Ebenezer Davies, formerly of No. 6, Richmond-terrace, Barnsbury-park, Islington, Middlesex, Author, Dissenting Minister, and letting lodgings, then and late of same place boarding and lodging there, Author of a Pamphlet called the Mission House Letter, and Dissenting Minister, and Lecturer and Minister of the Caledonian-road Chapel, Caledonian-road, Kings'-cross, Middlesex.

William Thomas Dickenson (known as William Dickenson), formerly of No. 33, and afterwards of No. 31, Mansion-house-street, and now of No. 19, York-row, all in Kennington-road, Surrey, Tailor and Lodging-house Keeper.

Thomas Henry Young (sued and commonly known as Thomas Young), formerly of No. 5, Perseverance-terrace, Church-street, Bethnal-green-road, Middlesex, Boot and Shoe Manufacturer, Wholesale and Retail, late of same place, trading for a short time in copartnership under the style and firm of T. Young and H. Cooper, Wholesale Boot and Shoe Manufacturer, and now of No. 1, Cole Harbour-street, Hackney-road, Middlesex, Boot and Shoe Manufacturer.

John Dean Faulkner the younger, formerly of No. 6, Greek-street, Soho, then of No. 25, Saint George's-road, Sheppard's-bush, at same time renting premises No. 6, Greek-street aforesaid, having a workshop in same, and letting out part thereof in tenements, afterwards of No. 25, Saint George's-road aforesaid, at same time renting a workshop

at No. 6, Macclesfield-street, Soho, then and now of No. 25, Saint George's-road aforesaid, at same time having a workshop at No. 52a, Mortimer-street, Cavendish-square, all in Middlesex, Working Jeweller.

James Cavanagh, formerly of No. 4, Upton-terrace, Commercial-road East, then of No. 23, Crombies-row, Commercial-road aforesaid, then and now of No. 33, King David's-lane, Shadwell, all in Middlesex, Tailor.

Hermann Landsberger, of No. 10, Ashby-street, Clerkenwell, Middlesex, renting a warehouse at No. 5, Goldsmith's-street, Cheapside, London, Commission Agent and Dealer in Foreign Goods, previously of No. 24, Hanover-street, Islington, Middlesex, renting a warehouse at No. 4, Coleman-street, London, Commission Agent and Dealer in Foreign Goods, all the time trading as H. and T. Landsberger.

Charlotte Alexander, late and now of No. 32, and renting Nos. 31 and 33, Cursitor-street, Chancery-lane, Middlesex, Baker and Lodging-house Keeper, and carrying on said business of a Baker, in copartnership with John Alexander until June, 1855, and afterwards on her own account, under same style.

Mathilde Schevendler, otherwise Mathilde Cobbert, otherwise Colbert Schwindler, otherwise Madam Guerin, of No. 2, Marylebone-street, Middlesex, Spinster, Commission Printseller, during two weeks, late of No. 25, Queen-street, Golden-square, out of business one week, then of No. 3, Norris-street, Haymarket, two weeks of Trinity-square, Tower-hill, London, out of business, ten days of Brunswick-street, Soho, out of business twenty-one days, and at No. 80A, Paul-street, Finsbury, London, out of business for a few days, and at No. 92, Newman-street, Middlesex, about three years carrying on the business of a Perfumer.

Cantor and Company, but having no partner, then of No. 9, Jewry-street, Aldgate, London, Commercial Traveller, and now of No. 12, Little Eastcheap, London, out of business or employ.

William Pratt Dyer (sued as William Dyer), formerly of Blackheath-park, out of employ, then of Burn Ash Farm, Lee, out of employ, then of Lee-park House, Lee, all in Kent, Salesman at the Great Exhibition, afterwards of Woodbine Cottage, Carmarthen, Carmarthenshire, South Wales, out of employ, then of No. 4, Douglas-villa, Lee aforesaid, out of employ, and now of No. 2, Eaton-grove, Dacre-park, Lee aforesaid, out of employ.

Samuel Anderson Emery (generally known as Samuel Emery), formerly of No. 6, Devonshire-street, Queen-square, Bloomsbury, then of Horterlan-place, King's-road, Chelsea, both in Middlesex, having for a short period a lodging at Lever-street, Manchester, Lancashire, then of Oakley Cottage, Oakley-street, Chelsea, then of No. 3, Manor-street, Chelsea, then of No. 20, Queen-street, Chelsea, and now of No. 13, Clement's-inn, Strand, all in Middlesex, Comedian, at present engaged at the Olympic Theatre, Wyck-street, Strand.

Samuel Tollervey, formerly of No. 9, Rutland-street East, Bedford-square, Commercial-road East, Middlesex, Carcase Butcher, carrying on business at No. 45, Aldgate High-street, London, and now of No. 9, Rutland-street aforesaid, out of business, during all the time acting occasionally as a Journeyman Butcher.

James Austin, formerly of Fife-terrace, Kennington, Surrey, Tailor, and next and now of Lower Clapton (opposite the Orphan Asylum), Middlesex, Tailor and Board and Lodging-house Keeper, wife Milliner and Staymaker.

Theodore Winks, formerly of Bellevue Stables, Lindsey-row, Chelsea, Middlesex, Cab Proprietor, then and now of same place, Cab Driver.

Samuel Draper Bose Manley, formerly of Frome, Somersetshire, then of Wincanton aforesaid, Watchmaker, then of No. 16, East-road, City-road, Middlesex, then and now of Pope's Cottage, King-street, Hammersmith, Middlesex, out of business, with the exception of occasionally Dealing in Watches and Clocks.

George Baker, of No. 14, Holles-street, Clare-market, Middlesex, Plumber and Coal Dealer, letting lodgings.

William Grant Liddaman, formerly of No. 138, Strand, Middlesex, afterwards of Nos. 41 and 42, Barbican, afterwards of No. 57, Bishopsgate-street Within, afterwards
