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T Naples, *August 10.*
 This Week arrived here a Vessel from the *Moroni*, by which we have advice that Captain General *Morofini* after having provided *Madon* with all things necessary for the defence of the place, had taken his course towards *Napoli de Romania*.

Genoa, Aug. 13. We are told that the four Gallies of this State have taken a Turkish Brigantine off of *Cosica*. Yesterday passed through this place an Express, which was going to *Final* with orders to the four Spanish Companies that lately arrived, there to march towards the *Milanese*. The Corsairs of *Barbary* have taken this week three Neapolitan Barks, in the Canal of *Piombrino*.

Dantzick, Aug. 22. The Letters from *Lemberg* of the 17th Instant say, the King of *Poland* had passed the *Niester*; and that his design seemed to be upon *Bialahrod* and *Budrial*, by the taking of which places the Polish Territories will be secured against the Incursions of the Tartars, and the Garrison of *Cahimac* cut off from the Supplies they now receive from that side. The Queen of *Poland* was returned to *Sniatin*, and intended to go from thence to *Sambor*, to remain there during the Campaigne. There are other Letters which speak of the defeat of 3000 Tartars by a Detachment which the King had sent out upon the notice he had of the Enemies march, but tell us no Particulars. The last Advices from *Moscow* said that the Czars were drawing all their Forces together, intending to employ at least 20000 Men in several Bodies against the Tartars.

Ratisbonne, Aug. 25. We have advice from *Hungary*, by the way of *Vienta*, that the Duke of *Lorraine* had in vain endeavoured to engage the Grand Visier to a Battle; whose design seemed to be to weary out the Christians by giving them continual Alarms, and to try with small Bodies to break through their Camp, and to put Succors into the Town. This he attempted on the 14th of the last month, detaching 10000 chosen men to attack the Elector of *Bavaria's* Quarter, while with his main Body he faced the Imperial Army; but the Duke of *Lorraine* having notice of it, ordered part of his Right Wing to march towards this Detachment, which they did, and charged them with that vigor, that the Turks were routed and put to flight, 3000 being slain, and 400 taken, with 8 pieces of Cannon, and 50 Colours and Standards; The 20th the Enemy made another attempt, and with some better success, for 4000 Janisaries and Spahi's having forced the Out-guards to retire, broke into the Imperial Camp, and though Major-General *Heusler* made head against them with several Squadrons of Horse, and beat them back, yet during the first disorder some Men got into the Town, their number

is variously reported, so that we must expect another Post to be certainly informed. As to the Siege these Letters say, the Imperialists had several times burnt the Palisadoes the Besieged had planted on the Breaches, which the Enemy had as often repaired; That the Christians had thereupon raised a Battery of nine pieces of Cannon, with which they played upon the Palisadoes; and that at the same time they were preparing several new Mines.

Gottorp, Aug. 27. The Danish Forces quartered in *Holsteyn* are on their march, and we are told that a great many Bombs have been sent from *Pinneburg* to the *Holler Scans*. The King of *Denmark* will be this day at *Pinneburg*, and from thence is believed will go to *Alena*; His Majesty has sent the Heer Van *Haxhausen* to the Duke of *Zell*. The Forces of *Lunenburg*, *Hanover*, and *Wolfenbuttel* do likewise move; it's said they are 12000 strong.

Gravingen, Aug. 27. On Sunday last there appeared a Fleet of Ships off of *Delfziel*, which put out the Colours of several Nations, the Governour of that place not knowing who they were, and fearing they might have a design upon *Emblen*, sent thither a Detachment of his Garrison; The next day the Regiment of Colonel *Loisekot* was sent to *Emblen* from hence, and Prince *Casimir* of *Nassau* arrived here with a Regiment of Horse and another of Foot, and other Troops were ordered hither from *Swoll*, *Kampen* and *Deventer*.

Amsterdam, Sept. 3. At the departure of the last Letters from *Hamburgh*, which were dated the 30th of the last Month, the Magistrates and Burghers of that City were in a great perplexity, occasioned by the Summons they had received from the King of *Denmark* to do Homage to his Majesty, and to pay him 400000 Crowns, and by the approach of the Danish Forces, which had posted themselves within a mile of the Town, having with them several pieces of Cannon and Mortars, and the advice they had, that more Troops were marching from their quarters in *Holsteyn* to joyn them. The Burghers had been assembled, and had resolved not to comply with the King of *Denmark's* demand, but to defend themselves, and to have recourse to the Elector of *Brandenburgh* and Princes of *Lunenburgh* for assistance, which the Minister of the latter residing at *Hamburgh*, had on the part of his Master assured them of, and accordingly on the 30th 2000 *Lunenburghers* entered into the Territories of that City called the *Four Lands*, 500 *Hamburghers* that were posted there retiring at the same time into the Town; and 3000 Men of the Duke of *Hanover's* Troops were likewise marching to their succor. The King of *Denmark* was himself at *Alena*; his Men of War had taken and carried into *Gluckstadt*; several Ships belonging to *Hamburgh*. They write

write from *Stockholme* that the King of *Sweden* had by an unhappy accident broke his Leg a second time

Hag *re*, *Sept.* 3. A Fleet of Ships which were said to be *Danes* appearing the last week on the *Coast*, greatly alarmed the *Frieslanders*, and several Regiments were immediately ordered to march to *Delfzijl* and *Emden*, upon which places it was imagined they had some design, but these fears did not continue, the departure of the said Ships from off that Coast putting an end to them. Colonel *Golon*, a very eminent Ingenier, parted from hence the last week for *Hungary* to serve in the Imperial Army; The Emperor gives him 12000 Crowns, and the States if he miscarry in that Service have promised his Wife and Children a yearly Pension of 4000 Guilders. The Heer *Van Dieft* and the Sieur *Rault*, the *Brandenburgh* Ministers, are returned hither from *Chives*. Prince *Philip* of *Brandenburgh* is expected here the next week.

From the Imperial Camp before *Buda*, August 23 The 20th instant at break of day 4000 Turks, among which were 2000 Janisaries, all on Horseback, appeared in the Valley of *St. Paul*, who fell upon our advanced Guards with that fury that they were forced to retire, but being seconded by some Squadrons Commanded by the Generals *Caprara* and *Heustler*, they returned upon the Turks and put them to flight with the slaughter of above 900 of them, during this action 300 of the Janisaries having quitted their Horses passed our Lines, and though they were pursued by General *Heustler*, and that our several Guards and the Musketeers in our works fired upon them, yet about 150 (but almost one half of these wounded) got into the Town, the rest being killed or taken prisoners; In this occasion we lost eight Men, besides some wounded, of which number is Major-General *Heustler*. The 21 we continued to play with our Cannon and Bombes from the three Attacks, and to fill the Ditches with that success, that on the Elector of *Bavaria's* side, all things were ready for an Assault. The 22 the Besieged made a Sally upon the *Bavarians*, and beat them from some of their Works, but our Men not only regained their Posts, but cut off all the Turks they found in them. The 23 the Elector of *Bavaria* made an assault upon the Castle, the Detachments appointed for the Service, mounted the Breach though defended by the Turks with great obstinacy, and forced the Enemies retrenchments, and all their other posts on that side, and remained absolute Masters of the Castle, most of the Turks that were posted there being killed, and the rest retiring behind the ruines of the Houses which our Cannon and Bombs had beaten down, but we quickly chased them from thence into the Town, which is only separated from the Castle by an old weak Wall. In this Assault we lost not 100 men and few Officers or Volontiers of note. We found in the Castle several peices of Cannon and Mortars but dismounted, the Enemy having burnt the Carriages. This day a Turk was taken with a Letter from the Bassa of *Buda* to the Visier, wherein he presses him for speedy succor, for that he is not in a condition to defend the place three days longer.

Vienna, Aug. 27. This day at Noon arrived here an Express from before *Buda*, with advice, that the *Bavarians* had on the 23 instant made themselves Masters of the Castle with the loss only of 60 men; That the Elector of *Bavaria* had afterwards sent several Battalions from his Attack to that of the Duke of *Lorraine*, where they were preparing to make likewise an Assault, while the *Bava-*

rians gave a false Alarm on the side of the Castle. The Turkish Army was encamped about 3 miles from *Buda*. The Grand Visier had caused the Bassa, and near 100 Officers that commanded the Detachment on the 14th, to be strangled.

Brussels, Sept. 6. The last Letters from *Vienna* tell us, that the 20th the Turks made another attempt to succor *Buda*, and that about 150 Men got into the Town; that the 22 the Besieged made a furious Sally, and forced the *Bavarians* from their Trenches; but that these soon regained their Posts, and beat back the Enemy with great loss; That the 23 the *Bavarians* stormed the Castle, and made themselves Masters of it. And that General *Schrieffenberg* was expected the next day in the Camp with six Regiments of Foot, and as many of Horse. The Letters from *Venice* of the 24th past say, That Captain-General *Morosini* having resolved in a great Council of War to besiege *Napoli de Romania*, sailed the 27th of July from *Modon* with the whole Fleet, which had on board 24000 Land-Men.

Pertsmuth, Aug. 31. His Majesty parted from *Bridgewater* on Saturday last in the Morning, Dined at my Lord *Fitzhardings* at *Brucon*, and lay at the Earl of *Pembroke's* at *Wilton*, where His Majesty likewise Dined on Sunday; In the Afternoon His Majesty passed through *Salisbury*, and coming in the Evening to *Southampton*, went there on board his Yachts; The next Morning His Majesty arrived here, visited the Fortifications, and was entertained at Dinner by the Earl of *Ganesborough* our Governor; and this Morning, His Majesty, after he had Touch'd a great number of People for the Evil (as his Majesty had likewise done at *Bridgewater* and *Wilton*) went from hence to *Farnham*. The Magistrates as well as Inhabitants of the several places His Majesty passed through in His Progress, having given all possible demonstrations of their Duty and Loyalty.

Windsor, Aug. 31. His Majesty returned hither this Evening from His Western Progress, having done my Lord Bishop of *Winchester* the Honor to Dine with him at *Farnham*.

Whitchell, Sept. 1. This Evening arrived an Express to the Spanish Ambassador, which went immediately forward to *Windsor*, with the news that *Buda* was taken by Storm the 26th of the last month, *Nov. Style*; The Imperialists, *Bavarians* and *Brandenburghers* entering the Town at the same time at their several Attacks, and putting all to the Sword.
