ment of the said fund, that the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments should be transferred from the said See of London to us, and that a money payment to the said Charles James, Bishop of London, should forthwith be substituted for his interest in the same.

"And whereas the said bishop has consented to accept a money payment accordingly, and that the same shall be the sum of three thousand three hundred pounds, being the amount of such fine as aforessid, together with an annual sum of forty-five pounds to himself and to his successors in respect of the sums which he and they might have expected to have received from future renewals and from the reserved rents hereinbefore mentioned, and thereupon to relinquish all further benefit by renewal of the said lease or otherwise in respect of the said lands, tenements, and hereditaments.

"Now, therefore, we humbly recommend and propose, with the consent of the said Right Honourable and Right Reverend Charles James, Bishop of London, testified by his having signed this scheme and sealed the same with his episcopal seal, that from and after the day of the due publication in the London Gazette of an Order of your Majesty in Council, ratifying this scheme, and without any conveyance or assurance in the law other than such duly Gazetted Order, the lands, tenements, and hereditaments particularly described and set forth in the schedule hereto annexed shall be and become conveyed and transferred from the said bishop and his successors, Bishops of London, and shall be absolutely vested in us for the purposes of the said hereinbefore recited Acts.

"And we further recommend and propose, that as part consideration for the transfer to us of such lands, tenements, and hereditaments as aforesaid, there shall at the same time be paid by us to the said Charles James, Bishop of London, his executors, administrators, or assigns, the aforesaid sum of three thousand three hundred pounds; and that there shall, as a further consideration, be paid by us to the said Charles James, Bishop of London, and to his successors in the said see, the said annual sum of forty-five pounds by equal halfyearly payments, the first of such half-yearly payments to be made at the expiration of six months from the date of such Order being gazetted as aforesaid.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matter aforesaid, in conformity with the provisions of the said recited Acts, or of any other Act of Parliament."

"The SCHEDULE to which the foregoing scheme has reference :----

"All that and those, the several pieces or parcels of land, comprising together one hundred and ten acres, three roods, and six perches, little more or less, situate in the parishes of Hornsey and Finchley, in the county of Middlesex, with the rights, members, and appurtenances thereto belonging, all which are now in the tenure of the Right Honourable the Earl of Mansfield or his undertenants, by virtue of a certain indenture of lease, bearing date the thirty-first day of May, one thousand eight hundred and thirty-eight, and made between the Right Honourable and Right Reverend Charles James, Bishop of London, of the one part, and Edward Robert Butler, Esquire, of the other part."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said

Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Acts; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of London.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an "Act passed in the last session of Parliament " for building and promoting the building of "additional churches in populous parishes," and of the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the as-" assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches " or chapels augmented by the Governors of the " bounty of Queen Anne, and for other pur-" poses," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twelfth day of June, one thousand eight hundred. and fifty-five, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Saint Paul, Bristol, in the diocese of Gloucester and Bristol, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district. should be assigned to the consecrated church of Saint ' Clement, situate in the said parish of Saint Paul, Bristol, under the powers contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the tiftyninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and ' render more effectual an Act passed in the last 'session of Parliament for building and pro-' moting the building of additional churches in po-' pulous parishes,' as enlarged by the third section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assign-ment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels, augmented by the Governors of the ' bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should be named. ' The District Chapelry of Saint Clement, Bristol,'. and that the boundaries thereof should be asfollow; that is to say:

"On the north-east by the boundary-line which separates the said parish of Saint Paul from the parish of Saint Barnabas, on the east, south-east, and south, by the boundary-line separating the said parish of Saint Paul from the parishes of Saint Jude and Saint Matthias, on the south-west by the boundary-line separating the said parish of Saint Paul from the parish of Saint James, as far as Milk-street, and on the north-west and north by the remaining part of the said parish of Saint Paul, from which the said district chapelry of Saint Clement, Bristol, is divided by a line pro-
