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Genoa July 30

The four Gallies that were lately sent out to clear these Seas of the Algerines, and other Corsairs of Barbary, who do greatly infect them, as likewise the three Gallies of the Duke of Tursis's Squadron, have been forced by the bad weather to put into Port Venere. We have Letters from the Morca, which give the following account of the taking of Modon. After the taking of Navarin, Cap^t. General Korsini resolved to besiege Modon, though he knew the Serasquier had reinforced the Garrison and provided them with all things necessary for their Defence. The 22^d of the last Month the Fleet arrived before that place; the same day 18000 Men landed, under the Command of General Coningsmark; the 23^d the Town was invested, and we began to raise our Batteries. The 24th the Frenches were opened. The 25th we began to fire from our Batteries with good Success. The 26th we finished a Battery of seven Mortar-pieces. The same day the Cap^t. General sent a Summons to the Begu commanding in the Place, who answered, he was resolved to defend it to the last extremity; the 27th the Enemies Cannon did some damage to our Batteries, but it was repaired the night following. The 28th we advanced our Trenches within 50 Paces of the Ditch; notwithstanding the Enemy fired upon us without intermission, with great and small Shot. The 29th 30th & 31st. we continued our Works and shot a great many Bombs into the Town. The 1st of July the Besieged made a Sally, but were presently repulsed, on our side only 2 Men were killed and nine wounded. The 2^d. we received advice that the Serasquier had promised to relieve the Besieged before the 6th of this Month, & that he was accordingly on his March. The 3^d. Parties were sent out, but they came back without hearing any News of the Enemy; the 4th the Besieged fired upon us with greater fury than they had yet done during the Siege. The 5th we engaged ourselves on the Counterscarp, and began to fill the Ditch. We had made a great Breach in the Walls and all things were prepared for an Assault. The 6th the Inhabitants

being terrified by the Execution of four Bombs, which had lain great part of the Iron in Ashes, and the promised Succours not appearing, obliged the Begu to capitulate; a white Flag was accordingly hung out, Hostages were exchanged, and the Capitulation drawn up and signed by which it was agreed, that the Turks should march out with their Arms and what Goods and Provisions they could carry and that they should be transported to Alexandria. The 7th the Iron was Surrendered there marching out 3000 Men and the Captain General entered the place put into it a Garrison of 1000 Men, and caused Te Deum to be Sung in the principal Mosque. By a vessel arrived from Trapano we have advice, that the Algerines have lately taken two Neapolitan Barks, and that the Viceroy upon the News of it sent four Gallies in pursuit of them.

Genoa, Aug. 13. The 27th past Te Deum was sung in the Church of St. Mark, at which the Doge and the whole College assisted, for the taking of Modon; this Place (as well the Town as its Fortifications) though it suffered only a Siege of 13 days, in which we lost but 130 Men is almost quite demolished by our Cannon, Bombs and Carcases; there marched out the 7th instant near 3000 Men, who according to the Capitulation, were to be transported to Alexandria; in the Castle the Venetians found 31 Brass and 6 Iron Cannon & in the Town 60 Brass and 20 Iron and 13 Mortar pieces with a great Quantity of Ammunition and Provisions: The Cap^t. General having put a Garrison of 1100 Men into the place under the Command of Signior Perullis caused his Forces to embark again; and we are told they are gone to attack Malvasia or Napolide Romania; though some Letters say, that the Captain General intended first to make himself Master of the Fort of Lepanto. The Prince of Parma parted from hence this week in a Sloop for Dalmatia where he is to Command the Fleet carrying with him 13000 Sequins of Gold for the publick Service. Last Night the 29th past, a kind of a whirlwind, which was so violent, that it threw down

Divers Houses, above 80 Persons being buried under their Ruines and a great many more hurt; severall other places have likewise very much Suffered by it. Yesterday arrived here a Greek who came lately from Belgrade; he says the Grand Visier was there, and that he was drawing all the Forces he could together for the Relief of Buda.

Varsaw July 25. We have advice by an Express that the Forces of Lithuania having joined those of the Crown, the King of Poland took the 14th instant a review of the whole Army, which reckoning the Cossacks comanded by General Podhild consisted in 45000 fighting Men and that his Majesty had resolved to de camp the next day and to enter into the Enemies Country. They write from Lemberg, that Sultan Galga was encamped with several thousand Tartars near Budziacke, where he expected further orders from the Kam; and that another body of Tartars was advanced towards Excocra, in order to their conjunction with the Turks.

Dantzick, Aug. 5. We have Letters from Lemberg of the 24th past which tell us, that the Army of that Crown was on its March towards Moldavia but that by reason of the ill ways they could not March above three or 4 Polish Miles a day.

Caschau July 22. The 11th Instant Lieutenant General Scherffenberg, who had posted himself with the Forces under his Command in the Neighbourhood of Clausem-bourg decamped from thence and marched towards Hermanstadt to oppose the designs of the Turks who he heard were drawing together on that side, The Imperialists in their March approached towards the Camp of Prince Abasty's Troops which giving a Scalamisie to their General he sent out Parties to observe them who either by his order, or by mistake, comitted some Hostilities upon the Imperial Foragers; which General Scherffenberg being informed of, He advanced towards the Transilvanians and charging their Vanguard forced them to retire with the loss of several men killed or wounded; the Smaglovians thereupon quitted the field to the Imperialists and their General wrote every respectfull Letter to the Count de Scherffenberg, to excuse the

Insult which his Troops had Comitted upon the Imperial Foragers which he said had happened by a mistake, and without any ill Intention on their part; to which Lieutenant General Scherffenberg answered in very obliging terms that he might assure Prince Abasti and the States of Transylvania of the Emperors Protection; and that he had not removed from the Neighbourhood of Clausem-bourg for any other reason but that he might be the better able to defend the Country from the Enemies incursions but we are told that Prince Abasti is very much dissatisfied with the Imperialists for this Action and that he has sent to the Basha of Waradin for Assistance.

Zolnocke July. Lieutenant General Caraffa having received advice that the Turks were conducting a great Convoy of Ammunition and Provisions from Seged to Agria, decamped the 15th instant with the Troops under his Command from the Neighbourhood of Bulgar with a Resolution to attack them, but the Enemy being informed of his March, made a Halt at Hatwan, which the Count of Caraffa understanding, he resolved not to return without some enterprize. He sent therefore 50 Hussars towards Agria with Orders to take away the Horses that were feeding under the walls of that town and if they were pursued to retire to an Ambush of Hungarians, who were posted in a place very proper for such a design about 2 Mile from Agria, under the Command of the Sieurs Petterhasi and Lemsay the Hussars executed their orders being pursued by a Party of the Garrison, who were charged by the Hungarians and a very harm-dispute ensued thereupon between them; The Turks were reinforced from the Town and the Sieur Csaki, General of the Hungarian Militia and Major General Hessler came with fresh Troops to the Assistance of their Party, and Lieutenant General Graf Ja advanced himself with the Main body of his Forces; but before he got thither the Turks were routed and put to flight, 375 of them being killed, and 94 taken prisoners, besides the wounded, among the slain were Osman Basha Governor of the Town and four Aga's, with divers other inferior Officers; of the Imperialists 34 were killed and 26 wounded, of the Number of the first was the Baron de Bures Captain in the Regiment of Castell.

Cologne Aug. 13. The last Letters from Vienna, which were of the fourth instant told us, that the Duke of Lorraine upon the advice he had received that the Grand Visier began his March from Belgrade the 20th of the last Month, had sent orders to Lieutenant General Croff to approach towards the Danube with the Forces under his Command that he might join the Imperial Army before Buda if there should be occasion for it. The account these Letters gave of the Siege is the same we told you in our last viz. that severall Mines had been sprung with good Effects under the Second Wall and that they were preparing for another General Assault to

Haague Aug. 16. Yesterday & the day before was the review on the Nookehyde, the Elector of Brandenburg was there both days and afterwards returned to Cleves. The Deputies of the Admiralties that were here are gone home again after having had several Conferences with those of the States General. The Fleet Colon, Colonel of the Artillery of this State, parted from hence this week for Hungary, to serve in the Emperors Army. The last Letters from the Camp before Buda are of the first, and from Vienna of the 4th instant, they give an account of the General Assault that was made the 27 of the last Month, and of the Success of the Mines that had been sprung under the Second Wall, wherein they had made so great a breach, that the Generals had resolved to give another Assault the 3^{or} 4th of this Month; in which they hoped to make themselves masters of the Town.
