Camp on the fide of the Bavarian Quarter, upon which, and the other Advices his Highness had received, the Army was drawn, out of the Lines. The tath by break of day, the Eveny appeared again in Battalia, and at the fame time 2000 Janufaries, who were provided with Grenadoes, Shovels and Pickaxes, and 6000 Spahi's, all chosen men, were detached, with Orders to force the Bavarian Quarter, and to put Succor into the Town, which the Duke of Larrain having Notice of, he commanded -General Duncivalde to post himself with nine Regiments on the Left, and Major-General Heufler to fecure a Hill on the Right. The Huffars were the first that engaged with the Energy, and were very hard belet, but being affilted by Major-General Heufler, they charged the Spati's with that vigor, that they abandoned the Inminies, and flod. The Imperialifts took 8 pieces of Cannoft, 17 Colours, and 200 Priforers, and of the Energy between 2 and 2000 were flain upon the place, and that with the loss only of 30 men on the part of the Christians, among which, were the Count de Lodron and the Serjeant-Major of Caprara. After this fluccels the Elector of Bavaria and the Buke of Lorrain advanced with the whole Army towards the Enemy, who thereupon, after Tome skirmifhes, retired by the favour of the night; and the Iniperiality returninto their Camp, declaring to the belieged the Victory they had obtained by a treble difcharge of all their Cannon, and by planting the Colours they had taken on the Walls of the Town. The Befieged had during the Action made a furious Sally, but were prefenoly repulfed. The Siege is carried on with all imaginable vigor. The Miners are again at Work, and we expect in a day or two. to hear of another, and we hope the laft, General Affault. This Victory was obtained on the fame day that a first and general Fast was observed here by the Court and the whole City.

Hamburgh, Ang. 19. The last week the Re-gent Burghermatters called together all the all the Burghers, to communicate to them feveral important Advices which they had received concerning the Confequences which the Differences depending between the Duke of Zell and this City may have, if not ended by a fpeedy Accommodation; The Meeting laited twosdays, but after divers Difputes and a great deal of Heat among themfelves, they feparated, without taking any other Refolution, than to refer the Matter to the Council of Thirty. The Electoral Prince of Saxany is expected here in two or three days from Holland; He intends, it's faid, to go to Gotterp, where the Court of Denmark ftill is to be prefent at the Caroufel that is preparing The Letters from Moscow of the 3d of the there. last Month inform us, That an Envoy was arrived there from the Cham of Tartary, who had reprefentedto the Ministers of that Court, That the Prince his Mafter would quit all his ancient Pretentions upon the Mofcovites, and enter into a strict League with them, in case the Czars would break the Freaty they had lately concluded with the Crown of Po'and, but the Czars, far from hearkning to this Proposition, were to offended at it, that they had cauled a Guard to be fet upon the Tartar; And were fending Commissioners to Po'and, to regulate feveral matters concerning the execution of the faid Their Troops were marching at the fame Treaty. time to fall into the Countrey of the Crim Tartars.

Bruffels, Aug. 30. The Letters from Vienna of the 18th inftant give an account of the defeat of 8000 Tarks who were detach'd to force the Imperial Camp on the fide of the Bavarian Quarter, of which you will have the particulars from thence. It is faid "that the Grand Visier was fo incensed against the Scralkier for this ill success, that at his return he spit in his face. There is a report [that the Imperialists have defeated 15000 Turks in *Croatia*, but it comes not from authentick hands.

Hague, Aug. 30. The Letters from the Camp before Buda of the 15th Inftant bring us the happy news of the defeat of 8000 Turks, who were commanded to attempt the Imperial Camp, and the taking of 8 pieces of Cannnon, 17 Colours, and 2000 prifoners.

Verfailles, Aug. 30. The King is perfectly well again, his Ague having quite left him. The Ambaffadors of Syam have not yet had Audience, as was faid, but it's believed they will now have it in a day or two. The Duke of Martemar, General of the Gallies of France, has been before Argiers, Tunir, and Tripoly, and is every day expected at Toulon.

Windfor, Aug. 22. His Majefly has named Dr. Thomas Cartwright, Dean of Rippon, to be Bifhop of Cheftor; And Dr. Samuel Parker, Archdeacen of Canterbury, to be Bifhop of Oxford, these sees being vacant, the first by the death of Dr. John Pearfon, and the last by the death of Dr. John Fell.

Widdfor, Aug. 23. This day the King began a Progrefs towards the Welt; His Majefty lies this Night at the Duke of Somerfet's Houle at Marleborough, and to morrow at the Duke of Beauforts at Badminton, and goes from theace to Britlel; On Friday, His Majelly will be at Eridgewater; On Saturday, at the Earl of Pembrook's at Wilton; On Sunday, at Southampton; And Monday, at Portfinouth; From whence His Majelty will return hither the day following.

Marlborough, August 23. This evening the King Earne to this place, the people every where, as His Majefty pait, expressing the greatest demonstrations of Duty and Joy.
