AT the Court at Windsor, the 8th day of February, 1855,

PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes," and of the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the first day of February, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following; viz:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Eling, in the county of Southampton, and in the diocese of Winchester, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church, of Saint Matthew, situate at Netley, in the said parish of Eling, under the power for this purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His late Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and in the third section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should be called 'The District Chapelry of Saint Matthew, Netley,'

and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"On the west by the parish of North Eling, as far as Woodlands; on the south by the New Forest, from Woodlands to Potters Ford, and from thence by the River Fletchwood as far as its junction with a small watercourse; on the east by proceeding north-westerly, up the said watercourse, as far as Ringwood-road; then westerly, along that road, to the western hedge of Water-lane Farm; then along such hedge, north-westerly, (so as to include within the said district chapelry of Saint Matthew, Netley, the cottages lying between the hedge and Catmore-lane), up to Water-lane; then proceeding south-easterly, along the middle of water-lane, as far as the bye-lane leading from Thomas Lowman's Cottage into the Salisbury-road; then easterly, along the said bye-lane, into the Salisbury-road, and northerly, along the middle of that road, as far as Nutsey-lane; then north-easterly, along the middle of Nutsey-lane, to the River Test, or boundary-line of the parish of Eling, and following such river or boundary, in a northerly and north-westerly direction, as far as Ower Bridge and the parish of North Eling, where the boundary-line of the said district chapelry of Saint Matthew, Netley, commenced, and which is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent, that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed in the said church of Saint Matthew, at Netley aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the incumbent of that church for the time being.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Richard, Bishop of Winchester has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of St. Matthew, at Netley, in the parish of Eling, be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials in the said church, and the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Winchester.
