Naples, September 14. HE 11th Instant, we had the News here, by two Expresses, of the taking of Buda; The Marquis de Liche, our Viceroy, caused Te Deum to be fung in the Church of the Carme'i es, the Cannon were thrice discharged, and in the Evening there were Bonsies and Illuminations in all the Streets, with Fountains of Wine for the Entertainment of the People. The Gallies of this Kingdom that were fent out to Cruise against the Corsairs of Barbary, are returned into this

Sambor, Sept. 24. We have Advice that the Tartars have taken a Convoy of 200 Wagons that were going to the Army, which was still encamped the 18th of this month on the River Proth.

Warfaw, Octob. 1. We have an account by an Express from Sambor, That the King of Poland has obtained a great

from Sambor, That the King of Poland has obtained a great Victory against the Turks and Tartars, though with the loss of many brave Men, and several of the first quality. The Enemy were, it's said, above 60000 strong, and began the Fight with great Fury, but were at last forced to quit the Field, leaving their Cannon and Baggage behind them; the farther Particulars we must expect by our next. In the mean time the joy of this good News is encreased, by the advice we receive at the same time, that the Holpodar of Valuchia hash being the Polish Army with 1000 Men. Valuchia hath joined the Polish Army with 10000 Men.

Buda, Sept. 25. Yesterday arrived here an Officer from the Imperial Army, which he left encamped near Tolne. He reports, that the Forces would be obliged in few days to separate for want of Forage, and that General Caprara had Orders to pass the Dinube with the Detachement under his Command to attack Segedin. We have no certain Advice concerning the Grand Visier, some Letters fay that he continued encamped near the Fortress of Darda, and others that he was retired towards Belgrade, leaving a Body of his best Troops to defend the Bridge of Effecke, but we may expect our next Advices from the Army will inform us with more certainty. Several Carpenters, Masons, and other Workmen come hither daily, to be employed in repairing the Houses and Fortifications of this place. The great Church, formerly dedicated to St. Ste-phen King of Hungary, which the Turks had made their principal Mosque, received very little damage in the Siege; the Palace of the Kings, which is in the Caftle, being desended by very thick walls, like-wife escaped very well, but most of the Houses in the Town are very much rained; Those that are in the best condition are now repairing, to lodge the Garison.

Oftob. 6. Yesterday arrived here an Vienna, Express, with advice, that Prince Louis of Baden, who was detached the 25th of the last month from the Imperial Camp near Tolna with 7 Regiments of Horse, 4 of Foot, 2 of Dragoons, and 2000 Hungarians, commanded under him the Horse by the Generals of Battalia Piccolomini and Stirum, and the Foot by the Major-Generals Dingen and Asprement, having taken his march towards Simonsorna, arrived the next day before that place, fcituated on the River Sarquitz about 3 miles from Caposwar, and fortified with a good Palanque and Ditch, and a Castle on the South-side of it, built of Stone. The Town is pretty large, of no very easie Access, by reason of a Moras, and several Branches of the River that do in a manner furround it; There was in it a Garison of about 300 Turks, the Inhabitants most Rascians. The 27th, early in the morning, Prince Louis fent a Summons to the Commandant, who answered, That he would make the best Desence he could, but continued not long in that resolution, for no sooner had the Imperial Troops posted themselves, and begun to fire upon the Enemy with three pieces of Cannon, but they hung out a white Flag, and by Noon furrendred at discretion, with this Condition only, That the Women and Children should be conducted to Five Churches, which was performed the next day, the Prince of Baden very readily confenting to it, that the diforder and consternation might be the greater in that place, which he was going to be-fiege. The Turks were made all Prisoners, but the Rascians had their Liberty. The Imperialists found, in the Castle 9 pieces of Cannon, 6 of Brass, and the rest of Iron, with one Mortar-piece, 45 Quintals of Powder, and 2300 Grenadoes. The 29th, Prince Louis continued his march towards the Drave; to join the Forces of Croatia. We have an account from thence, That Lieutenant-General Scherffenberg was gone with 3000 German and Croavian Horle to attack 2000 Turks, which he had notice were marching to put a Convoy of 600 Wagons into Canisa, where the Garison began to suffer for want of Provisions. The Letters from the Imperial Camp at Tolna of the 28th past tell us, That the Duke of Lorrain was returned to Buda, having left the Army under the Command of General Caprara, which was paffing the Danube to execute the deligns that have been formed upon Segedin, and some other places, in order to block up Agria, and secure our Winter-quarters in Upper Hungary. And this day we are informed by an Express, That General Caprara was encamped the 2d of this month near Caloza, about 20 miles below Bada, on the fide of Peft. This week dyed the brave Lieutepant-General de Mercy, and the Count de Caplieres Vice-President of the Council of War, The first of the Wounds he received before Buda, and the last of a Fever, their death being universally regretted. The famous Count de Petenhasi, who since he quitted Teckeley's Party, and returned to his Duty, has done the Emperor very eminent Services, is likewise dead, not without sufficient of heids paylored. Hague, Octob. 18. The Envoy of the Emperor of Morocco had the 15th Instant another Conference with the Deputies of this State; He intends to go the next week to Amsterdam. The young Landtgrave of Hesse-Cassel is arrived here. Prince of Nasjaw, Stadtholder of Friesland and Groningen, is expected towards the end of this month to affift in the Council of State at the forming the state of the War for the next year. Prince Philip of Brandenburgh is now with the Prince of Orange at Loo, who has put off his return to this place till about the middle of the next month. We are told from Hamburgh, That the Ministers of Brandenburgh and Lunenburgh continue to employ their offices at the Court of Denmark for the obtaining the releasiment of the Ships and Effects of the City of Hamburgh, with good hopes of Success.

Hague, Octob. 22. There are Letters from Holltein of the 36 in Inflant which say, the King of Denmark had given Order for the releasing the Hamburghers Ships, and that his Majelty was returning to Copenhages.

Braffels, Octob. 15. We are told that the Count

d.l Val hath upon the Memorial he presented at the Court of Irance, concerning the late proceeding of the Intendant of Mabeuge, who had put up the French Arms not far from Namur, been answered, That it was done without any Order from his most Christian Majesty; That the Intendant was commanded to give an account of what had passed about this matter, and the reason of it; That in the mean time he (the Count del Val) might affure the Governor of these Countries, that the fetting up the Arms could be nothing but the marking out the Limits of his Majesties Territories, without the least intention to commit any Act of Hostility, or doing any thing to the prejudice of the Peace and Tranquility which the Spansh Neeberlands now entry, for that his Majesties resolu-tion was punctually to observe the Truce. The Let-ters from Spain Insorm us, That the Galeons have brought home about 30 Milions, a great part whereof is for the King; So foon as they arrived near Cadiz, the Marquis & Aq i ar, Admiral of the Armada, went on Board the General of the Galeons, and the Viceadmiral and the Prefident of the Contractation House at Seville on Board the Licutenant General, and other Officers were fent on Board the rest, and no Person was permitted to go ashore for the two first days, to prevent the defrauding of the Ring's Duties. The same Letters tell us of the unfortunate death of Don Martin de los Rios Colonel of Foot, who in his Journey from hence to Madrid was within 12 Miles of that place let upon by several Banditi or Robbers, and murdered by them, together with the Servant that attended him They found about Don Martin 50 Pistols, and to the value of about 6000 Crowns in Jewels, and afterwards made their escape. They write from Vienna, That the Duke of Lorrain, having left the Forces that are to befiege Segedin under the Command of General Caprara, was come back to Bu-da, where he intended to flay fome days to give the

necessary Orders, and then to return to Vienna.

Brussels, Octob. 22. The Letters from Vienna of the roth
Instant tell us, that Prince Louis of Batten bad directed his must towards Capolwar, 10-ppffels him of that place po-force he attackt Five Churches; It, was believed he would meet with more opposition there than he had at Sanctorna, it being a place of greater strength, and provided with a better Garison. The Turks that were conducting the Convoy to Canifa, upon advice of General Scherffenberghis-march, returned in great haite to Sigeth, and having put the Wagons into that place, they themselves repassed the Bridge of Estecke. We have advice that the Gradwister has likewise passed it with the Remains of his Army, thu, ving caused part of the said Bridge to be burnt or broken down behind him.

Whitehall, Octob. 16. The 14th Instant, being His Majesties Birth-day, was observed with great Solemnity as well in London as Westminster, the Shops being everywhere that up, and all Perfons expreffing their dutiful Affection to His Majesties Royal Person and Government with the greatest demonstrations of Joy, which never appeared more general than on this occasion. In the morning the King's four Troops of Guards, who were new cloathed, were drawn up in Hide-Park, their Majesties being present; For their Number, there could not be a finer Body of Men, nor better accoutred. And at Night there was a Ball at Court, where the Nobility, and other Persons of Quality appeared in great Splendor.

Whitehall, Octob. 17. This day Dr. John Lloyd Bishop of St. David, Dr. Samuel Parker Bishop of Oxford, and Dr. Thomas Cartwright Bishop of Chefter, were Consecrated at Lambeth by the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, affisted by the Bishop's of Durham, Norwick, Ely, and Rochester.
