Before Sevastopol,

June 5, 1855.

MY LORD,

I HAVE the honour to enclose a letter from the Inspector-General of Hospitals forwarding the weekly state of the sick of the army.

The cholera has sensibly diminished in the camps before Sevastopol, but it has attacked the Guards and the 31st Regiment, near Balaklava, and some of the new batteries, as well as the followers of the army in that town. It is hoped that the disease will pass from them as it has from the stations where it first appeared.

I am grieved to have to say that it has fallen heavily on the Sardinian Contingent, and that General La Marmora is in great anxiety about it. I am rendering him all the assistance in my power. Whilst writing to your Lordship, an officer has brought me a letter from him, announcing that his brother, General La Marmora, who commands his second division, has been very severely attacked. He has been accommodated with a quarter at Kadikoi, and every attention shall be paid him.
