annexed into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of Her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the consolidated chapelry therein mentioned for the consecrated church of the Holy Trinity, situate in the parish of Wombridge, be accordingly formed, and that the agreement mentioned in the said representation, in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate to serve the said church, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Act; and that the right of presentation and nomination to the said church shall belong to, and be exercised by, the bishop of the diocese of Lichfield for the time being, he being the person mentioned in such representation; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.

## PRESENT.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled "An Act to amend and render more effectual an "Act passed in the last session of Parliament "for building and promoting the building of "additional churches in populous parishes," and of the third section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the second and third years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the as-"assignment of ecclesiastical districts to churches " or chapels augmented by the Governors of the "bounty of Queen Anne, and for other pur-"poses," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twelfth day of July, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parish of Broadwater, in the county of Sussex, in the diocese of Chichester, it appears to them to be expedient that a particular district should be assigned to the consecrated church called Christ Church, situate at Worthing, in the said parish of Broadwater, under the power for that purpose contained in the sixteenth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the fifty-ninth year of the reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to amend and render more effectual an Act passed in the last session of Parliament for building and pro-'moting the building of additional churches in populous parishes,' and also in the third section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the second and third years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the assign-ment of ecclesiastical districts to churches or chapels, augmented by the Governors of the bounty of Queen Anne, and for other purposes,' and that such proposed district should be named The District Chapelry of Christ Church, l 'Worthing,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

The District Chapelry of Christ Church, Worthing, is bounded on the south, by the Sea, on the west by the parish of Heene, on the north and east by the remaining part of the parish of Broadwater, from which the said district of Christ. Church, Worthing, is separated by a line proceeding south-easterly from the parish of Heene, along the middle of the Teville-road as far as Northstreet, then proceeding southerly along the middle of North-street as far as Chapel-road, then continuing southerly along the middle of Chapel-road far as the north-eastern boundary of the enclosure to the Chapel of Ease, then proceeding westerly, southerly, and easterly, round the enclosure of the said Chapel of Ease as far as Chapelroad (at the eastern end of Mount Pleasant), and then again proceeding southerly along the middle of that road and South-street as far as the Sea, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map hereunto annexed, and is thereon coloured blue.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it also appears to them to be expedient that banns of marriage should be published, and that marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials should be solemnized or performed in Christ Church, at Worthing aforesaid, and that the fees to arise therefrom should belong and be paid to the minister or incumbent of such church for the time being.

"That the consent of the Right Reverend Ashurst Turner, Bishop of the said diocese of Chichester, has been obtained thereto, as required by the Acts and sections hereinbefore mentioned, in testimony whereof he has signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such order in respect thereto as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased, by and with the advice of her Privy Council, to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the proposed assignment of a district chapelry to the consecrated church of Christ Church, at Worthing, in the parish of Broadwater, be accordingly made, and that the recommendations of the said Commissioners, in respect of the publication of banns, and the solemnization of marriages, baptisms, churchings, and burials, in the said church, and the fees to arise therefrom, be carried into effect, agreeably to the provisions of the said Acts; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Chichester.
