reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision "for the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to "churches or chapels augmented by the Governors "of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other "purposes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the third day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following; viz:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of St. Chad, Shrewsbury, in the county of Salop, and in the diocese of Lichfield, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church called Christ Church, situate in the township of Shelton and Oxon, in the said parish of St. Chad, Shrewsbury, under and by virtue of the power or authority contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an ' Act, passed in the last session of Parliament, for building and promoting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and in the third section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for 'the assignment of ecclesiastical districts to ' churches or chapels augmented by the Governors of the Bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should consist of such parts of the township of Shelton and Oxon as are in the said parish of St. Chad, together with the township of Woodcote and Horton, and the township of Crow Meole, including two detached portions of such first-mentioned township of Shelton and Oxon, which are entirely surrounded by the parish of St. Julian, Shrewsbury, and which said several townships and portions form the south-westernmost part of the said parish of St. Chad, Shrewsbury, and which proposed district should be named or called 'the 'District Chapelry of Shelton and Oxon, Shrews-'bury' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"Such district chapelry is bounded on the north-east by the said parish of St. Chad, and the district of St. George, on the east and partly on the south by the parish of Meole Brace, on other part of the south by the parish of Hanwood, on the south-west by the parish of Pontesbury, and on the north-west and north by the district of Bicton, as the said district chapelry of Christ Church, Shelton and Oxon, Shrewsbury, is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed, and is thereon coloured pink.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed in the said church called Christ Church; and that the fees to arise therefrom should be paid and belong to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time being.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto as to your Majesty, in your royal wisdom, shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church called Christ Church, situate in the township of Shelton and Oxon, in the parish of St. Chad, Shrewsbury, be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners in respect of the publication of banns and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, in the said church, and the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the "further amendment of the Church Building "Acts," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of April, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the united parishes of Saint Olave and Saint Giles, and of the parishes of Saint Maurice and Saint Michael-le-Belfrey, in the city and county of York, and in the diocese of York, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said parishes, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes, for the consecrated church of Saint Thomas, situate in the Groves, in the said united parishes of Saint Olave and Saint Giles York, under the power for such purpose contained in the ninth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act 'for the further amendment of the Church Building 'Acts,' and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named or called 'The Con solidated Chapelry of Saint Thomas York,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say: commencing in Clarence-street, in the suburbs of the city of York, at the west end of the house belonging to Mr. Richard Meek, and in the occupation of Mr. John Watson; then proceeding in a north-westerly direction along the boundary of the said Richard
