DESPATCHES, of which the following are copies, have been received from Rear-Admiral Bruce, Commander-in-Chief of Her Majesty's Ships and Vessels on the Pacific Station :

No. 44. Sir,

### President, at Petropaulovski, June 15, 1855.

I HAVE to report, for the information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that arriving off this port, on the 30th May, I found the place completely evacuated; not a ship, gun, or person to be seen; nothing but empty embrasures and deserted houses.

2. I entered the inner harbour on the following day in the Barracouta, accompanied by Captain Penanros, of the French frigate Alceste, when we found three Americans (the only residents left), from whom we learned that the Russian ships named in the margin<sup>\*</sup> were cut through the ice, and took their departure, on the 17th (5th) April, with all the guns and munitions of war, and all the soldiers and government employés, 800 in number; but of their destination we could obtain no clue.

3. I reached the rendezvous, lat. 50° N., long. 160° E., in my flag-ship, on the 14th May, and the Dido and Pique arrived the same day; the Encounter and Barracouta had been there since the 14th April. Great credit is due to Captain O'Callaghan and Commander Stirling for the zealous exertion by which they effected this object; and their Lordships will remark the promptitude with which they were despatched by Rear-Admiral Sir James Stirling.

4. The French frigate Alceste and the Brisk were in the vicinity of the rendezvous at the same time; but the prevalence of thick fogs and adverse weather prevented my seeing the Bay of Acootska before the 20th ult., when six of the ships being together, I trusted to the prompt appearance of the seventh, and accordingly proceeded to the port, in tow of the Barracouta, followed by the Alceste, in tow of the Brisk. The Dido, Pique, and Encounter arrived the same evening.

5. Commander Stirling, of Her Majesty's steamsloop Barracouta, while separated from the squadron, having, during a break in the fog, looked into the anchorage to see if it was there, took, with much judgment, that opportunity of

6. The Amphitrite, from Honolulu, having met me on the 11th instant, while I was in the act of following the Russian ships into the Sea of Ochotsk, and given me such information as to convince me that a combined English and French force was already there, instead of proceeding I despatched Her Majesty's ships Pique and Barracouta on the 13th, and Amphitrite on the 14th, to reinforce the squadron of Sir James Stirling at the mouth of the Amour. The Encounter sailed on the 12th for Sir James Stirling's rendezvous at Haksdadi, in the Strait of Maksmai, to inform his Excellency of the movements of the other ships, in case he should not have left there. The Amphitrite will rejoin my flag off Sitka, so soon as Captain Frederick finds her services are not required in the Sea of Ochotsk.

8. Resuming the subject of Petropaulovski, I would observe that the enemy must have worked in an indefatigable manner after the departure of the allied squadron last year, as we found 9 batteries for 54 guns had been constructed with much skill and labour, by means of fascines strongly bound together, 25 feet thick, staked and filled in with earth, and some of them ditched round, with covered ways leading from one to the other, and trees planted in the rear. Every possible preparation had been made to receive us prior to the orders arriving from St. Petersburg to evacuate the place.

9. I caused the batteries to be destroyed, but, having met with no opposition on approaching Petropaulovski, I considered it a point of honour to respect the town.

10. I found hidden in the Rakovia Harbour a fine Russian whaler, of 400 tons, called the Aian, built at Abo in 1853. She would have sailed from here three weeks since for Aian, with the family of the Governor of the place, and, among other articles of cargo, an engine for a small steamer said to be there, but the opportune arrival of some of the squadron off the port prevented her leaving. As I found her deserted, and her sails, boat, and anchors are not to be found, she will be destroyed.

11. I am disappointed in not having succeeded in opening a communication with the inhabitants, who have fled from the town; for I hoped to obtain the release of the two English prisoners they have among them; I learn, however, from the Americans that they are very well treated.

12. In conclusion, I desire to add that although it has necessarily been a great disappointment to the squadron under my command to find upon arrival at this place, more than 2,000 miles outside their station, that the enemy had escaped, and the batteries were deserted, yet their Lordships will not fail to observe that not the less credit is due for the great zeal and anxiety that has been shown by each of the ships in pushing onward, in the hope of being in time to take part in the anticipated operations at this port.

13. The best understanding subsisted between Captain Penanros, of the Alceste, and me, and I cannot say too much in favour of the zeal and activity he displayed to meet every wish of mine, and to keep the appointed rendezvous; the same continues with respect to Rear-Admiral Fourichon

### President, off Sitka, July 17, 1855.

I REQUEST you will inform the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that before leaving Petropaulovski, I succeeded in opening a communication with Captain Martinhoff, the temporary Governor of that place, who had retired into the interior, having for its object the release of two prisoners taken last year, as reported in my general letter of the 15th ultimo, No. 44.

Having forwarded a safe conduct to Captain Martinhoff, through the kind offices of an American resident in Petropaulovski, that officer sent 150 versts inland for them, and on their arrival, on the 25th ultime, delivered them up to Captain Houston, of Her Majesty's ship Trincomalee, and three Russians that had been detained on board the French brig Obligado since last year, were given in exchange.

The two men proved to be William Garland, ordinary seaman, of Her Majesty's ship Pique, and Pierre Langois, of the French frigate Forte. The latter will be handed over to the Forte on my arrival at San Francisco, and the former will, at his own request, be appointed to the Brisk, his proper ship having sailed for the China Station. Both appear to have been treated with much kindness during the time they have been in the hands of the enemy.

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

W HEREAS the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England have, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act to make better provision for the spiritual "care of populous parishes," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a scheme, bearing date the second day of August, in the year one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following; that is to say:

"We, the Ecclesiastical Commissioners for England, in pursuance of an Act, passed in the

session of Parliament held in the sixth and seventh years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act to make better provision for the 'spiritual care of populous parishes,' have prepared, and now humbly lay before your Majesty in Council, the following scheme, for constituting a separate district for spiritual purposes out of the chapelry of Coley, in the parish of Halifax, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon :

"Whereas it was by the said Act enacted, that if at any time it should be made to appear to us that it would promote the interests of religion that any part or parts of any parish or parishes, chapelry or chapelries, district or districts, of great extent, and containing a large population, and wherein, or in parts whereof, the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof, or any extra-parochial place or places, or any part or parts thereof, should be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes, it should be lawful by the authority in the same Act provided (that is to say, by a scheme prepared by us, and an Order issued by your Majesty in Council, ratifying such scheme), with the consent of the bishop of the diocese, under his hand and seal, to set out by metes and bounds, and constitute a separate district accordingly, such district not then containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel, in use for the purposes of divine worship, and to fix and declare the name of such district; provided always that the draft of any scheme for constituting any such district should be delivered or transmitted to the incumbent and to the patron or patrons of the church or chapel of any parish, chapelry, or district, out of which it is recommended that any such district, or any part thereof, should be taken, in order that such incumbent, patron or patrons, might have an opportunity of offering, or making to us or to such bishop, any observations or objections upon or to the constituting of such district; and that such scheme should not be laid before your Majesty in Council until after the expiration of one calendar month next after such copy should have been so delivered or transmitted, unless such incumbent and patron or patrons, should in the mean time, consent to the same; and it was by the same Act also provided, that in every such scheme for constituting any such district we should recommend to your Majesty in Council that the minister of such district, when duly licensed according to the same Act, should be permanently endowed, under the provisions of the same Act, to an amount of not less than the annual value of one hundred pounds; and also, if such endowment be of less than the annual value of one hundred and fifty pounds, that the same should be increased to such last-mentioned amount at the least, so soon as such district should have become a new parish as thereinafter provided ;

"And whereas it was by the said Act further enacted, that it should be lawful, by the authority aforesaid, at any time to assign the right of patronage of any such district or new parish as aforesaid, and the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereof respectively, either in perpetuity, or for one or more nomination or nominations, to any Ecclesastical Corporation, aggregate or sole, or to either of the Universities of Oxford, Cambridge, or Durham, or to any college therein respectively, or to any person or persons, or the nominee or nominees of such person or persons or body respectively, upon condition of such corporation, university, college, person, or persons contributing to the permanent endowment of such minister or perpetual curate, or towards providing a church or chapel for the use of the inhabitants of such district or new parish, in such proportion and in such manner as should be approved by the like authority :

And whereas the said parish of Halifax is of great extent, and contains a large population, and the provision for public worship and for pastoral superintendence therein is insufficient for the spiritual wants of the inhabitants thereof; and it has been made to appear to us, that it would promote the interests of religion, that the particular part of such parish hereinafter mentioned and described, such part not at present containing within its limits any consecrated church or chapel in use for the purposes of divine worship, should be constituted a separate district in manner hereinafter set forth:

"And whereas an annual sum of one hundred and fifty pounds has been provided by Edward Akroyd, of Bank Field, in the said parish of Halifax, Esquire, by means of a rent-charge issuing out of certain freehold and copyhold lands and other hereditaments situate in the last-named parish belonging to the said Edward Akroyd, and made payable to us, in trust, to be applied towards the permanent endowment of the minister of the district herein recommended to be constituted, and so soon as such district shall have become, according to the provisions of the said Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, of the perpetual curate thereof:

"And whereas it has been proposed to us, and it appears to us to be expedient, that, in consideration of the benefaction aforesaid, the whole right of patronage of, and nomination of the minister or perpetual curate to, the said district or new parish herein recommended to be constituted should be assigned in manner hereinafter mentioned and proposed :

"Now, therefore, with the consent of the Right Reverend Charles Thomas, Bishop of Ripon, testified by his having signed and sealed this scheme, we humbly recommend and propose that all that part of the said chapelry of Coley, in the said parish of Halifax described in the Schedule hereunto annexed, all which part, together with the boundaries thereof, is delineated and set forth on the map or plan hereunto also annexed, shall be constituted a separate district for spiritual purposes accordingly, and that the same shall be named "The District of Haley Hill."

And we further recommend and propose, that there shall be paid by us in each and every year, by equal half-yearly payments on the first day of May and the first day of November, to the minister for the time being of the district so recommended to be constituted, when duly licensed according to the provisions of the said Act, and so soon as such district shall have become, according to the provisions of the same Act, a new parish for ecclesiastical purposes, to the perpetual curate thereof, the sum of one hundred and fifty pounds; and that the first such payment, or a proportionate part thereof, shall be made on the first day of May or of November next after the day of the date of the license of such minister or of such perpetual curate as aforesaid, as the case may be; and that in case a vacancy in the ministry or perpetual curacy of such district or new parish shall happen on any other day than the first day of May or the first day of November, the amount payable shall be duly apportioned between and paid to the minister or the perpetual curate making the vacancy, or his personal representative or representatives, and the minister or the perpetual curate succeeding to such district or new parish; provided always, that if it shall appear to us to be expedient at any future time, that instead of the annual sum then

in course of payment by us to the minister or perpetual curate of the said district or new parish, or instead of any part of such annual sum, any land, tithe, or other hereditament should be conveyed to such district or new parish in fee, nothing herein or in any other scheme contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing such a substitution.

"And we further recommend and propose, that the whole right of patronage of the said district or new parish so recommended to be constituted, and the nomination of the minister or perpetual curate thereto, shall be assigned to and absolutely vested in, and shall and may, from time to time, be exercised by, the said Edward Akroyd, his heirs and assigns for ever.

"And we further recommend and propose that nothing herein contained shall prevent us from recommending and proposing any other measures relating to the matters aforesaid, or any of them, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, or of any other Act of Parliament.

### **"SCHEDULE.**

"The district of HALEY HILL, being -

"All that part of the township of Northowram, in the chapelry of Coley, in the parish of Halifax, in the county of York, and in the diocese of Ripon, situate to the southward of the new parish of Queen's Head, in the same county and diocese, and on the western side of an imaginary line extending along the middle of the old turnpike road leading from Bradford to Halifax."

And whereas due notice of the said scheme has been given, in accordance with the provisions of the said Act, to the incumbents and to the patrons of the said parish of Halifax and chapelry of Coley respectively, and no objections have been made thereto.

And whereas the said scheme has been approved by Her Majesty in Council: now, therefore, Her Majesty, by and with the advice of Her said Council, is pleased hereby to ratify the said scheme, and to order and direct that the same and every part thereof shall be effectual in law immediately from and after the time when this Order shall have been duly published in the London Gazette pursuant to the said Act; and Her Majesty, by and with the like advice, is pleased hereby to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Ripon.

### NOTICE TO MARINERS.

### Buoys on Stellwagen's Bank, entrance to Massachusetts Bay.

THE following buoys have been placed on Stellwagen's Bank, at the entrance to Massachusetts Bay, to mark the approaches to Boston Harbour; viz:

- A first class can buoy, painted red, in about 11 fathoms water, N.W. by N. 4 N. (true), six miles from Race Point Lighthouse, and E.S.E. (true), 284 miles from Boston Lighthouse.
- A second class nun buoy, painted with white and black perpendicular stripes, in about 15 fathoms water, E.  $\frac{1}{2}$  S. (true),  $26\frac{1}{2}$  miles from Boston Lighthouse.
- A first cluss can buoy, painted black, in about fifteen fathoms water, E. by N. (true)  $21\frac{3}{4}$ miles from Boston Lighthouse.

### BUOYS.

### Newburyport Harbour, Mass.

A NUN BUOY, of the third class, painted black and white perpendicular stripes, has been placed in five fathoms water, at low tide, off Newburyport Bar, the west light bearing W. by S., distant 2,267 yards. Vessels bound in over the bar should bring this buoy in range with the west light, and run for it. This course will carry them over in seven feet at low water.

The eastern light has been extinguished, and in its stead a small bug light has been lighted. In running in at night the bug light and the western light must be brought in range.

When over the bar, and half way to the shore, there will be found a spar buoy, painted black, to be left on the port hand. Then the course is N.W.  $\frac{3}{4}$  W., up past a buoy in mid-channel, painted black and white perpendicular stripes, to the red buoy on Black Rocks, when it is W.  $\frac{3}{4}$  S., passing a buoy off Joppa Flats, painted black, (to be left on the port hand) and a red buoy on Joe Noyes' Point (to be left on the starboard hand), to the upper mid-channel buoy, painted black and white perpendicular stripes, thence between the two piers up to the anchorage. These piers are near the city.

### Board of Trade, September 11, 1855. To Merchants, Shipowners, and Traders.

Reduction of the Outward Wharfage Rates payable to the Dock Company of Kingstonupon-Hull.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Board of Trade have, in exercise of the power given to them by the Hull Dock Act of 1844 (7th and 8th Victoria, cap. 103), reduced the rates above-mentioned, as follows:

"The outward wharfage rates now collected by the Hull Dock Company, under the powers given to them by the Act of the eighth year of Her present Majesty, chapter one hundred and three, shall be reduced by one-third of their present amount, in such manner that two-thirds only of the rate which is now collected in respect of each article shall be collected in respect therof; and that no outward wharfage rates whatever, except such two-thirds as aforesaid, shall be collected by the said Company.

"The said reduction to take effect on and after the 1st October next.

"The said reduction to be effected by an abatement of one-third upon the amount of every separate charge."
