

particular district' should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint Chrysostom, situate at Everton, in the said parish of Walton-on-the-Hill, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and in the third section of an Act of parliament, passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should be named 'The District Chapelry of Saint Chrysostom, Everton,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The district chapelry of Saint Chrysostom, Everton, is bounded by a line commencing on the north, at the point where Breck-road and Belmont-road meet, and from such point proceeding south-easterly, along the middle of Belmont-road, as far as Whitefield-road; then proceeding south-westerly and otherwise, along the boundary-line, between the parishes of Walton-on-the-Hill and West Derby, to the point where the said parish boundaries reach Everton-road; then north-westerly, along the middle of Everton-road, to Everton village; then northerly, along the middle of the road, through Everton village, as far as Breck-road; then easterly and north-easterly, along the middle of Breck-road, to the point where the boundary-line of the said district chapelry of Saint Chrysostom, Everton, commenced, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published and that marriages, baptisms, and churchings, should be solemnized or performed in the said church of Saint Chrysostom; and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time being.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Chester, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your royal wisdom, shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Saint Chrysostom, situate at Everton, in the parish of Walton-on-the-Hill, be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, and churchings, in the said church, and the fees to arise therefrom,

be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chester.

WHEREAS there was this day read at the Board a Report from the General Board of Health, dated the first day of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"To the Queen's Most Excellent Majesty.

"The General Board of Health, appointed for the purposes of 'The Public Health Act, 1848,' has, in pursuance of the provisions of that Act, upon the petition of not less than one-tenth of the inhabitants rated to the relief of the poor of and within the township of Eccleshill, in the parish of Bradford, in the county of York, the same being a place having a known and defined boundary (the number of the said petitioners exceeding thirty in the whole), directed William Ranger, a Superintending Inspector, appointed for the purposes of the said Public Health Act to visit the said township, and to make inquiry and to examine witnesses as to the sewerage, drainage, and supply of water, the state of the burial-grounds, the number and sanitary condition of the inhabitants, and as to any local Acts of Parliament in force within such township, for paving, lighting, cleansing, watching, regulating, supplying with water, or improving the said township, or having relation to the purposes of the said Public Health Act; also as to the natural drainage areas, and the existing municipal, parochial, and other local boundaries, and the boundaries which might be most advantageously adopted for the purposes of that Act;

"And the said Superintending Inspector, having previously given the notices directed by the said Public Health Act, proceeded upon the said inquiry in the manner directed by that Act, and hath reported in writing to the said Board upon the said several matters with respect to which he was directed to inquire, and upon certain other matters with respect to which he deemed it expedient to report for the purposes of that Act;

"And copies of the said report, accompanied by a notice, stating that written statements might be forwarded to the said Board with respect to any matter contained in or omitted from the said report, or any amendment proposed to be made therein, have been duly published and deposited as directed by the said Public Health Act, and the time for forwarding such statements has now elapsed;

"And it appears by the said report, that there is no local Act of Parliament in force within the said township for paving, lighting (otherwise than for the profit of proprietors or shareholders), cleansing, watching, regulating, supplying with water, or improving such township, or any part thereof, or in anywise relating to the purposes of the said Public Health Act;

"Now, therefore, the General Board of Health, does hereby, in pursuance of the said
