And whereas the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, has made certain representations stating that he is of opinion that the time for closing the said churchyards and burial-grounds may be extended;

Now, therefore, Her Majesty, having taken such representations into consideration, is pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that burials be discontinued in the undermentioned churchyards and burial-grounds, as follows; viz.:

- In the parish churchyard of AXLSHAM from and after the first of March, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, instead of from the first September next.
- In the churchyard of the parish of NEW BRENTford, wholly from and after the first October, instead of from the thirtieth June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.
- In St. Peter's Churchyard (with the exception of private vaults), in Holy Trinity Churchyard (except in existing private vaults and graves), and in the burial-grounds of Ebenezer Baptist Chapel, Zion Chapel, and Bethesda Independent Chapel, all in the town of BURNLEY, Lancashire, from and after the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, instead of from the twelfth May and first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.
- In the churchyard of the parish of CHELMSFORD, from and after the first September, instead of from the first July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.
- In the churchyard and in the burial-ground of the Baptist Chapel. GREAT GRIMSBY, from and after the first August, instead of from the first June, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five.
- In the churchyard of the parish of GWENNAP, from and after the first August, instead of from the first June, one thousand eight hundred at d fifty-five.
- In that portion of the churchyard of St. Mitthew, HOLBECK, in the borough of IEEDS, situate on the north-west side of the churchyard, and containing an area of six hundred and fifty square yards and upwards, in which no interments have taken place, from the first of January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, instead of from the first July next.
- In the parish churchyard and in the burialgrounds of the Wesleyan and Baptist Chapels, GREAT TORMAGTON, from and after the first of September, instead of from the first of June, one thousand eight hundred and fiftyfive.
- In the New Parish Burial-ground and in Beechen Chapel Burial-ground, in the parish of WAT-FORD, from and after the first June, instead of from the first January, one thousand eight hundred a d fifty-six.

And it is further ordered by Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, and upon a representation of the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart, one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, that so much of Her Majesty's Order in Council of the thirty-first of March last as regulates burials in the churchyard of St. Mary, SHEFFIELD, and directs their discontinuance in that churchyard, from and after the first January, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-six, be and the same is hereby repealed.

The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

HEREAS the Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, after giving to the Incumbents and the Churchwardens of the parishes hereinafter mentioned ten days' previous notice of his intention to make such representation, has, under the provisions of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to amend the laws concerning the burial "of the dead in England beyond the limits of the " metropolis, and to amend the Act concerning the " burial of the dead in the metropolis," made a representation stating that, for the protection of the public health, no new burial-ground should be opened in the city of BATH, without the previous approval of one of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and that burials should be discontinued therein, with the following modifications; viz .:-

- To be forthwith discontinued in St. Michael's Church, in Bathwick Church, beneath St. Saviour's Church, Walcot (provided, nevertheless, that persons standing in the relationship of husband, wife, son, or daughter to persons already buried under this church, may be buried beneath the same on condition that each body to be buried be enclosed in an air-tight metallic coffin, and that each coffin be embedded in charcoal, and separately entombed in brickwork, well cemented), in the Abbey, in St. James's Church, in Widcombe Church, in Magdalen Chapel in the parish of Lyncombe and Widcombe, in the Roman Catholic Chapel in St. James's parish, in the Roman Catholic Chapel, Prior Park, and in the Baptist Chapel, both in the parish of Lyncombe and Widcombe, in Walcott Church, in the Wesleyan Chapel and Chapelyard, before or at the side of the chapel, in the Independent Chapel, in the Baptist Chapel and burial-ground, and in Lady Huntingdon's Chapel, the last four chapels being in the parish of Walcott.
- To be discontinued in the Albey Centery, in St. Peter St. Paul and St. James Burialground, in the Baptist Burial-ground, in the Workhouse Burial-ground, in the Unitarian Burial-ground, in the Friends' Burial-ground, and in the Jews' Burial-ground (the said cemetery and burial-grounds being in the parish of Lyncombe and Widcombe), and in Lansdowne Cemetery in the parish of Walcott, except so far as is compatible with the observance of the regulations for new burialgrounds.
- To be discontinued in *Bathwick* Churchyard, in *Widcombe* Churchyard and Burial-ground, in *Walcott* Burial-ground, and in the *Wesleyan*, *Independent*, and *Lady Huntingdon's* Burial-grounds in the parish of Walcott, within five yards of any dwelling, and in such parts of the remainder of the said churchyards and burial-grounds as are not completely drained, and have been previously opened, provided that burials may be continued in such family graves or vaults in the said churchyards and burial-grounds as can be opened without the exposure of remains.
