patients; and so far as position is concerned, I think they will be placed under as favourable circumstances as can possibly be obtained. The situation is high and dry, overlooking the sea, and subjected to no malarious influence that I can discover; and whatever the result may be on trial, the site is admitted by all who have seen it to be unexceptionable.

Cholera and bowel complaints still prevail, and have been on the increase within the last two or three days, but neither the admissions nor the deaths have been so marked as to attract special attention, though numerous enough to create

uneasiness.

Taking the whole force, the admissions to strength during the week have been in the ratio of 10.52 per cent., which is very high, but the deaths to strength are in the ratio of 0.68 per cent., which is more moderate; but it must be borne in mind that 1,659 of the admissions during the week

were from wounds alone.

The Sardinian contingent has suffered much more than the British troops have done since the epidemic first made its appearance at the end of April. Great attention is paid to the cleanliness of the different camps, and on the first appearance of cholera the attention of medical officers was drawn by me in a circular memorandum, dated 30th April, to the great importance of detecting and arresting the premonitory diarrhœa which generally precedes the more formidable stage of the disease.
