PRESENT,

The QUEEN's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament held in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts," or of any other power in such behalf contained in the Church Building Acts, duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council, a representation, bearing date the thirteenth day of November, one thousand eight hundred and fifty-five, in the words following; viz.:

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent that having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parishes of Wolstanton, Keele, and Hanford, in the county of Stafford, and in the diocese of Lichfield, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous portions of the said parishes and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for all ecclesiastical purposes for the consecrated church of Saint Luke, situate at or near Knutton Heath, in the said parish of Wolstanton, under and by virtue of the power contained in the ninth section of an Act of Parliament, passed in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled 'An Act for the further amendment of the Church Building Acts,' or of any other power in this behalf contained in the Church Building Acts, and that such proposed consolidated chapelry should be named or called 'The Consolidated Chapelry of Silverdale and Knutton Heath,' and that the boundaries thereof should be those hereinafter mentioned; that is to say:

"The boundary line commences at the corner of Keele Hall Park Wall, at Rosemary-hill, at the point marked A on the map or plan hereto annexed, and proceeds north-westerly in a straight line to Heaps Cottages, and then turning westerly proceeds along the middle of the main road from Knutton Heath to Keele as far as the Haying Weighing Machine; then in a northerly direction along the middle of the occupation road leading to Bank Top Farm until it arrives at a small cottage near an old coal-pit; then turns abruptly to the north-west and proceeds in a straight line to an angle in the road from Lycett to Knutton

Heath, opposite the Bud Hay Farm-house, and proceeds along the middle of the Lycett-road until it reaches the boundary line of the parish of Madeley, and then proceeds easterly and south-easterly along the boundary line which separates the said parish of Keele from the parishes of Madeley, Audley, and Wolstanton, as far as the line which forms the boundary of the new parish of Chesterton, and then proceeds north-easterly along the boundary of such new parish of Chesterton until it arrives at a small stream separating the Ormes School Estate from the White Barn Estate; then proceeds south-easterly along the middle of the same stream until it joins a larger one flowing from Grindle Well or Low Meadow Well; it then proceeds along the middle of the larger stream until it joins the boundary line between the parishes of Stoke-upon-Trent and Wolstanton, along which it proceeds westerly and southerly until it joins that between Newcastle-under-Lyne and Wolstanton, near the Rotterdam Farm; then it continues along the said boundary southerly until it arrives at the road leading from Keele to Newcastle, and after crossing the said road follows the boundary of the parishes of Hanford and Stoke-upon-Trent until it reaches a fence at about one hundred yards from the east corner of 'Hands Wood;' then proceeds along the said fence in a southerly direction, and along the south-eastern fence of Hands Wood, until it reaches the brook at the southern corner of the said wood; then proceeds northerly along the boundary separating the parish of Hanford from the said parish of Stoke-upon-Trent, until it reaches the boundary line of the said parish of Keele, along which it then proceeds until it reaches the point at which the boundary line of the said consolidated chapelry of Silverdale and Knutton Heath commenced, at the corner of Keele Hall Park Wall, at Rosemary-hill aforesaid, as the same is more particularly delineated on the map or plan hereto annexed, and is thereon coloured green, pink, and yellow.

"That the consents of the Right Reverend John, Bishop of the said diocese of Lichfield, of Ralph Sneyd, of Keele Hall, in the said county of Stafford, Esquire, patron of the parish churches of the said parishes of Wolstanton and Keele, and of the Most Noble George Granville, Duke and Earl of Sutherland, patron of the parish church of the said parish of Hanford, have been obtained to the formation of the said consolidated chapelry of Silverdale and Knutton Heath, as required by the Act and section hereinbefore mentioned, in:

testimony whereof they have signed and sealed this representation.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners beg leave further to represent that it has been mutually agreed between the said Ralph Sneyd and George Granville, Duke and Earl of Sutherland, as such respective patrons as aforesaid, testified as aforesaid, and the said Ralph Sneyd (in whom, his heirs and assigns, the right of presentation and appointment of a minister to serve the said church of Saint Luke, at or near Knutton Heath aforesaid, is now vested under the powers contained in the twenty-third section of the firstly hereinbefore mentioned Act of Parliament, as amended by the fourth section of an Act, passed in the eleventh and twelfth years of your Majesty's reign, intitled 'An Act to amend the law relative to the 'assignment of ecclesiastical districts,') testified as aforesaid, (with the approbation of your Majesty's said Commissioners, testified as hereinafter mentioned, and also of the said John, Bishop of Lichfield, testified as aforesaid), that the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate, to serve the said church of Saint Luke, at or near Knutton Heath aforesaid, should be vested in, belong to, and, whenever occasion may require, be exercised by, the said Ralph Sneyd, his heirs and assigns for ever.

"Your Majesty's said Commissioners therefore humbly pray, that your Majesty will be graciously pleased to take the premises into your royal consideration, and to make such Order in respect thereto, as to your Majesty in your royal wisdom shall seem meet."

Her Majesty having taken the said representation, together with the map or plan thereunto annexed, into consideration, was pleased by and with the advice of Her Privy Council to approve thereof, and to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the consolidated chapelry therein mentioned, for the consecrated church of Saint Luke, situate at or near Knutton Heath, in the parish of Wolstanton, to be called the Consolidated Chapelry of Silverdale and Knutton Heath, be accordingly formed, and that the agreement mentioned in the said representation in respect of the right of presentation and appointment of an incumbent or perpetual curate, to serve the said church, be carried into effect agreeably to the provisions of the said Act; and that the right of presentation and nomination to the said church shall belong to, and be exercised by, Ralph Sneyd, his heirs and assigns for ever, he being the person mentioned in such representation; and Her Majesty is further pleased to direct that this Order be forthwith registered by the Registrar of the diocese of Lichfield.

THE Right Honourable the Lords of the Committee of Privy Council for Trade and Plantations have received, through the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, a copy of a Despatch from Her Majesty's Plenipotentiary in China, enclosing copy of the Hong Kong Gazette, of the 6th October last, containing the following notification of a Decree respecting the exportation of rice and paddy from certain ports in the Philippine Islands:

It has been officially announced to His Excellency, Sir John Bowring, that by a decree, dated

Manila, 29th August, 1855, the exportation of rice and paddy from the Philippines is permitted on the following conditions:—

1st. That the exportation of rice and paddy be placed under no restrictions and formalities, other than those which apply to articles to which the trade is free.

2nd. That the exportation of rice and paddy be allowed in the ports of Manila, Sual, Currimao, Salomague, San Miguel, Iloilo, Capiz, and Antigue.

3rd. That no license be required from the Supreme Government, but that permissions be given by the administrators of the customs, where custom-houses are established, and by the Governors of provinces where there are no custom-houses.

4th. That the exportation for foreign parts shall cease, if in any week the price shall continue during four consecutive days above eighteen reals, in the Manila, and above fourteen in the provincial markets; but it shall be free when for four consecutive days in a week, the price shall fall below these limits.

5th. It is ordered, that a return of prices be made by the respective authorities on every Saturday evening.

6th. That on the last day of every month, a return of the quantities of rice exported, and particulars of exportation be made to the supreme authorities.

7th. That an official return of the prices of all articles of export be made monthly to the Military and Finance Intendants.

8th. That the prices which are to regulate the exportation of paddy are 9 (nine) reals in the Manila, and 7 (seven) in the provincial markets.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

THE Minister of Marine hereby gives notice, that in the middle of the navigable channel of Goeree, at a cable's length distance to the south of the black buoy No. 6, a brig has sunk in a depth of 3½ fathoms at ordinary low water, the masts of which are still visible, and that the needful measures have been taken should the masts come out of the ship, to indicate the spot of danger by a wreck buoy, painted in black and white checks.

Its bearings and soundings are three times the thickness of the steeple of Goereede to the east of the foot of the high sandhill, or exactly between the third and fourth dykes, the third dwelling-house within the Dirkland Sas, in the Goeree Harbour.
