From the Imperial Camp before Buda, August 16. HE 14th instant, by break of day, we were informed the Grand Vifier had detached from his Army a Body of Men, who defcending from the Hills into the Plain, which fepa-rates his Camp from ours, paffed it without opposition, and gained the Hills which commanded our Lines on the Right; their Number, as we have been fince told by the Prifoners, was 6000 Janifaries, and 4000 Spahies, all chofen men, the Grand Visiers defign was to force a way into the Town on the Right, while he drew up his whole Army in the Plain to attack our Left; or in cafe they failed therein, that they fhould retrench themselves upon the Hills, to inconvenience our Camp with their Cannon. The Duke of Lorrain perceiving it, kept the main body of his Troops to oppose those of the Grand Visier, and fent 7 Regiments of Horfe with fome few Hungarians to make head against the detachement upon the Hills. 'Twas here they charged us with feveral Vollies of their Cannon, and fo furious a fire of their Janifaries, that the Hungarians and Croats who had the Vanguard, fell into diforder ; upon which the Re-James charged) at the head of which Mr. Fitz-James charged) advancing, came timely to their affiltance, and with the help of the other Horfe, forced the Enemy headlong down the Hill, with fo great a flaughter that near 3000 of the Janifaries remained upon the place, and the reft, as we are informed by Deferters, chofe rather to return towards the Bridge of Effecke, than to rejoin their Army; We brought back eight pieces of Cannon, above 30 Colours and Standards, and near 300 Prifoners; a more vigorous Action was perhaps never performed by Horfe alone, with those difadvantages of ground and number. Having regained our first Post, after the pursuit of the Enemy, which we made the fhorter, for that we knew not but that the main Bodies were engaged, the Hills feparating us from the fight of what paft on our Left. We found the Grand Vifier had drawn his whole Army into the Plain, to which the Duke of Lorrain oppofed his, but that they both ftood at a respectful diffance from one another. After our victorious little body of Horfe had rejoyned the right wing, the Enemy began to make feveral movements, which shewed more their uncafinels and irresolution, than any defign to attack us, and having by degrees withdrawn all their Infantry to the foot of their own Hills, our right wing received Orders to advance towards fome Bodies of Horfe which approached to us, proportionably as we advanced they withdrew, till finding themselves at the foot of their Hills, and seeing that our right wing had by much out-marched the relt of the Army, they charged a finall Body of Hungarians on our left, who yielding before them, had like to have discovered our Flank, and caused some disorder, but by the firmanefs of our Troops, and conduct of

our Officers, who immediately fronted fome fquadrons that way, and covered our Flank, the Turks retired, and we at the fame time, it being already. late, received Orders to withdraw and return within our Lines. The next Morning the Enemy decamped, and removed 2 or 3 hours march farther off; The Deferters report, that three Baffa's were killed in the Fight.

From the Imperial Camp before Buda, Aug. 18. The 15th, our Parties brought in feveral Turkifs Prifoners, whom they found itragling up and down, and having reviewed the place where the Fight was on the 14th, they found the Ground covered with the Slain, and judged the Number could not be lefs than 3000. The Prifoners reported, that the Grand Visier was resolved to avoid a Battel, but to attempt by finall Bodies to put Relief into the Town; That his Army was about 40000 itrong, one half whereof were new raifed Men, befides 8000 Tartars, who had Orders to definoy the Countrey round, and to harafs the Impecial Army, with their Incurfions; That the Grand Vilier was greatly incenfed against the Serafquier for the ill Success on the 14th, and that he had caufed 100 of the Spahi's, who then abandoned the Janifaries, to be put to death. The 16th, we carried on our Attacks against the Town with great Vigor, and at the Duke of Lorain's Attack we burnt the Palifadoes, with which the Enemy had fecured the Breach, notwithftanding all their. endeavors to hinder us, but the Night following they planted there new Palitadoes, and made other Works to defend the Breach; we continued our Mines, and other Preparations, for another general Affault. The Bavarians did- the like at their Attack, and with their Cannon beat down part of the Tower within the Caftle. It was on their fide that the Befieged made a great Sally during the Fight on the 11th, but they were repulsed by the Regiments of Baden and Afpremont, and many of them killed. The 17th, we again burnt the Enemies Palifadoes, each Man employed therein having a Reward of 12 Crowns, but finding that behind these others were planted in a double Row, the Storm that was then intended was put off, the Enemy appeared in a confiderable body on the Breach, and in a fhort time had put other Palifladoes in the place, where the former were Burnt, the fame day we railed a new battery of Six pieces of Cannon to beat down the Palifladoes; and the Eneny fprung a Mine on the fide of the Brandenburg Attack, but with more prejudice to themfelves than us. This day all things were again ready for a ftorm, but the two Mines we fprang not throwing down the Enemies Palifadoes as was expected, it was not gone on with. We have planted 4 pieces of Cannon more upon the new Battery and play now with 19 upon the Palifadoes, and to morrow or next day we shall make a new Effort to lodge our felves on the Breach. This day a Defertor came into the Camp, and reported that the Grand Vilier was retired to Erschin four Miles, from hence, where he

has encamped his Army, for their more convenient 'fubfiltence.

Viena, Aug. 22. They write from the Camp before Buda, That the Duke of Lorrain, after the Defeat of the Enemy on the 14th, fent an Adjurant, and two Janifaries that were Priloners, with another Summons to the Town, that were Priloners, with another summons to the 10wn, but the Belieged firing very thick upon tham, they were forced to return, without performing their Commillion. We have Advice from Croatia, That a Detachement of the 'Garilon of Segnia, commanded by the Baron Gall, had made an incurfion into the Countrey of Licca, and had plundered and burnt the City of Novi, and taken 100 Pri-foners, the relt of the Inhabirants retiring into the Cattle. P. S. just now arrived here a Courier from the Camp before Buda, with advice that the 20th Inlant about fix in i the morning 3000 cholen Janifaires and Spahi's (each of whom had received 30 Crowns from the Grand Vifier to encourage them to undertake this fervice (had fallen upon our Out-guards, and forced them, and the Croats who were polled in the Plain to retire into the Camp, and in the confusion occasioned thereby, had put about 100 Men into the Town; 'Of the Turks between 2 and 300 were killed in this attempt, and the reft were beaten back by the Troops which Count Caprara and Heufler brought to the affiltance of the Croats.

Hamburgh, Aug. 30. We are here in a great Alarm, upon the Summons the King of Denmark has fent to this City (which was fignified to thele Magistrates yesterday by the Sieur Lelienkroon) to perform the Hereditary Homage to his Majelly, and to pay 400000 Crowns for the Preten-fions he has upon them: Whereupon the Burghers were immediately affembled, who, ferting all Differences afide, re-folved Unanimoutly to venture their Lives and Fortunes for their common Defence, and to defire Affiliance of the Ele-ftor of Brander burg and Princes of Luneaburg; The lat-ter have already fent us 2000 Men, who came this day within the four Lands, and polled themfelves there, and 3000 men the four Lands, and posted themieves there, and 3000 men more are on their march hither. The Gates of the City were kept thut yelterday, and this day, upom the approach of the Danilh Forces, which are Encamped with leveral pieces of Cannon within a Mile of the Town. The Danilh Men of War in the Elbe have carried feveral of our Ships, and among the reft, one richly laden from Spain, to Oluck-thede. fladt.

Bruffels, Aug. 30. The 27th Inftant, an Extraordinary Courier arrived here from Madrid, with the King of Spain's Ratification of the Treaty projected at the late Meeting at Ausburg, for the raifing 60000 Men for the fecurity of the Empire, to which the King of Spain, as Chief of the Gircle of Burgundy, is to contribute 6000 for his Quota; We are affured that the faid Courier has likewife brought Bills of Exchange for 250000 Crowns to be paid to the Emperor. The Nations are now afpaid to the Emperor. Tembled here, to give their Confent to the Subfidy of 800000 Florins which was lately granted our Governor General by the States of this Province, and by the Magistrates and great Council of this City,

The Heer Van Amerongen, Hague, Sept. 2. who was fent by the States General to compliment the Elector of Brandenburgh upon his Arrival at Cleves, is returned hither, and has made his report in the Affembly of the faid States of the Conferences he had at that Court His Electoral Highness arrived the 19th of the last Month at Minden, in his return to Berlin. Prince Philip of Brandenburgh is expected here very fuddenly. The Letters from Vienna of the 22d inftant, fay, That the Turks had again attempted to put Succors into Buda, for which purpole 3000 chosen famfaries were detached, who fell upon the Imperial Outguards, and put them into diforder, but Lieutenant-General Caprara and Major-General Heusler advancing with several Squa-drons of Horfe, they beat the Enemy back, of whom 300 were flain, but that however 100 Janifaries, (forme Letters fay 400) during the Fight, broke through, and got into the Town, where they were received with great Joy, and a discharge of all their The Turkish Army was retired four Cannon.
