**T**HE Right Honourable Sir George Grey, Bart., has received the following Despatch from the Earl of Clarendon, K.G., dated St. Cloud, the 22nd of August, 1855.

Sir, *St. Cloud, August 22, 1855.*

THE Queen, Prince Albert, the Prince of Wales, and the Princess Royal, arrived on the 18th instant, in the "Victoria and Albert" yacht, at Boulogne, where Her Majesty was received by the Emperor of the French, amidst the salutes of the Army of Boulogne, posted on the heights, and the acclamations of a vast concourse of people assembled for the occasion.

At Amiens, where the Queen stopped for a short time, and along the whole line of railway, Her Majesty was received with every demonstration of respect and kind feeling.

At Paris, from the Station to St. Cloud, these feelings were manifested in the strongest manner; and I can convey no better idea of the reception of Her Majesty by the people of Paris, than by stating, that the enthusiasm was quite as great as that which greeted the Emperor and Empress on their arrival in London.

The same cordial welcome has been given to the Queen at the various places where Her Majesty has since appeared in public; and Her Majesty is profoundly sensible of the spontaneous and universal kindness which has been displayed towards Her by the people of France.

It is impossible to doubt that the Queen's visit will still more closely cement the Alliance which now so happily subsists between the Sovereigns and the people of England and France.

I am happy to inform you, that the Queen, Prince Albert, the Prince of Wales, and the Princess Royal, are in perfect health.

**W**HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to effect exchange of patronage by Archbishops, Bishops, and other Ecclesiastical Corporations," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the twenty-eighth day of June, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament, held in the sixteenth and seventeenth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to effect exchange of patronage by Archbishops, Bishops, and other Ecclesiastical Corporations,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme for effecting an exchange of the patronage of the Rectory of Riseholme, in the county of Lincoln, belonging to the Master and Scholars of Balliol College, in the University of Oxford, for a portion of the patronage of the Rectory of Saint Mary, Bedford, in the county of Bedford, belonging to the See of Lincoln.

"Whereas it was by the said Act enacted, that it should be lawful for any bishop, by the authority of a scheme prepared by us, ratified by your Majesty in Council, and duly gazetted, to assign and transfer by way of exchange only, and not otherwise, the patronage of any benefice or benefices of which he should be seised in right of his see, to any person for the patronage of any other benefice or benefices, and that from and after the publication of the scheme and Order in Council effecting such transfer, the benefice or benefices and patronage thereby purporting to be transferred and exchanged should be and remain thereby duly vested in the respective bishop, or other person party to such exchange, without any transfer, conveyance, or assurance in the law, other than the said scheme and Order so published in the Gazette as aforesaid: provided that in every such case we should, before submitting such scheme for the consideration and approval of your Majesty in Council, make due inquiry into the circumstances of the proposed exchange, and into the equal or relative value of

the benefice or benefices and patronage proposed to be thereby transferred, and should certify the same to your Majesty with such particulars thereof, as might be necessary to show that such exchange was made in conformity with the intentions of an Act passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of the reign of His late Majesty King William the Fourth, chapter seventy-seven:

"And whereas, it was by the same Act also enacted, that the word 'person' should include any corporation, and the master, provost, warden, or head of any college or collegiate establishment, and the governing body respectively entitled in his or their corporate capacity to any such patronage.

"And whereas the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Lincoln, is seised in right of his see of the patronage of the said Rectory of Saint Mary, Bedford, and the Master and Scholars of Balliol College, in the University of Oxford, are seised in their corporate capacity of the patronage of the said Rectory of Riseholme, and whereas the said bishop and master and scholars respectively have signified to us their desire that the patronage of the said benefices may be exchanged as hereinafter recommended and proposed.

"And whereas, we have made due enquiry as to the circumstances of the proposed exchange and the relative value of the said benefices and patronage; and we do hereby certify to your Majesty that the value of the patronage of the Rectory of Riseholme is equivalent, as nearly as may be, to the value of the portion of the patronage of the Rectory of Saint Mary, Bedford, proposed to be transferred.

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of Lincoln, in testimony whereof he hath signed and sealed this scheme, and of the Master and Scholars of Balliol College, in the University of Oxford, in testimony whereof they have hereunto affixed their common or corporate seal, we humbly recommend and propose that, immediately from and after the publication in the London Gazette of an Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, and without any further or other assurance or conveyance in the law, the patronage of or right of nomination to the said Rectory of Riseholme shall be assigned and transferred from the said Master and Scholars of Balliol College aforesaid, and their successors, and shall become and be vested in and be exercised by the said John, Bishop of Lincoln, and his successors bishops of Lincoln, and that in exchange for the same the patronage of or right of nomination to the said Rectory of Saint Mary, Bedford, shall for the third turn of presentation to the said rectory next after the publication in the London Gazette of any Order of your Majesty in Council ratifying this scheme, as aforesaid, and for every succeeding third turn of presentation, be assigned and transferred from the said bishop and his successors, and shall in like manner become and be vested in and be exercised by the said Master and Scholars of Balliol College and their successors.

"And we further recommend and propose, that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament."

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council; now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said

Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same, and every part thereof, shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette, pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the respective Registrars of the dioceses of Ely and Lincoln.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Acting-Consul at Mobile, transmitting the enclosed extract from a City Ordinance establishing a strict quarantine, from the 1st of July until the 1st of November, on such vessels arriving in the Bay of Mobile as are therein specified.

EXTRACT from an Ordinance to establish a Quarantine, and to prevent the introduction of contagious, infectious, or malignant diseases into the city of Mobile.

Section 1.—*Be it ordained by the Mayor, Aldermen and Common Council of the city of Mobile,* that for the protection of the city of Mobile a strict system of quarantine shall be enforced against all vessels, boats, and watercraft arriving in the Bay of Mobile from any port where yellow, malignant, or other pestilential or infectious fever is prevailing,

or, against any and all vessels, boats, or other watercraft having any person or persons on board suffering from any such disease. That the provisions of this ordinance shall be enforced from the 1st day of July, until the 1st day of November, unless ordered otherwise by the Mayor, acting under the advice of the Board of Health of the city of Mobile.

Section 3.—*Be it further ordained*, That it shall be the duty of the quarantine physician to attend at the quarantine station to board all vessels, boats, or other watercraft entering the Bay or harbour of Mobile, and fully to examine into the condition of the vessel and cargo, and into the health of all persons, officers, crew, and passengers, on board; he shall examine as many of such persons on board, under oath, to obtain such facts as he may deem essential or necessary; he shall have power to detain all vessels coming from an infected port, or having cases of yellow fever or other malignant disease aboard, their cargo, crew, officers, or passengers, for any length of time that he may deem necessary and expedient; he shall direct such steps as may be necessary to purify any vessel, to discharge a cargo or portion thereof, and to remove any person or persons, from any vessel, that may be sick of any malignant or infectious fever or disease, to the quarantine hospital, and it shall be his duty to give his professional services to such persons. It shall be his duty to sign all permits for vessels, boats, or persons to pass the quarantine, and to sign all discharges for vessels, boats, or persons leaving the quarantine, and no vessel, boat, or person shall be permitted to leave the quarantine station without first having obtained a permit thus duly signed.

And any person or persons, passenger, crew, or officer of any vessel, who may violate any of the quarantine regulations, he or they, the owner, captain, together with the vessels or boat to which he or they may belong, or be a passenger, shall be subject to a fine and penalty of not less than fifty dollars for each and every offence, to be applied to the use of the city of Mobile.

Section 5.—*Be it further ordained*, That all persons who may receive medical treatment at the quarantine hospital, shall pay, for the use of the city, five dollars per day for each and every day of such treatment; and in all cases where the party so treated shall be unable to pay the fee, then the captain, owner, or consignee of the vessel to which he may belong, or on board of which he may have been a passenger, shall be liable for the same.

In all instances where it may be judged necessary to remove a cargo or a portion thereof, or to purify and cleanse a vessel, or to destroy bedding or clothing, it shall be done under the supervision of the quarantine physician, and at the expense of the captain, owner, or consignee of the vessel.

Section 8.—*Be it further ordained*, That the Mayor and Board of Health, whenever, in their judgment, the public health may require it, may order any vessel at the wharves of the city, or in their vicinity, to the quarantine station; and may require all persons, articles, or goods, introduced into the city from such vessel, to be seized, returned on board, or removed to the quarantine station. In case the master, owner, or consignee of the vessel cannot be found, or shall refuse, or shall neglect to obey the order of removal, the Mayor and Board of Health shall have power to cause such removal at the expense of such master, owner, or consignee. The provisions of this ordinance shall apply also to vessels lying at anchor in the Bay of Mobile, and not performing quarantine.

### *Quarantine Rules and Regulations for the Port of Mobile.*

1.—The quarantine station shall be the anchorage immediately in the vicinity of the present Bethel-ship, in the Bay of Mobile. Its limits shall be more specifically pointed out by the quarantine physician.

2.—The quarantine physician shall, in every instance, fix the length of time that a vessel shall remain at quarantine, as also the time that all persons aboard such vessels shall be liable to quarantine.

3.—It shall be the duty of all pilots, or other persons bringing a vessel into the Bay of Mobile, to hoist a flag at half-mast at the fore, which flag shall continue to be so hoisted, at half-mast at the fore, until the vessel has been visited by the quarantine physician.

4.—No person shall leave a vessel at quarantine; and no person shall visit a vessel at quarantine without a written permit so to do, signed by the quarantine physician.

5.—The quarantine physician shall make a monthly report, on the 1st of every month, to the city authorities, of the number and class of vessels performing quarantine,—of the number of patients treated at the quarantine hospital,—of the amount of fees collected,—and all other such information connected with the station as may be necessary or interesting.

6.—All vessels undergoing quarantine shall keep a flag at half-mast at the main during the day, and a lantern in the same position at night.

7.—Any violation of any of these rules and regulations shall be punishable by a fine of 100 dollars, recoverable as provided in the ordinance.

#### *Lighthouses on the Coast of Spain.*

The luminous focus stands at an elevation of 142½ feet above the level of spring tides ("Pleameres de Equinocio") and presents a white permanent light, which is visible from the distance of 20 miles, provided that the state of the atmosphere allows it, and the eye of the observer be placed 60 feet above the surface of the sea.
