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Madrid, Aug. 15.

HE Count d'Aquilar, Admiral of the Spanish Fleet, has sent an Officer hither, to acquaint this Court that he had met the Galions, so that we expect every hour to hear of their arrival in Cadiz, or in some other Port of this Kingdom. The last week arrived here an Express from Rome, being dispatched by the Count de Borromeo, Ambassador of this Crown, to give his Catholick Majesty an account of the difficulties that had happed about presenting the Genet on St. Peter's Eve; He was sent back with the King's Orders upon this Incident. The Duke de Medina Celi, who came hither some days ago, is gone to his house at Guadalaxa, without appearing at Court.

Venice, Aug. 16. We have Advice by the way

of Otranto, That the Forces of this State have taken Lepanto and Petrazzo, of which we expect a

Confirmation.

From the Polish Camp at Tlumaes on the Frontiers of Moldavia, July 18. Our march has been hindered for some days by a difference arisen between Mohila and Appasti, who command 2 Bodies of Costacks; It went so far, That they not only fought themselves, but had almost engaged their Troops in their Quarrel, which being at last ended by the King's Interposition, the Army will decamp this day, and enter into Moldavia. The King has written to the Hospodars of that Countrey and of Valachia, to have their Forces in a readiness to join him, as they have promised they shall do. We have Advice that Sultan Galga who had passed through Valachia with a Body of Tartars in his march towards Hungary, is recalled by the Cham to defend his Countrey against the Molcavites.

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Lembergh, Juy 30. The M Covites have published at Smolensko, with much Solemnity, the Treaty of Alliance lately concluded between the Czars and this Crown; Their Forces advance towards the Baristenes in a very considerable Body, and will, doubtles, give the Tartars a great diversion. The King of Poland marches towards the Frontiers of Moldavia, the Hospodars of that Countrey and of Valachia have, we are told, promised to send 14000 Men to join the Army of this Crown. We are expecting the Return of our Ambassadors from

From the Imperial Camp before Buda, August 15. The 13th, towards Evening, the Duke of Lorrain, having received Advice that the Enemy, to the Number of 40000 Men, approached towards our Camp, with a design to force one of our Quarters, and to put some Succors into the Town, caused, with concert of the Elector of Bavaria, all the Horse and Foot to march our of the Lines, except 20000 Men that were lest to continue the Attacks, and guard the several Posts and Avenues of the Camp, and at the same time the Commissary General distributed to the Cavalty, Oats and Forage for four day; The Army was drawn up in order of Battel, the Count de Dunewaldt, General of the Horse, commanding the Lest Wing, composed of the Impetial Regiments of Capraras Palsi, Tass, Lodron; Neuburg,

Furstemberg, Stirum, Serau and Schultz, with 8 Squadrons of Hussers, and Major-General Heuser the Right, composed of the same number of Regiments, as well Imperialists as Bavariats and Saxons, and 4000 Heydukes and Hossers being appointed for the Vangues. The 14th, by break of day, we were informed that the Enemy had formed a Body of 4000 Janistries, and assumany Spahi's, of their best Troops, who begun about 5 in the morning to pass behind the Hills, making a Meen as if Hilley would approach in several Parties, by the same wayes which they took to put Succors into the Town two years ago, while the main of their Army descended in great Bodies into the Plain. The Duke of Lorrain gbserving the Enemies motion, and lindtheir Army deleended in great Bodies into the Plain. The Duke of Lorrain observing the Enemies motion, and finding by the Noise he beard, that the Heydukes and Husses of the Vanguard were engaged with the 8000 Janisaries and Spahi's before-mentioned, ordered the Right Wing to advance to their Assistance; The Fight was there very sharp, and the Success doubtful, till Major-General Heusler and General Petnehasi esmie in with the Troops of Heuser and General Petnehasi cámie in with the Troops of their Divisions to support the Heydukes, who though they fought very bravely, vet being attacked in Front and Flank by the Turks exteeding them in Number by one half, were forced to give way, but upon this Succor, the Fight wes vigorously renewed by the Christians, who charged the Enemy with that Courage, that the Spahi's not being able to bear their Shock, fell into great Confusion, and abandoned the Janisaries; These were provided each man with 3 Grenadoes, and with Pickares, Shovels, and other Instruments, to level our Works. After this, the Turks caused to or 12000 Men to advance against our Lest Wing, commanded by General Dunewaldt, who thought fit to move a little, 12,000 Men to advance against our Less Wing, commanded by General Dunewaldt, who thought fit to move a little, that he might give time to the Troops of the Right Wing, who returned from the Defeat of the Troops designed 40 succor the Town, to retake their Ground, after which the whole Army advanced towards the Rnemy, who therespon retired to their main Body; Our Troops pursued them, and sk rm shing with the Spahi's that were lest to cover their Reiseat, killed 142, and took 27 Prisoners, and would have gone farther, had not the Duke of Lorrain commanded General Dunewaldt to return, and join the main Body. Son after the Enemy came down the second time from the Hill, and advanced rowards our Right Wing, but after some Skirmishing retired again, though not without considerable Loss. The Night coming on, the Duke of Lorrain drew the whole Army again within the Lines, and the several Regiments returned to their former Posts. Of the Enemy, 3000 Janisaries and 1200 Spahi's were killed in this dais Action, and 350 Prisoners, with 200 Horses, 8 pieces of Cannon, and 24 Colours or Standards taken; On our fide Cannon, and 24 Colours or Standards taken; On our fide the Count de Lodron, Lieutenant-Colonel of Croats, the the Count de Lodron, Lieutenant-Colonel of Croats, the Serjeant Major of Caprara, a Caprain of Dunewaldt, and about Fifty fix Common Soldlers were killed. During the Fight, the Befieged made a Sally, but were finnediately beaten back. The Army being returned within the Lines, all our Cannon were thrite discharged, and the next day the Colours we had taken, and the Heads of a great many Turks were planted on the Wa'ls of the Towns as Marks of the Victory we had obtained. The Prisoners report, That the Grand Visier was greatly incensed against the Serasqueier because of this ill success, and that he had treated him with all the marks of Aager and Contempt. They say farther, That the Ottoman Army cannot subskillong on this side of Alba Regalis, for that the Imperial Horse and the Hussars have destroyed all the Corn and Forage. Corn and Porage.

Vienna, Aug. 18. We have an Account from the Camp before Buda, That the Enemy shewed themselves the 13th Instant drawn up in Battalia, but that towards the Evening they retired again to their Camp, That about the same time the Duke of Lorrain was informed by a Deserter, That the Turks intended the next day to attack the Imperial

Camp on the fide of the Bavarian Quarter, upon which, and the other Advices his Highness had received, the Army was drawn out of the Lines. The tate, by break of day, the Enemy appeared again in Battalia, and at the same time 2000 famfaries, who were provided with Grenadoes, Shovels and Pickexes, and 6000 Spahi's, all chosen men, were detached, with Orders to force the Bavarian Quarter, and to put Succor into the Town, which the Duke of Larain having Notice of, he commanded General Dunewaldt to post himself with nine Regiments on the Left, and Major-General Heuster to fecure a Hill on the Right. The Huffars were the first that engaged with the Enemy, and were very hard beset, but being affisted by Major-General Heufler, they charged the Spatil's with that vigor, that they abandoned the Jamfaries, and fled. The Imperialists took 8 pieces of Cannon, 17 Colours, and 200 Prisoners, and of the Enemy between 2 and 3000 were flain upon the place, and that with the loss only of 50 men on the part of the Christians, among which were the Count de Lodron and the Serieant-Major of Caprara. After this success the Elector of Bavaria and the Duke of Lorrain advanced with the whole Army towards the Enemy, who thereupon, after Iome skirmishes, retired by the favour of the night; and the Imperiality returninto their Camp, declaring to the belieged the Victory they had obtained by a treble difcharge of all their Cannon, and by planting the Colours they had taken on the Walls of the Town. The Befieged had during the Action made a furious Sally, but were presently repulsed. The Siege is carried on with all imaginable vigor. The Miners carried on with all imaginable vigor. The Miners are again at Work, and we expect in a day or two to hear of another, and we hope the last, General Assault. This Victory was obtained on the same day that a strict and general Fast was observed here by the Court and the whole City.

Hamburgh, Aug. 19. The last week the Regent Burghermalters called together all the all the Burghers, to communicate to them feveral important Advices which they had received concerning the Confequences which the Differences depending between the Duke of Zell and this City may have, if not ended by a speedy Accommodation; The Meeting lailed two days, but after divers Disputes and a great deal of Heat among themselves, they feparated, without taking any other Resolution, than to refer the Matter to the Council of Thirty. Electoral Prince of Sacrony is expected here in two or three days from Holland; He intends, it's faid, to go to Gotterp, where the Court of Denmark still is to be present at the Carousel that is preparing The Letters from Moscow of the 3d of the last Month inform us, That an Envoy was arrived there from the Cham of Tartary, who had reprefentedto the Ministers of that Court, That the Prince his Mafter would quit all his ancient Pretentions upon the Moscovites, and enter into a strict League with them, in case the Czars would break the Treaty they had lately concluded with the Crown of Po'and, but the Czars, far from hearkning to this Proposition, were so offended at it, that they had caused a Guard to be set upon the Tartar; And were fending Commissioners to Poland, to regulate feveral matters concerning the execution of the faid Their Troops were marching at the fame time to fall into the Countrey of the Crim Tartars.

Bruffels, Aug. 30. The Letters from Vienna of the 18th instant give an account of the defeat of 8000 Tarks who were detach'd to force the Imperial Camp on the side of the Bavarian Quarter, of which you will have the particulars from thence. It is faid that the Grand Visier was so incensed against the Seralkier for this ill success, that at his return he spit

in his face. There is a report [that the Imperialists have defeated 15000 Turks in Croatia, but it

comes not from authentick hands.

Hague, Aug. 30. The Letters from the Camp before Buda of the 15th Instant bring us the happy news of the defeat of 8000 Turks, who were commanded to attempt the Imperial Camp, and the taking of 8 pieces of Cannnon, 17 Colours, and 200 prisoners.

Versailles, Aug. 30. The King is perfectly well again, his Ague having quite left him. The Ambaffadors of Syam have not yet had Audience, as was faid, but it's believed they will now have it in a day or two. The Duke of Merteman, General of the Gallies of France, has been before Argiers, Tunis, and Tripoly, and is every day expected at Toulon.

Windsor, Aug. 22. His Majesty has named Dr. Thomas Carrwright, Dean of Rippon, to be Bishop of Chester; And Dr. Samuel Parker, Archdeacon of Canterbury, to be Bishop of Oxford, those Sees being vacant, the first by the death of Dr. John Pearson, and the last by the death of Dr. John Fell.
