Buda, July 10 The Siege is carried on with all the Success that can be expected; our Works are advanced within 40 Paces of the Body of the place, and our Cannon have made several Breaches, behind which the Enemy have made Retrenchments, and we have raised several Batteries to ruine them. Our Bombs and Carcasses have already done great execution. The 4th, about 8 at Night, we saw a great Fire in the Town, which continued till two the next morning; The 6th, another great Fire broke out in the middle of the Town, both occasioned by our Bombs, and since we have seen several other Fires in the Town. Yesterday in the Afternoon a Barrel of Powder on one of our Batteries took Fire, and blew up Six Men, and wounded as many more, and set Fire to the Battery, which was quickly put out; but the Enemy fired very furiously to hinder us. The Turks made a great Sally, but were repulsed with considerable loss.

From the Imperial Camp before Buda, July 16. You have had already an Account of the Assault on the 13th Instant, of which we can now speak somewhat more particularly. The Duke of *Lorraine's* Attack embraces three Rondels or Towers; We had beat down the Defences, and made a Breach from the Great Tower that makes the Angle to that on the Right; Our Cannon could hardly make it larger, and our Mines which we had carried to the two Towers were countermined by the Enemy, on the other side the

Turks every day repaired the Breach with Palisadoes, Beams of Wood, &c. which made the Duke of *Lorraine* resolve to try to make a Lodgment on the Breach; All things were disposed for the Assault about an hour before Sun-set, which was made upon the Courtin and the two Towers at the same time; Our Men presently posted themselves on the Courtin, and were likewise got, tho' with a great deal of difficulty, to the Breaches of the Towers, when the Enemy sprang two Mines near the said Towers, which put into disorder the Detachments that were commanded to support those that mounted the Breach, who during this disorder were repulsed; The Duke of *Lorraine* seeing the difficulty of gaining the Towers, and that the Lodgment on the Courtin suffered very much by the Enemies Fire from the two Flanks, caused them to retire. In this Action above 40 Persons of Quality were killed or wounded, most Volunteers (we gave you moit of their Names in our last) of the *English* that were wounded, it's hoped there are none in danger; The Duke of *Lorraine* has ordered his own Chirurgeon to take care of them, and has visited them all himself. Mr. *Bourke*, Son to the Earl of *Clanricard*, was not in this Action, being sick of a Fever, occasioned by a continual Fatigue in the Trenches since this Siege. We are preparing to make a General Assault in 3 or four days; And in the mean time we push on our Mines, of which three have been already spoiled by the Enemies Countermines; We have pointed 20 pieces of Cannon against the Great Tower, and the other; which has done us the most harm, is already beaten down. The *Bavarians* lodged themselves last Night at the Foot of the Tower, against which they make their Attack. The *Brandenburghers* carry on likewise their Attack very vigorously. We have Advice that a Body of *Turks* are encamped about six miles from hence on the other side of the *Danube*; It's believed the Horse which is now in the Camp, will march to-morrow or next day under the Command of Count *Taffe* to attack them.

From the Imperial Camp before Buda, July 17. The 14th, the *Imperialists* repaired their Works, which had received some damage by the Enemies Mines the Night before, and began two Galleries towards the Courtin. The 15th, several Peasants who had got out of the Town came into the Camp, and reported that in the late Assault above 400 of the *Turks* were killed and wounded; The same day we had Advice that a Body of *Turks* who had passed the *Theys* near *Segedin*, had posted themselves near *Hatwan*, upon which the Regiments of Horse of *Taffe*, *Styrum*, and *Truches*, were ordered to pass the *Danube*, and to join the Troops commanded by Lieutenant General *de Mercy*, in order to oblige the Enemy to repass the *Theys*. The 16th, there came more Deserters into the Camp, who said, that the *Janisaries*, partly with Threats, and partly with Promises of being relieved in few days, had been pre-

prevailed with to defend the place some time longer. We received this day Advice that 2000 *Turks* having passed the Bridge of *Esseckes* and hearing that the Imperial Cavalry was not far off, had in great haste repassed the same, breaking down part of the Bridge behind them. Last Night the *Bavarians* attack one of the Rondels of the Castle, and lodged themselves upon it, most of the *Turks* that defended it being slain; In this Action Lieutenant General *Fontaine* was killed, and General *Apermont* wounded; About the same time a Deserter informed the Generals, that the Enemy had made a great many Mines and Retrenchments, being resolved to hold out to the last Extremity; And not long after an *Armenian* came into the Camp, and presented to the Duke of *Lorraine* five Letters, which he was to have carried to the Bassa of *Alba Regalis*, we know not yet the Contents of them. This day a *Turk* and 8 Peasants came again over to us, who confirmed the report of the former Deserters. We are preparing for a General Assault; In the mean time our Batteries play continually upon the place, and the *Turks* are not idle on their side.

Vienna, July 21. The Letters from the Camp before *Buda* of the 17th Instant tell us, that the *Bavarians* had the Night before lodged themselves upon the Tower of *Rondel*, against which they made their Attack, with little Loss on their side, except that Lieutenant General *Fontaine* was killed, and Major General *Apermont* wounded; That the 19th or 20th, a General Assault would be made from all the three Attacks; That in the mean time they were assured by the Deserters, that in the late Assault the Enemy had 200 Men killed, and a great many more wounded, and that there were not left in the Town above 1500 *Janisaries* in a condition for Service; That two Spies which had been sent towards *Alba Regalis* were come back, without hearing any thing of the Enemies march to relieve *Buda*. An *Armenian* who was sent by the Visier of *Buda* with Letters to the Bassa of *Alba Regalis*, instead of pursuing his Orders, came into the Imperial Camp, and presented his Letters to the Duke of *Lorraine*, and being by his Highness sent hither, arrived here last Night; He confirms the Report of the Deserters, concerning the ill Condition the *Garison* is reduced to, and adds, that during the late Assault, the *Janisaries* went to the Visier, and having laid down their Arms, told him, It was time to capitulate; That the Visier answered, He would defend the place to the last, as they at *Newheusel* had done, and caused some of the chief of these *Janisaries* to be seized, and their Heads to be cut off; The Letters the *Armenian* was charged with, do very earnestly press the Grand Visier for speedy Relief, for that it will be impossible for him to hold out long. We have Advice from *Zatmar*, That Lieutenant General *Scheiffenberg*, who was advanced as far as *Alba Julia*, upon the Assurances *Prince Abassi* had given him, that he would faithfully observe the Treaty lately concluded at *Vienna*, was marched back towards *Deeia*. It is reported that *Teckley* is carried again under a strong Guard to *Belgrade*, the *Turks* laying the blame of all their ill Successes upon him, but it needs a Confirmation. This week a great many Boats were sent from hence with Ammunition for our Army before *Buda*.

Hague, July 30. The Elector of *Brandenburgh* arrived on Sunday last at *Cleves*, where he was Complimented on the part of this State by the *Heer Van Amerongen*. On Thursday next the Prince and Princess of *Orange* will remove from *Honstaerdyke* to *Disren*, from whence his Highness intends to go to *Cleves*, to visit the Elector; About the same time the Review will be held upon the *Mooker Heyde*.

Hague, August 2. The Elector of *Brandenburgh* intends to leave *Cleves* about the latter end of the next week, and to return to *Berlin* the same way he came. The Bishop of *Strasburgh* has been twice with his Electoral Highness, the first time to compliment him upon his Arrival there, and the second to invite him to *Bonne*. The freshest Letters we have from *Vienna* say, that the *Brandenburgh* Troops before *Buda* had taken two Rondels or Towers, and that they were preparing for a General Assault.

Paris, July 31. The Ambassadors of *Siam* arrived here this day, a great deal of Honour having

been shewn them in all places through which they passed. We are told from *Madrid*, that the *Spanish* Fleet will not depart this year for the *West-Indies*.

Whitehall, July 23. The Letters from *New-England* give an Account, That on the 14th of the last Month arrived at *Boston* Mr. *Randolph*, Secretary of that Colony, in His Majesty's Frigate *The Rose*, with an Exemplification of the Judgment given upon a *Scire Facias* in the High Court of Chancery here against their Charter, and with His Majesty's Commission to *Joseph Dudley* Esq; as President, and divers other Gentlemen of those Parts to be of His Majesty's Council for the Government of that Territory, until the Arrival of Sir *Edmund Andross* Governor in chief of *New-England*: Whereupon His Majesty's Commission had been published by Proclamation with great Solemnity and Demonstrations of Joy, and the President and Council had already appointed Justices of the Peace and other Officers throughout the Government, and settled the Militia in His Majesty's Name, all things being performing according to His Majesty's Directions: There has been also presented to His Majesty by the hands of *Robert Mason* Esq; One of His Majesty's Council there, a very Loyal Address from *New-England*, expressing their due Sense and Acknowledgments of His Majesty's great Grace and Favour in receiving them under His immediate Protection and Government.
